The NGC Gardening Study Courses are designed to

provide educational information to those especially interested in gardening, horticulture and related subjects.

The School consists of a series of four courses, scheduled usually for two days of instruction, followed by a general examination.

of growing, from understanding soil structure to pruning techniques, plant identification, etc. Topics include basic botany, soils, growing annuals, perennials, trees and shrubs, fruits and vegetables, lawns, pests and diseases of plants, plant classification, and selected subjects of local interest. The Garden Club of DeLand supports the above mission by bringing to the forefront outstanding gardens in DeLand, FL. area and awarding the "Garden of the Month" to deserving homeowners. Educating our members on the month-to-month care of their own. gardens.

The Garden Club of DeLand has presented Jason Schley of Schley's Bonsai and Supplies at 2745 Audubon Ave., DeLand with The Garden of the Month award for October. Recently featured on Fox 35's Good Day Orlando program, Mr. Schley's property, located beside Lake Woodruff National Wildlife refuge, encompasses 12 acres which include multiple gardens, event venues, and a bonsai nursery. Prior to the freeze of 1984, this land was home to a citrus grove. Outlying areas retain historic Florida charm, filled with native plants including old growth live oaks and saw palmettos, which will remain intact and serve as habitat for native wildlife. Jason purchased this property in 2011 and has since been working tirelessly, along with his team, to build the gardens of his dreams. His interest in the art of bonsai



began in 1991 as a teenager. Schley's Bonsai and Supplies is now the largest bonsai nursery in central Florida, and hosts the monthly meetings of the Kawa Bonsai Society. Meetings are held on the 3rd Saturday of each month and are open to the public. Serene Asian inspired garden areas include a large koi pond, 10 species of bamboo, as well as specimen bonsai featured throughout the property. Shaded paths allow for easy access through tropical garden areas showcasing philodendron, ginger, lilies, orchids, and other lush tropical plants. Each bed is tastefully decorated with cute surprise details, creating wonderful photo opportunities for guests of all ages to enjoy. An edible garden can present a challenging endeavor for homeowners in west Volusia, but Jason is successfully growing an array of crops



which add visual interest and yield tasty treats. Peaches, nectarines, pears, mangos, pecans, guava, blueberries, bananas, blackberries, grapes, and more are currently growing. Schley's goal is to create a 3 acre botanical garden, with Asian and eclectic themes, which will be open to the public.

The Garden Club of DeLand commends Jason on his ongoing efforts to add beauty, culture, education, and art to our community. An annual Fall Festival will be held on Saturday November 9th from 10:00 a.m to 3:00 p.m. This family friendly event will include a sale, demonstrations, raffles, and free food and drinks. Garden Club of DeLand "The Dirt"

The Weedettes meet every Monday morning to trim, plant, weed and police the grounds. We welcome anyone who wished to join us who doesn't mind getting a little dirty. We typically spend 2 to 3 hours each Monday tending to the gardens. To get an idea of how we spend our time, here is our journal.

WEEDETTE JOURNAL

08.05.19 Three of us today. Sharyn, Evelyn and me. We attacked the woodland area in order to gather green material for the compost. As Evie and I cut, Sharyn shredded the green leaves. After 1 hour, we made good progress in cutting back the small invasive trees in the bromeliads. Sharyn tarped the compost with black plastic in order to help the decomposition and added a layer of newspaper (carbon). It was hot but a good morning.

08.12.19 We filled three 42-gallon trash bags of weeds and trimmings. It is hot and humid, we stopped at 9:30. All vincas that were growing over the walkways were trimmed back as well as the dwarf marigolds that aren't dwarf. Last Friday we got a call from our lawn mowing guy saying that it was 8:30 and the sprinklers were still running. Susan and I met at the Club and turn the sprinkler system off. Today, Susan found the problem to be with the clock and she simply reset it.

08.19.19 Although it is 72 degrees to start the day, it is a warm 72. We prepped the gardens for the Orientation Event to be held on the 24th. The birdbath was scoured clean. The debris from the palms are covering the grounds. Not good, we will be battling seedlings in the Spring. The butterfly iris bed was trimmed and thinned. The chandelier was taken down, cleaned and put back up in the arbor. The border of all gardens was given their formal edge. The mulch is pulled back 6" to expose the soil. Kenny will come in on Friday and edge all beds as well as mow and blow all walkways. The weeds in the pavers were sprayed with a non-selective herbicide (not Round-up). Bids for trimming the trees turned into Jennifer Condo, \$30, \$40 and \$42. All are licensed and insured. Waiting for Board approval.

While meeting with Kenny last Thursday, he noted that we have a serious sod webworm problem in the lawn behind the building. I called and it was sprayed on Saturday. 08.26.19 Grounds look good. We are taking the day off. TS Dorian forming. Got ok to hire Blackwelder Tree Service to trim palms at \$30 a palm. Wait and see on Dorian first.

08.28.19 Hurricane Dorian looks like it will hit South of us into Brevard Co and cross to Orlando as Cat 2 possible 3 and head to Tampa.

08.29.19 Dorian is moving slow, about 10 mph. Plenty of time to build in strength. Time to move yard art, lawn furniture, plants and pots to a safe location.

08.30.19 Hurricane Dorian to come ashore as a Cat 4. It is heading into the Palm Beach area. It was to move north as a Cat 2. Slated to pass on DeLand west side only to switch 12 hours later to pass on our east side between us and Daytona. Gas stations are out of gas, stores are busy. A freaky thunder and lightning storm hit most of DeLand unexpectedly.

08.31.19 Dorian shifted out into the Atlantic away from coastal Florida and heading towards the Savannah area. What a roller coastal ride of emotions.

The high-pressure area that was keeping it down has moved north allowing Dorian to ride the ocean towards Georgia and the Carolinas. Cautiously optimistic.

What a way to end August.

09.01.19 Cat 5 to hit the Bahamas. Horrifying.

09.02.19 Weedettes did not work today, grounds' yard art was moved into the building late last week. Hurricane Dorian is in the Bahamas at wind speeds of 185 to 220 mph. Moving excruciatingly slow. Dorian shifted as it moved up the Eastern Florida coast to 100 miles out into the Atlantic. We were spared high winds and heavy rains.

09.09.19 We are back and starting to take the grounds down. Meaning we are pulling out the annuals and reclaiming the overgrown areas. I think, today, we filled three 42-gallon bags of clippings.

Most of which we could not use in the compost pile because of seeds and the nature of the plant to try to grow in the enriched medium that the compost is becoming.

We also sprayed for weeds using a vinegar solution of 1 to 5 ratio. We also sprinkled baking soda on the weeds in the paver area. Also used a store-bought weed killer that is supposed to be friendlier to the environment. We will see what does what upon our return next week. It is stinking hot and we all left as a big ole' puddle of sweat. Yuck. Happy Gardening!
