STORMWATER UPDATE

The 2021 Stormwater bills were mailed on or about February 18th. In addition to switching to the Tiered method of billing, the Authority also reduced the impervious area subject to the fee from 800 sf to 400 sf. This means there are certain property owners who will receive a bill for the first time in 2021. If your parcel contains 400 sf or more of impervious area, you should receive a bill. If you have more than 400 sf and did not receive a bill, you should contact Alexis Woodruff at 717-412-0154. As a result of the Covid Credit, some property owners will receive a bill of \$1.00 or less. Bills ranging from -\$1.00 to \$1.00 will be zeroed out and no payment is necessary. Property owners with credit bills greater than \$1.00 will receive that credit on their 2022 stormwater fee billing.

Also new for 2021, property owners who pay their entire bill by March 15th will receive a 2% discount on their bill. Property owners who pay in full by April 15th can pay at Face (see invoice). Owners who wish to pay in installments have the option to make quarterly payments commencing March 15th. Property owners who fail to pay their first installment by March 15 or pay in full by April 15 will incur a 10% penalty.

The 2021 stormwater bill received from Keystone only reflects the net amount due for 2021. Owners can see a detailed calculation of their bill by going on the Authority's GIS website https://arcg.is/fz5re. Property owners who feel their bill was calculated in error have until April 15th to appeal. No appeals of the 2021 stormwater bill will be considered by the Authority after that date.

Property owners who failed to pay their 2020 stormwater fee by December 31, 2020 will not receive any stormwater credits on their 2021 bill. If a property owner's 2020 fee is still delinquent after July 1, 2021 they will forfeit their right to the Authority's Covid Credit. Delinquent 2020 fees after February 28, 2021 will begin to accrue an interest penalty equal to ½% per month on delinquent amounts until paid. This interest penalty is in addition to the 10% late penalty. Also, delinquent accounts after February 28th will be turned over for collection and property owners will incur additional penalties and costs of collection. Ultimately the subject property will be sold at sheriff sale to collect the delinquent amounts.

Property owners have until November 15th to apply for stormwater credits against their 2022 stormwater fee. Stormwater credits are not retroactive and no credits approved by the Authority in 2021 will be applied to the 2021 stormwater fee.

The Authority's first pollution reduction project mandated under the Township's MS4 permit finally received its DEP permit. The project is expected to cost approximately \$100,000 and will be constructed by the Township's Public Works Department. Construction is expected to start and be completed in late summer. The project, located between North Clover Lane and North Fairville Ave., involves performing the restoration of approximately 650-feet of degraded and heavily modified stream channel. The intentions behind the implementation of the stream restoration are to improve the environmental health and flow conditions of the stream, increase water quality in the Manada Creek Watershed, and to reduce the potential for flooding of adjacent properties. These goals will be met by employing several stream restoration techniques. First, the stream channel will be realigned to introduce a more natural meander to promote positive drainage and reduce ponding on neighboring properties. The meandering conditions will also help to reduce the velocity of the stream flow channel, thereby reducing streambank erosion and sedimentation of downstream receiving waters. Stream features known as log sills will be placed in the streambed throughout the restored channel, creating small pools within the stream. These small pools will provide an area for energy to dissipate and further reduce erosive forces within the channel. Lastly, a riparian buffer will be planted on both sides of the stream channel. This buffer will create canopy cover over the stream channel which will protect and shade the stream, limiting damaging thermal impacts caused by direct exposure to sunlight. The roots of the trees will also improve the stability of the streambank and promote nutrient uptake; further improving the water quality of the stream.

In February, Dauphin County provided updated parcel information that affects 177 parcels in the Township, with significant changes to parcels along Appalachian Trail East. These changes are more significant than the County's typical updates. These changes loosely fall into the following four categories: (1) about 80 parcels have changes in lot area; (2) about 10 parcels involve the combining of lots; (3) about 95 parcels involve the shifting in location; and (4) about 10 parcels involve creation of new lots. Unfortunately, the County update came after the preparation and mailing of the 2021 Stormwater Fees. While not all affected parcels will trigger a change to the 2021 Stormwater Fee, we have begun to process these changes and the Authority itself will initiate appeals to correct any incorrect fee calculations. Once approved by the Authority, a revised bill will be sent to impacted property owners.

The Authority will be conducting a public information Zoom meeting on Tuesday, March 23, 2021 at 7:00 pm. The meeting will include a presentation from the PA DEP on the role of DEP in the MS4 process and current MS4 issues. The final list of presenters and topics are still being formulated and will be advertised on the Township website.



