

The Garden Club of DeLand celebrated Florida Arbor Day on Friday, January 20th. Chair Sharyn Marzullo did an excellent job of taking us from the first Florida Arbor Day in 1886 to encouraging residents to plant trees. A beautiful native Dahoon holly (llex cassine) was selected. This small tree (20-30 feet tall with an 8-12 spread) prefers moist soil (thank you sprinkler system) and grows naturally from Florida to Texas. It is not picky about soil type growing in sand, loam or clay, or whether it is in full sun or partial shade. The brilliant red berries are an excellent food source for wildlife, especially squirrels and mammals, although you need both a male and female to produce berries. The holly is located in the azalea bed to the left of the kitchen walkway and looks stunning.

Thank you, Sharyn for your well thought out vision in planting for the future.

The Gabby Gardener cover wildflower **Coreopsis**

Coreopsis is a pollinator magnet, attracting bees and butterflies to their blossoms and birds to their seeds.

In 1991 the flower of the genus Coreopsis was designated as **Florida's official wildflower**. The state legislature made this designation after the colorful flowers were used extensively in Florida's roadside plantings and highway beautification programs. The coreopsis is found in a variety of colors, ranging from golden to pink

Coreopsis is a genus of flowering plants in the family Asteraceae. Common names include calliopsis and tickseed, a name shared with various other plants. <u>Wikipedia</u>

Light/Watering: Full sun brings out the best in Coreopsis, especially in well-drained soils. Water during drought, but Coreopsis is quite drought-tolerant once established. Coreopsis is not fussy about soil, and will bloom exuberantly under a variety of conditions.
