FROM THE EDITOR...

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME BEGINS ON MARCH 8TH SET CLOCKS AHEAD ONE HOUR!

Dear Brother's & Sister's:

It's March and while the weather is anything but wintry at the moment it is still the season when any type of weather can be expected. March 19th marks the official start of Spring and while it's generally a quiet month at the Eagles, this year we do have a couple of things happening and more in April. However, first let's consider a bit of trivia...March is somewhat legendary in a few ways. The month holds the story of "Johnny Appleseed" whose real name was John Chapman. He was born in September of 1774. His legend tells the tale of him planting appleseeds all along his route to the West. He was actually a nurseryman in western New York and Pennsylvania and to him "out west" was places like Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Illinois. He was considered a deeply religious man and was known to preach during his travels. According to legend John Chapman led a simple life and wanted little. He also often donated any money he received. I suppose given his profession and his kindness to others his reputation proceeded him as he moved west planting apple trees and thus became the legend of Johnny Appleseed.

Now have you ever hear the <u>Ides of March</u> and wonder where it came from? Simply put the <u>Ides of March</u> in accordance with the <u>Roman</u> calendar, is like any other "Ides" in any other month. The Ides signal the first full moon of each month which history reported fell between the 13th and 15th of every month. The term the <u>Ides of March</u> became infamous in the case of Caesar on March 15, in 44 B.C. because it was the day that Caesar was assassinated after entering a hall next to Pompey's Theater for a meeting where history reports a group of senators, including Marcus Brutus, stabbed him over 20 times on that date. And it was at that point the saying: "Et Tu Brute" (you too Brutus) became famous as Caesar realized that his best friend had also turned on him to become his assassin. And it was further indentured in history through much of Shakespears' writings and plays.

March 17th is also legendary for the feast of St. Patrick (or St. Paddy's Day). St. Patricks Day started as a religious celebration in the 17th century to commemorate the life of Saint Patrick and the arrival of Christianity in Ireland. This "Feast Day" always took place on the anniversary of Patricks death which was believed to be on March 17, 461 A.D. and now which obviously is now considered to be St. Patricks Day. Born in Roman Britain in the late 4th century he was kidnapped at the age of 16 and taken to Ireland as a slave. He escaped slavery but returned there about 432 A.D. to convert the Irish to Christianity. "Patricks Day" as it was originally known in the U.S. lent itself to the first recorded celebration on March 17th and it took place in Boston in 1737 when a group of elite Irish men came together to celebrate over dinner what they referred to as "the Irish Saint". The tradition of parades in commemoration began amongst the Irish Catholic members of the then British Army in New York in 1766. Needless to say the festivities included the drinking of ale and soon the "wearin o' the green" became traditional in honor of the beautiful countryside of Ireland and those traditions continue today because of course everyone is Irish on St. Patricks Day! Along with that a meal of corned beef and cabbage was added in the USA as the traditional supper. And a corned beef and cabbage supper will be available here at the club on Tuesday, March 17th in lieu of the usual Taco Tuesday or regular menu.

Now on to Club news...March 28 will be the first day of the Zone 3 Conference which will run 3/28 - 3/30 and we here at #204 are hosting it this year. Mom's Story

I have been thinking of my mother the last couple of days. So, it has come to my mind that after my dad died Mom came to live at my house. After all I had an extra bedroom that was quite large. She could shut the door and have all the privacy she needed. What a wonderful thing that was for me! I got to know my mother for real. This does not happen for most people. I found that mom and I were a lot alike. There was no wife to deal with and she could be herself. I got a little spoiled and mom got to do the things she wanted to do. That being said, Mom told me about her life growing up as a girl in Startup, Washington. Of course, the things that she told me I had heard before, but not in the detail that I now know. The Tyrrells had come to Washington in a covered wagon and settled on a homestead in Edison, Washington. They had fifteen children and were hard working people. All went well until there was a house fire and most of the family died in it. Mom and I went to the Bow Cemetery many times. She always wanted to buy headstones because there were none, but no one knew where all the graves were at that point. Even with all the research it was impossible to find that out. My Grandmother married Lloyd Bartlett and they moved around a bit. They had a fox farm in what is now Bellevue. I was told that was the first thing that went under during the Great Depression. Furs were not a must at that point in history. The Mercantile was next because Startup was a logging town and every logger in town had always bought on credit, so when they could not pay the money they owed, the store was lost for taxes, just like the fox farm in Bellevue. That building later burned to the ground. I was told stories about her best friend seeing children that had been rolling those old 78 records down the street because when they left, they left everything in the store. The state never cared about what was inside and there were lots of other stores that suffered the same fate. When the folks left, they left with just the clothes on their body, got in their car and came to Wenatchee. Lloyd went to work on Rock Island Dam as a guard. The family camped out near that old railroad bridge across the river. I am told it was the first bridge built across it and I would guess that is about the time my dad met my mom.

Mom told me about growing up on Kellogg Lake and about how the lake was man made. On the other side was the "Jap Camp", where the Japanese workers lived. There were barracks for all the men and their families, and when the mill shut down how she and her brother went there. And all the walls were covered with newspapers. She thought that maybe the newspapers were used for insulation. Most of you have heard of "Company Towns" and the "Jap Camp" seemed like one of them. The newspapers were all in Japanese. It is about a mile and a half up the hill from Startup She also told me about how her dad loved birds and about all the bird houses that he had built all over the ranch. Cats were forbidden on the ranch, so the family always had Fox Terriers and Air Dales. And that reminds me of the time Mom was in the second grade of school and her brother in the third, they always walked home up that road. It was a mile and a half up to the lake from the school. The week before this event a little boy turned up missing on that same road. The whole town went looking for him. There had been a cougar spotted around town, so they had been warned and all the school kids were on guard. A week later since that little boy turned up missing, they were walking home and came upon a log that had fallen over the road, and quite high up sat a cougar twisting its tail. So, the two of them not knowing what to do, but knowing never to run, and to only back up slowly when seeing one. Now there was no way to get home, so they waited. It started to get dark. Her Mom and Dad got worried because of the missing little boy and came down the road. Seeing the cougar; Lloyd shot it and yes, they cut open the belly of the cougar and in the stomach was a button and some cloth from that little boy's coat. Mom always said that they only killed old cougars in those days like when they started to lose their teeth because they would only go for easy things to kill like cats, dogs, and little children. Can you blame her for always fearing cougars?

Mom played basketball in high school. She was a forward and quite good. She graduated from Sultan High School and she picked raspberries in the summer as there were many raspberry farms around town. Like most of you I love hearing stories about my mother's young life. She loved to swim and spent a lot of time diving off the railroad bridge over the Wallace River. There are many more stories that she told me. Always remember the stories that your mom told you!




