Invasives in Our Gardens

There is a focus on removing invasive plants from our club house gardens, and a group of members have listed the plants that need to be removed. But there seems to be a few questions that are coming up "What are these invasive plants?", "Why are they invasive?", "What is an invasive plant?"

Over the course of the next few months, I will try to answer these questions and maybe a few more along the way, but first we need to know what is an invasive plant?

According to the U. S. Dept of Agriculture An "invasive species" is defined as a species that is Non-native (or alien) to the ecosystem under consideration; and, whose introduction causes or is likely to cause economic or environmental harm or harm to human health. They go on to add:

Why are invasive plants successful? Many invasive plant species produce large quantities of seed. Many invasives thrive on disturbed soil. Invasive plant seeds are often distributed by birds, wind, or unknowingly humans allowing seed to move great distances. Some invasives have aggressive root systems that spread long distances from a single plant, these root systems often grow so densely that they smother the root systems of surrounding vegetation. Some plant species produce chemicals in their leaves or root systems which inhibit the growth of other plants around them.

What are the impacts of invasive plant species? Invasive species have contributed to the decline of 42% of U.S. endangered and threatened species, and for 18% of U.S.

endangered or threatened species, invasives are the main cause of their decline. Invasive species compete directly with native species for moisture, sunlight, nutrients, and space. Overall plant diversity can be decreased. Establishment and spread of invasive species can degrade wildlife habitat. Results in poor quality agriculture lands, degraded water quality, increased soil erosion, decreased recreation opportunities. These impacts change nature's balance on which all species depend.

Here in Florida due to the large number of invasive species we have there are 4 invasive species lists that are used.

One of our members loves to spend time hanging out at yard sales. One day, she found photo paper, bought it and took it home. When she started to use it, this letter about Barbara Stockhausen (Rose Circle Member) is what she found.

I would like to nominate Barbara Stockhausen for parade marshal for the DeLand Jaycees Christmas Parade.

A familiar figure with downtown shopkeepers and Public Works Dept. employees, Barbara is practically a one-woman Garden Club Beautification Committee. For several years she has borne the responsibility of seeing that the urns, planters and in-ground plantings along Woodland Blvd. are filled with well-kept, blooming plants – a warm and beautiful first impression for anyone entering DeLand.

Having been her assistant for the past year, I can testify that Barbara not only organizes the Garden Club's seasonal planting downtown, choosing and purchasing plants and then distributing them to groups of Garden Club members to plant in specific areas, but she tends the plants all year long, personally replacing missing (yes, sometimes plants "walk away"), diseased or expired specimens.
