LETTER FROM THE EDITOR - FEBRUARY EDITION

Dear Brother's & Sister's:

Ever wonder where the word February comes from? Maybe not, but here's a little trivia...While January takes its name from JANUS, the Roman god of beginnings and endings, February comes from the word Februum. It means purification and februa are the rites and instruments used for purification. The word was formed for the Roman festival of purification in preparation for the coming of spring in the Northern Hemisphere. Each of the calendar month names, as we know them, were originally formed by the Romans and came from names of their Gods or Rulers. However, February was given the special significance of purification in preparation for the coming year. Originally there were only 10 months in a year. Farming was a big deal in ancient Rome. Roman farmers harvested wheat, spelt and barley which were basically all the ingredients to make their favorite food, bread! Farming was so important to the Romans that King Pompilious didn't even bother to name the time in between harvests. The calendar year began in March back then and ended in December. Everything else was just called winter. And the reason the month of February is so not 30 days is because back then rumor has it that Augustus Caesar stole a day from February to add to the month named after him - August.

Groundhog Day is February 2nd. And it comes from our agricultural past and marks the halfway point to the spring equinox. It's much more than a wacky weather prediction from a plump groundhog. Most don't realize that Groundhog Day is actually rooted in astronomy. The date is tied to the movement of the earth around the sun. It marks the approximate halfway point between the winter solstice and the spring equinox in the northern hemisphere. And Groundhog day was always the Celtic festival marking the year's first cross-quarter day. Historically the groundhog was not the animal of choice: a bear brought the forecast to the people of France and England while those in Germany looked to the badger for a sign. And in the 1800's the German immigrants to Pennsylvania brought their "Candlemas" legends with them. In finding no badgers but lots of groundhogs they adapted the New World species to fit the lore.

Valentines Day is February 14th. It's on a Friday this year and the Club is having a special dinner that evening for two which includes a "well drink" and a flower for your Valentine! Also in February it's Washington's birthday on February 22nd and Lincoln's birthday is on February 12th. Washington's birthday was celebrated until well into the 20th century. However in 1968 Congress passed the Monday Holiday Law to provide uniform annual observances of certain legal public holiday on Monday's thus creating more 3-day weekends. Congress hoped to bring substantial benefits to both the spiritual and economic life of the nation. Today both Washington's and Lincoln's birthdays are only one of the eleven permanent holidays established by Congress. This particular holiday was established to help us reflect on not only these presidents but also on the founding of our nation, its values and the constitution as received from our Founders.

This is how my adventure started. I had been duped into taking a local chair. As the outside guard at Wenatchee #204, I ran two raffles at the door, so I started early making money for charity. The outside guard asks for your membership card outside the meeting room. This way he or she gets to know the people that attend the meetings. Each chair teaches a little more about the rituals. So, when you run for state office you should know how the meetings are run, and a general understanding of what the Eagles are all about. Most of the stuff you will, alone, take to State Convention. Big brothers have theirs as well so what they tell you is slanted in their favor. Take what you have learned and go with it. Do your best to be a good Eagle. There are no kings in the Eagles. We are all the same. In this way you will add to Eagledom in a good way, but this is only my opinion. You do now and will have your own in the future.

I had been going to State Eagle events for about two years and was the local Conductor. Bill Walton had talked me into going on a river raft run up the Snake River. Twenty years earlier I had been secretary of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of East Wenatchee. At that time people drank more and really had a good time. The example I am going to use is the time all the brothers of the Junior Chamber went on a Rubber Raft Race down the Snake River. The race was about seven miles long. There was a power boat that would throw cases of beer in the rafts, as we were to drink as much as we could while racing down the river. There were many rapids on the way down. Our toes were cut from the beer bottle caps in the bottom of the rubber raft. The race had about thirty rubber rafts, and all were well fortified. East Wenatchee took third place. We had the lead but got caught in Buffalo Eddy. Yes, it went around and round. The only way out was to row out. Many boats never made it out of that trap and had to be helped out by the power boats. That meant that they were disqualified. Not taking first was a bummer, but we were feeling no pain. We took first in beer drinking. God! We had fun until the next day. We were so sore; nobody could move, and our toes slashed from all those bottle caps that were in the bottom of the raft. So, I just had to go on the yearly raft trip up the Snake River that Ed Berry had started years before. The State Eagle Presidents always went on that boat trip up the river. I met Lady Diana, Kay Berquist and Dennis Allen. I liked them so much that I let them talk me into running for state office. All I had to do was go through the chairs at Wenatchee #204. So, I did, and so can you! You are never too old for a trip up the river. Run