Did you know the Township has 3 drop boxes for retired United States flags? One is at the Township Building on Allentown Boulevard and there is a box at the Park and Recreation Building on Walnut Avenue. There is also a box at Fairville Park. The boxes are checked by Scout Troop 27 regularly and flags are given to a local legion to be properly disposed of.



WEST HANOVER TOWNSHIP MS4

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WHAT IS MS4?

MS4 is short for, "Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System". MS4 refers to a system of structures that include but are not limited to underground pipes, retention basins, ditches and roadside inlets that are designed to gather stormwater runoff and discharge it into local waterways that operate separate from the sanitary sewer system.

MS4 and stormwater related projects are important to the community because they lessen the potential for flooding during and after rain events and reduce the amount of pollutants entering our local waterways. MS4 projects, often referred to as Best Management Practices, or BMPs, come in many forms including vegetative swales, bioretention basins, infiltration facilities, rain gardens, streambank stabilization, and riparian buffer restoration. Each variety of BMP serves to reduce the amount of stormwater runoff and/or improve the water quality of the stormwater runoff. Implementing stormwater BMPs is not only beneficial to our local creeks and streams, it also improves the condition of downstream receiving waters such as the Chesapeake Bay.

In 2020, the Township implemented a stormwater utility fee to help fund stormwater related projects and programs throughout the Township. The stormwater utility fee is a user fee collected from businesses, churches, schools and homeowners to help subsidize the substantial cost of operation, maintenance and improvements to the existing storm sewer system and facilities, implementation of PADEP required MS4 projects, and other stormwater program activities.



TIPS TO REDUCE STORMWATER POLLUTION

- > Apply lawn fertilizers only when necessary and apply only the amount directed by the manufacturer. Also, avoid fertilizing on rainy or windy days and immediately sweep up and dispose of residual fertilizer granules left on driveways, sidewalks, and roadways.
- > Avoid discharging grass clippings onto streets and roadways. Also, do not dump grass clippings along stream banks or drainage ways. Grass clippings contain nutrients that promote algae growth and pollutants that can be harmful to aquatic life.
- > Pick up pet waste and dispose of it properly. Never dispose of pet waste in a storm inlet or near a waterway.
- > Properly dispose of unwanted or unused hazardous chemicals, such as fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides, paints, oils and cleaning products. Release of these chemicals to the storm sewer system or waterway is illegal and detrimental to the environment.



ILLICIT DISCHARGE

Any discharge to the Township's storm sewer system that is not composed entirely of stormwater, or a PADEP approved non-stormwater discharge shall be considered an illicit discharge.



WASTE MANAGEMENT CURBSIDE YARD WASTE PICK UP

Chipseal (also chip seal) is a pavement surface treatment that combines one or more layer(s) of asphalt with one or more layer(s) of fine aggregate. In the United States, chip seals are typically used on rural roads carrying lower traffic volumes, and the process is often referred to as asphaltic surface treatment. This type of surface has a variety of other names including tar-seal or tarseal, tar and chip, sprayed seal or surface dressing.

Why use chip seals?

- 1. A chip seal treatment costs considerably less than conventional asphalt overlays.
- 2. By extending the time between asphalt overlays, chip seals result in better return on investment and performance over the long term.
- 3. Chip seals increase safety by providing enhanced skid resistance.
- 4. Chip seals provide an effective moisture barrier for the underlying pavement against water intrusion by sealing cracks in the pavement.
- 5. Chip seals prevent deterioration of the asphalt surface from the effects of aging and oxidation due to water and sun.

Will this process damage my car?

Chip sealed roads are safe to drive on, but it is important motorists do not exceed 35 mph. Driving 35 mph or less will prevent loose stones from kicking up. While a freshly chip sealed road appears coarse, the stones will further compact into the road surface over time.

Recycling 101: A Guide to Recycling in West Hanover

We all have things we no longer need - an old computer monitor, unused paint, that broken microwave, lithium batteries and oil or antifreeze; but tossing them in the trash is dangerous. And thoughtless dumping can lead to mercury, lead and other toxic substances leaking onto the ground - and into the groundwater.

Recycling is a great way to protect our environment. It boosts our economy, saves resources, prevents pollution, supports public health, and creates jobs. Best of all; it's easy to do in West Hanover Township!

Recycling is mandated in West Hanover Township; so correctly preparing your recyclables to avoid contamination is very important.

