#### **NGC Gardening School - Course 1**

Our Garden Club has so many ways to encourage us to learn to become better gardeners, all while having a good time! An email about the 3-day Zoom NGC Gardening School Course caught my eye and, although the thought of studying the science of botany and soil was a little intimidating, I was certain any nuggets of learning would be well worth it!

First, the registration process, course information, precourse Zoom and audio dry run to identify any technical issues were so very well done. The course began at 8, going to 12:15, with 2 presentations per day, a daily review to get ready for the "open-book" exams (which were optional) and intermittent breaks.

Each presenter was so enthusiastic, knowledgeable, and even though the material was college level, they had beautifully summarized and emphasized the most important elements in their material, making the information easy to grasp and understand.

The course took us from looking at each segment of a plant and what each segment's purpose was to the plant overall and its function, to 17 macro and micro soil elements plants need for optimal growth, to different methods of propagation (even with a propagation workshop!) to techniques of growing outdoor flowers-presented with both seriousness and humor to help us become better stewards of our gardens by simply knowing more.

One thing the course taught me is that I need to be more curious!! I had never considered opening up a seed to see what's inside--all the specific plant parts are contained in that seed along with food energy that allows a seed to become a living plant!! Wow!!

A second deeper lesson is that I've been taking the amazing abilities of plants for granted. I've never considered that a plant cell can change its primary function depending on the plant's need--a cell that first begins

as a stem cell to hold the plant upright, can change into a cell that produces roots when the stem is cut and placed into the ground to begin growing as another plant! Something so amazing, but I'd never given a second thought to it--just plants doing plant "things." Not any more!

I'm so very glad I took advantage of this wonderful course! Very well worth it, indeed!

There are approximately 71.6 million baby boomers between 57-75 years old in the United States. The number of Americans ages 65 and older is projected to nearly double from 52 million in 2018 to 95 million by 2060. What does this tell us? That NGC's inclusion of Healing, Therapy and Senior Gardening as a committee anticipates the wave of interest and need for healing, therapy and senior gardening. Some of the top reasons for encouraging senior gardening:

- 1. Improved moods and lower stress levels: Studies have shown that spending time in nature makes people calmer and happier.
- 2. Gardening provides light aerobic exercise which can enhance your mental and physical health.
- 3. Digging in the dirt, planting seeds, pulling weedsall of these gardening activities require the use of the hands and arms, which can help seniors improve dexterity and strengthen muscles.
- 4. Great for heart health! Regular moderate exercise decreases the risk of many heart problems.
- 5. Careful exposure to the sun increases Vitamin D in the body, which is essential for senior health.
- 6. Gardening requires critical thinking and problem solving (a bit of an understatement, I know!) so it can help to keep an aging mind active.
