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Bird Strike, by Chris Dudley

Birds not only bless us with their beautiful songs and their gorgeous plumage, but they are vital to the earth's ecosystems, as well. They are crucial for pest control, pollination and seed dispersal. Sadly, it is estimated that as many as one billion birds per year perish because they are unable to detect glass as a solid object blocking their path. They see reflections in the glass which they either perceive as vegetation or something that they can fly through, often striking glass while flying 25 to 30 miles per hour on their migratory routes.

The numbers are dismal but there is hope. You can help by placing decals on your windows and patio doors at home, 1" to 2" apart. Smaller birds need this close spacing because they think that they can fly in-between the decals if the spacing is wider. There are products to be found in the marketplace for this purpose. if you search on Amazon, for example, for bird protective window films, a number of products will appear. Some of these products will not be noticeable from inside your home.

On a much larger scale, a building in New York City, 6 blocks of solid glass, was retrofitted with such a product. The number of bird strikes was reduced by greater than 90%. Inside the building people didn't perceive the product while looking out but the birds were deterred and protected from injury. A newly invented type of glass is now available for construction that provides this protection. It is now mandated in NYC that this glass be used on all new buildings.

Other attempts at modifying windows to protect birds are happening around the country. Even in our own state of Florida, students at Florida Gulf Coast University have initiated a project on their campus to protect the birds from campus hazards. Florida is a major migratory route and stopover for birds. What can we do?