Preparing your recyclables: The Basics

Recycle only *clean* bottles, cans, paper and cardboard - Thoroughly rinse containers to remove food and liquids.

Plastics: Only 1, 2 & 5 numbered plastic containers are recyclable.

Plastic bags or recyclables in bags are **not** to be placed in your recycling container.

A recycling symbol doesn't always mean it's recyclable - When in doubt, leave it out!

Lids must be removed from all containers and disposed of in trash.

Do not tie newspapers, cardboard, magazines or other recyclable paper together.

Flatten all cardboard.

Flattening plastic bottles, cans and milk and juice cartons prevents the recyclable from becoming airborne.

Preventing Recycling Contamination

Contamination occurs when non-recyclables are placed in the recycling bin. This practice has become a big problem for Waste Management. Contamination can also include anything from food waste to plastic bags. Some non-recyclables can wrap around sorting equipment, causing entire recycling centers to shut down.

The following items must be disposed of in the trash - Do NOT place in the recycling bin:

Waxed or plastic coated paper or cups.

Solid Styrofoam

Household alkaline batteries

Incandescent light bulbs

Mirrors, window and auto glass, porcelain, ceramics, drinking glasses and perfume/cologne bottles

Unnumbered plastics

Wire coat hangers

Plastic flower pots/trays

Paint cans - clean out and place in trash

Plastic wrap or film

Garden hose, rope, wire, holiday lights, string & chain

Wood or yard waste

Clothing, textiles or furniture

Hazardous or toxic substances

Some Recycling Tips:

Plastic bags - Recycle these at grocery stores.

Rechargeable batteries and car batteries may be recycled at Battery Warehouse.

CFLs and florescent tubes can be recycled at West Hanover Township E-Cycling. See Recycling Brochure.

Household electrical items. See E-Cycling section in Recycling Brochure for info

Medical waste like diabetic lancets and needles. *Never dispose of these directly in the trash. Purchase "Sharps" containers from local drug stores.*

What to Recycle at Curbside

West Hanover Township's single-stream recycling program, putting all your recyclables together in the recycling bin, makes it easy. Simply set your recyclables at the curb on recycling day and you're done.

Thoroughly rinse food containers. Do not tie or bundle newspapers, magazines or other recyclable paper. Flatten all cardboard. Lids must be removed from all containers.

New Single Stream Recyclables for 2021

□Coated milk and juice cartons with peaked tops □Aluminum beverage containers

(aluminum foil and pie/baking tins will no longer be accepted)

□Glass food and beverage containers: Clear, brown, green.

□Numbered plastic 1, 2 & 5 such as, milk bottles, water bottles, single serve yogurt containers, detergent bottles, shampoo bottles, bleach bottles, etc. When in doubt about recycling a plastic container, do not put it in the recycling bin

☐Construction paper, kraft paper, cereal boxes, shoe boxes, or similar brown cardboard

Derrous cans (iron, steel, tin)

□Newspapers, printer paper, computer paper, copy paper

☐Junk mail, magazines, paperback books, catalogs and phone books

□Corrugated cardboard. Broken down and flattened to fit into recycling bin

One bulk item per week can be placed at curbside along with trash and recyclables. Acceptable Bulk Items:

Appliances (washer, dryer, dishwasher, hot water heater, etc.)

□Furniture (tables, chairs, sofas, desks, etc.)

Mattresses and box springs

□Carpet (rolled and tied into 4-ft lengths

Unacceptable Bulk Items:

What NOT to Recycle at Curbside

☐Wax coated paper or cardboard

□Any material with food debris

Styrofoam (polystyrene of any kind. Dauphin County Recycling will take food grade Styrofoam)

Light bulbs (see E-Cycling in this brochure for recycling CFLs and tubes)

Mirrors, window or auto glass, porcelain, ceramics, microwave oven trays, drinking glasses, perfume/cologne bottles

□Wood or yard waste (see Curbside Leaf Waste Collection in this brochure)

Unnumbered plastics

Plastic flower pots and trays

□Wire coat hangers (recycle at local dry cleaners)

□ Household items such as toasters, cookware, bake ware, appliances, etc., electronics (see E-Cycling in this brochure)

Hazardous or toxic substances (see Recycling Household Hazardous Wastes in this brochure)

Iltems which have contained hazardous or toxic substances such as paint, glue or petroleum products

Pay-As-You-Throw Option (PAYT)

☐ Residents pay by the tag for trash services. ☐ Minimum purchase of 26 tags per year.

