Before Thanksgiving, Norma Thomas, has been trying to understand the difference between millings, asphalt and concrete applications. Concrete was far too expensive. Millings are ground up asphalt and are more for residential applications. The large companies said the job was too small for them, but they gave Norma a few names to contact. Our first bid for asphalt was a stunner-\$76,500, followed by \$47,500, \$42,000. and \$32,000. Our little parking lot gets a lot of wear and tear. The garbage truck with its 3-point turns is the major cause of the damage by running over the area where the old oak tree was removed a decade ago.



M&S Asphalt and Paving,

a local contractor, gave Norma a bid of \$22,500 for asphalt but he needed an answer fast. This we could afford so hence the rush to get approval from the Governing Board.

Marshall and Norma met with two members of the City and the owner of M&S. A permit was pulled; the fee waived. We now have a parking lot within budget that should last a good 15 years with normal use. When you use the lot for the next few weeks, come in with soft turns and gentle starts or stops. Four piggyback handicap spaces are at the patio door.
