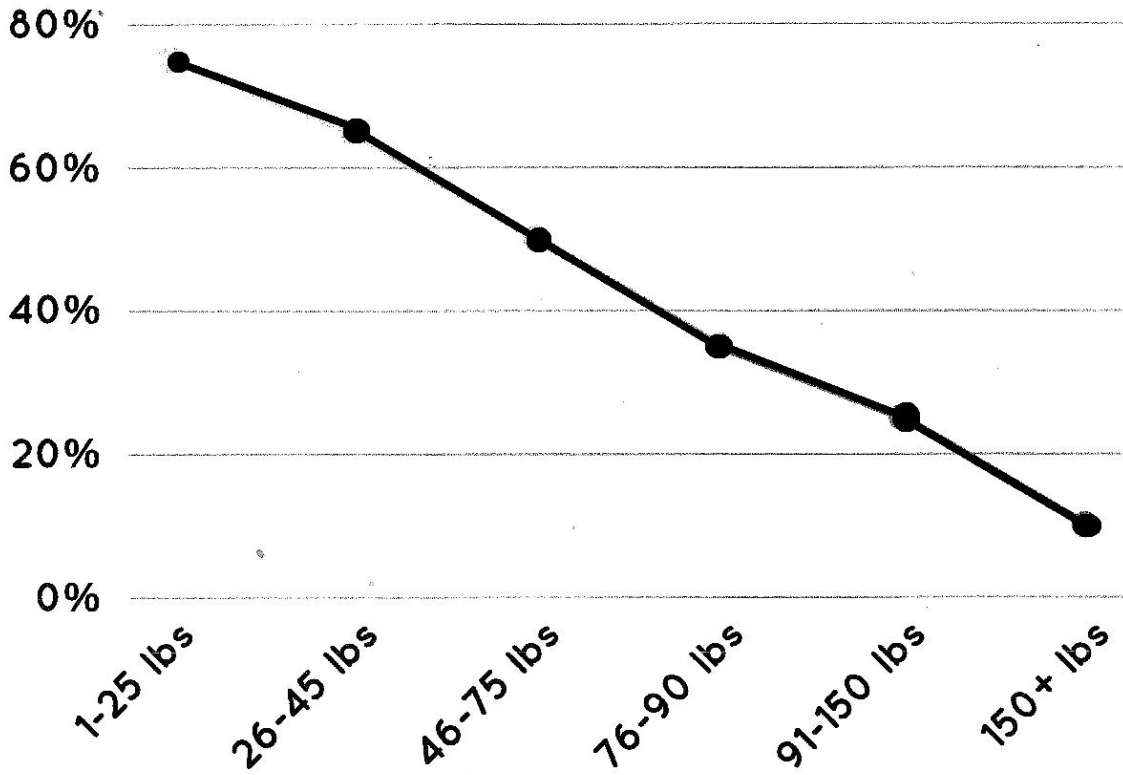
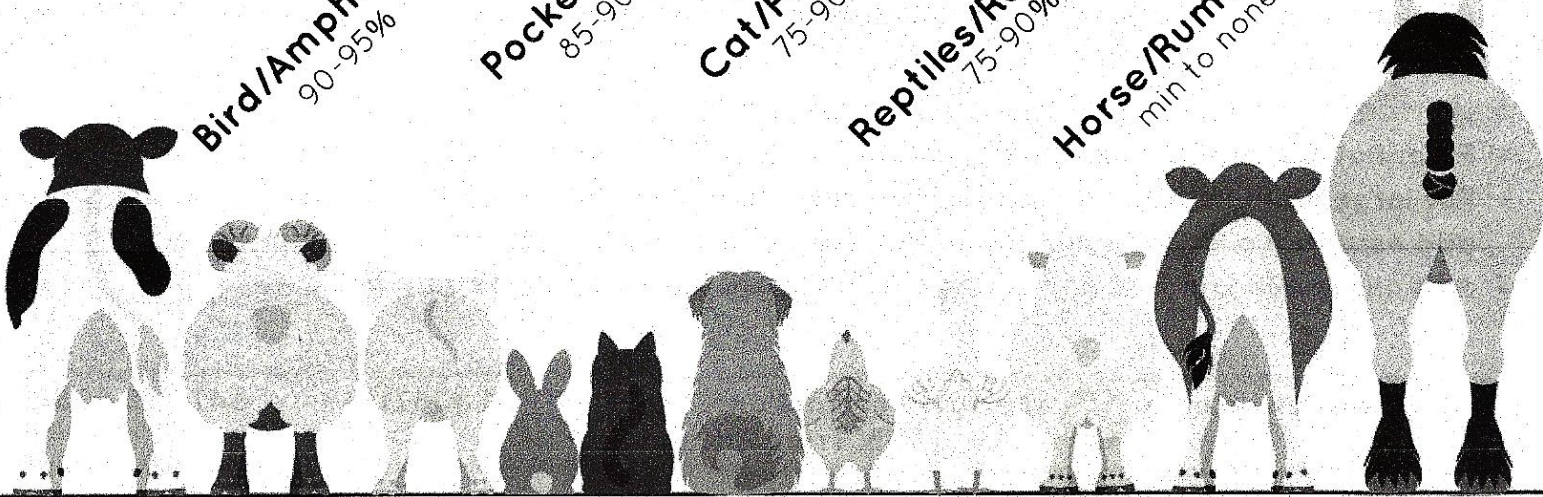
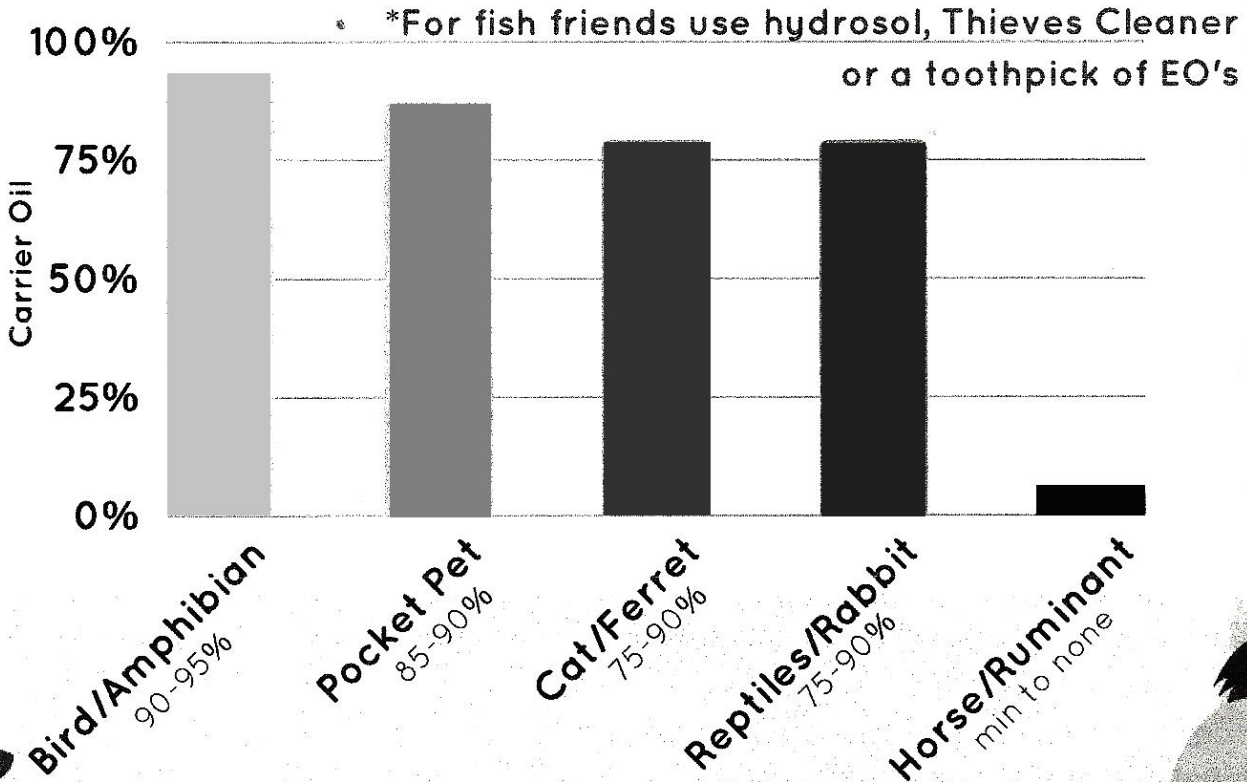