□PAYT customers will be mailed 26 tags at the start of each contract year.

□Cost \$156 per year (26 tags)

☐ Additional tags (\$6.00 each) needed throughout the year may be purchased by calling Waste Management's customer service at 800-633-9096 or purchasing tags from Township Office.

□One 64-gallon wheeled recycle cart (provided by WM) for recyclables collected weekly.

□One large bulk item collected weekly.

☐Yard waste collection once a month April through November (Christmas trees collected two times in January).

Curbside Leaf Waste Collection

Unlimited curbside leaf waste is collected by Waste Management as part of the standard service to all. There is no fee. Free labels are available at the township office to place on containers. Leaf waste includes leaves, weeds, shrub trimmings, bundled tree pruning's and garden waste.

Leaf waste does not include grass. Grass is collected with the solid waste.

Plastic bags CANNOT be used for leaf waste.

□ Leaf waste is collected one time per month, the same day as your trash/recycling collection in a different truck, April through November. For collection schedule go to township's website www.westhanover.com or call Waste Management at 800-633-9096 if you do not receive a schedule from Waste Management. Printed schedules are available at the Township Office.

□Christmas trees are collected two times in January. Trees must be free of all decoration, and plastic "tree bags" cannot be used.

□All leaf waste must be placed at the curb before 6 a.m. on your collection day.

□ Plastic bags may not be used. "Kraft" bags or 10-36 gallon trash cans can be used for leaf waste. Cans cannot weigh more than 50 pounds when full.

Brush and branches must be tied in bundles 6 foot or less in length. Tree branches can be no greater than 2 inches in diameter.

□Branches greater than 2 inches in diameter must be taken to the WHT Compost Center, 402 North Fairville Ave. Permit is required. See Compost Center info in this brochure.

□ Leaf waste containers that contain trash and/or grass clippings or a mix of leaf waste and trash will not be collected.

All residents and businesses are required by State and Township Ordinances to recycle.

Zoning & Planning Information submitted by Janet Hardman, Zoning & Planning Administrator

Zoning Permits are required for:

- (1) The erection, alteration, enlargement or relocation of any building, structure, land or portion thereof. Such as but not limited to a new house, addition, deck, shed, garage, pool, fence.
- (2) The use or change in the use of a building, structure or land. New businesses locating with West Hanover Township need to apply for a use permit and sign permits.
- (3) The alteration or expansion of a nonconforming use.
- (4) The issuance of a building permit, if required.
- (5) Earth disturbances in accordance with Article XVIII, §195-97 and 195-101. Stormwater permit for projects 1,000 square feet or more. Erosion and sedimentation control permit when excavation, fill or any combination thereof that exceeds 500 cubic yards; fill will exceed three feet in depth at its deepest point as measured from the natural ground surface; excavation will exceed four feet in vertical depth at its deepest point measured from the natural ground surface; plant or tree cover to be removed from any area exceeding 2,000 square feet on any parcel of land; where any land located in a stream channel or body of water is disturbed; excavation, fill or any combination thereof that exceeds an area of 2,000 square feet. Stormwater and erosion and sedimentation control permits require plans to be prepared by an engineer.
- (6) The erection, placement, installation, alteration, relocation or replacement of a sign as specified in Article XXIII hereof. For freestanding signs a plot plan is required showing how far the sign is from property lines measured from the outermost dimension of the sign, dimensions and height of the sign. For wall signs, the linear frontage of the building or frontage of the area you occupy for multiple occupancy buildings and the dimensions of the sign(s).
- <u>(7)</u> Driveways or parking areas. New driveways and parking areas; and expansion of existing driveways and parking areas. A plot plan showing the location and dimensions of new or expanded driveway, the distance from the property lines and the surfacing material.
- (8) Temporary construction or office trailers.

Information needed for new construction:

- A plot plan showing lot dimensions, location and dimensions of all structures (house, sheds, driveway, etc.), and the size, location and distance from property lines for the proposed project. Please note that if you have environmental features (wetlands, stream, ponds, steep slopes) you must show the location of the environmental feature on the plot plan and indicate a 50' easement around it or on either side.
- Zoning permit application. Please note that all information on the zoning permit must be filled out such as existing structures and existing driveway information in order to calculate impervious coverage.

Please contact the Zoning and Planning Administrator before considering a construction project for zoning requirements and detailed information regarding your property. The Zoning and Planning Administrator is available to assist residents with filling out forms and preparing plot plans. If possible, please call in advance for an appointment.





