Thank you for forwarding on the question about the cruise ships in port and the status of the crew. The cruise ships seen in the port are either in port to debark passengers before departing empty, or laying in at the berth for

resupply after the passengers are ashore. Over the last 4 days, we had 18 different cruise ships enter port to drop off passengers and have 3 more ships arriving over the next few days. The ships are required to report any illnesses involving passengers or crew to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) as well as to US Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and the US Coast Guard (USCG), and that information is reviewed with the Florida Department of Health, Broward Sheriff's Office, and Port Everglades staff before a ship is allowed to enter port. The reporting requirement would also apply to any illness that occurs while a ship is in port.

Authorization for crewmembers to get off a ship while in port is under the jurisdiction of CBP. I checked late yesterday with the local CBP Port Director, and he confirmed that CBP has restricted crew shore leave during debarking operations and while a ship is in port for lay-in. CBP still allows crewmembers to depart the ship for crucial shore visits on a case-by-case basis, i.e. for medical supplies, as well as to access the dock area adjacent to the ship to load supplies. CBP also is still allowing crewmembers that have reached their normal end of contract to depart the ship while in port to travel back to their homes, provided that they comply with any travel restrictions that may apply to traveling to their home country, have confirmed travel arrangements, and are screened for any medical conditions prior to departing the ship. Testing is only required if a crewmember is exhibiting symptoms of COVID-

19 or had the potential for exposure to a person confirmed positive for COVID-19.

I hope this answers the question, but as always, let me know if you need additional information.
