What Do You Know About The Cemetery?

Many Civil War veterans are buried at Evergreen Cemetery in addition to the founding families of Fort Lauderdale including the Stranahans (who built the Stranahan House on SE 6th Avenue), Bryans, Kings, Cromarties (the maiden name of Ivy Julia Stranahan) (1881-1971) and the Olivers.



Frank Stranahan

In 1893, 28-year-old Frank Stranahan moved to a frontier post on South Florida's New River to assume management of the overland mail route from Lantana to Coconut Grove. He established a trading post and ran the ferry service crossing the New River. By 1895, Stranahan's Trading Post was a South Florida landmark. [The Stranahan's are considered the founders of Fort Lauderdale.](#)

Each year 600 young adults transition to adulthood with little but the clothes on their backs. FLITE Center is a centralized facility in Broward County for dependent youth to learn the skills needed for independent living. The topics of concentration include, but are not limited to, the importance of completion of education; government benefits, budgeting and banking; job and vocational training; housing options and other essential skills needed to live independently.

Last year, FLITE Center gave 250 young adults [Welcome Home Baskets](#) filled with bedroom, bathroom, and kitchen supplies to help them make their transition from foster care to living on their own. This is in addition to providing them with other furnishings for their homes, like beds, lamps, tables, couches- basically everything they need to make it a home.