FIRE & COOKING SAFETY submitted by Jay Megonnell

Did you know that if a fire start in your home, you may have as little as two minutes to escape? During a fire, early warning from a working smoke alarm plus a fire escape plan that has been practiced regularly can save lives.

Tips for fire safety:

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas
- Test smoke alarms every month. If they are not working, change the batteries. Working smoke alarms are especially important during the winter when power outages are common due to severe weather.
- Never use candles for emergency lighting. Use flashlights or battery-operated lanterns for emergency lighting and stock up on batteries.
- Talk with family members about having a fire escape plan and practice your escape plan, consider family members who may need extra assistance during a fire.
- Create an escape route that provides two possible exits from each room, such as a window and a door.
- Most home fires start in the kitchen, usually on stovetops. Stay in the kitchen when cooking and keep a fire extinguisher within easy reach.
- If your microwave is not built in, make sure it is clear of surrounding clutter and its vents are not obstructed.
- If a fire occurs in your home, get out, stay out, and call for help. Do not go back inside.

Cooking is the main cause of home fires and fire injuries. According to the U.S. Fire Administration, most fires occur during the winter and unattended cooking is the leading cause of these fires. It is easy to lose track of time and become distracted when spending time with family and friends.

Tips to prevent cooking fires:

- Remain in the kitchen and watch what you are cooking. If you need to leave the kitchen, turn off the stove.
- Keep flammable objects at least 3 feet away from the heat source. Move things that can burn away from the stove, such as dishtowels, bags paper and curtains.
- Fires often start when the heat is too high. If you see smoke or grease starts to boil, turn off the burner.
- Set timers to keep track of food like turkeys that have extended cooking times.
- Turn handles of pots and pans inward so they can't be bumped or pulled.
- Keep an eye on food that you fry. Most cooking fires start when someone is frying food.
- Turkey fryers are especially dangerous. They can easily tip over, overheat and cause burn injuries.
- If there's an oven fire, turn off the oven and keep the door closed until it is cool.

- DO NOT RUN, CHASE, CALL THEIR NAME OR MAKE LOUD NOISES talk calmly and softly to your cat

USE FOOD & A BOX TO ATTRACT YOUR CAT

- Take cans of food and bags of treats with you (the opening sound alone may attract them)
- Create a safe place outside that they can return put out an upside down box, cut a hole in it, add blankets & weight the bottom





Starting work without permits or failure to acquire the necessary permits prior to construction will result in double the permit application fee.

ATTENTION PERMIT HOLDERS!

It is the responsibility of the permit holder to make certain that the final inspection has been completed. Permits inactive or abandoned become invalid after 180 days. Occupancy or use of uncertified structures could subject the owner to penalties and/or fees.



TOP 5 TIPS FOR CAR CARE

If you are staying at home and practicing physical distancing, your vehicle may be sitting for longer than usual. We design our cars for driving, so if yours has been in 'park' for some time, these 5 car-care tips can help ensure your vehicle stays running.

KEEP THE BATTERY CHARGED

Car batteries discharge over time and the easiest way to prevent a dead battery is to take your vehicle out for a drive, even if it's just around the block.

If you have access to an outlet/plug, use a battery tender or trickle charger that attaches to the battery's terminals to keep it fully charged.

CHECK THE FLUIDS

Be sure to check the fluid levels of your engine oil, brake fluid, and transmission fluid; follow your recommended maintenance intervals if possible.

 When your vehicle sits for too long, oils can settle and fluids can start to separate which might lead to engine issues down the road.

DRIVE AROUND THE BLOCK

Taking your vehicle out for a 20-minute drive helps to keep your battery charged, and fluids circulating—making sure that vital parts don't dry out.

Surface rust can occur on brake rotors when a vehicle sits in high humidity conditions or when it rains. Driving the vehicle and applying the brakes

will clean off any surface rust before it becomes a bigger problem.

CHECK TIRE PRESSURE

Properly inflated tires will combat flat spots from developing. Check your door sticker for the recommended tire pressure or use Nissan's EasyFill Tire Alert feature (if available) to confirm when the tire has reached the exact recommended tire pressure.

Driving your vehicle around the block periodically helps to avoid flat spots. The loss of tire pressure and the weight of the vehicle can cause flat spots where the tire meets the driveway/road.



WASH YOUR VEHICLE

Periodically washing your vehicle at home or through a local automatic car wash can keep contaminates from outside elements, especially if sitting for long durations, from damaging the paint.

 Additionally, you can consider using a car cover to protect your vehicle.