DOG DILUTION CHART

Most animals are more sensitive than humans to essential oils.

- Every animal is different, so carefully observe how each animal responds to the oils.
- Use common sense and good judgment as you try different methods.
- Do not use oils with high phenols such as Oregano & Thyme with cats, birds, & pocket pets unless under a Veterinary Aroma Therapist's Supervision.

Introducing Oils To Animals

- Wear oils around your animals
- Diffuse in their space yet allow cats a way to leave
- Apply to your hands and let the animal smell them
- If your animal is resistant to essential oils, apply to yourself & stay near them until they get used to the aroma.

Applying Oils to Animals:

- AVOID: eyes, nose, & ear canals.
- Always have a carrier oil on hand for dilution. Ex: V-6, Grapeseed, coconut, hemp.
- Try rubbing oils onto your own hands and then stroking the animal's fur.
- Most acupressure points are a great place for oils.
- You can use Animal Scents oil on top of the oil application.
- Make a summer spray for happy campers & anti-wet dog scent!
- Rodents & Birds: diffuse near cage or use in a spritz bottle filled with water. (Very diluted oils.)

Essential oils can be administered internally.

- Essential oils can be mixed with your animal's food, depending upon taste.
- For large animals, you can pull out the bottom lip and drop oils directly into the mouth, or add essential oils to horse's water (always have a 2nd water bucket for plain water).
- Add oils to Ningxia Red and syringe into mouth. Dilution may be required.
