It is with great sorrow that we mourn the loss of our brother William "Bill" McCahan. Many residents may not recognize Bill by name, but I can assure you, he had every single resident's safety in mind while fulfilling multiple Public Safety roles throughout the years for West Hanover Township. All indications point to that only months after Bill and his wife Shirley built their "dream" home in early 1964 on Jonestown Road, Bill submitted his application to join the West Hanover Township Fire Company No.1 on June 17th of 1964. This is when Bill began his 58 years of dedicated service to West Hanover Township, the Fire

Company and our residents. Over the years, Bill held and served in a variety of positions for the Fire Company; operational positions included Fire Fighter, Chauffer, Fire Police officer, Fire Police Lieutenant, Fire Police Captain and Assistant Fire Chief. Additionally, on the Executive side of the Fire Company, Bill served many years as the Fire Company Parliamentarian, 13 years as Recording Secretary, 32 years as Fireman's Relief Treasurer and spearheaded the Cost Recovery efforts for the Fire Company since the inception of Cost Recovery operations.

Along with fulfilling a multitude of positions within the Fire Company for 58 years, Bill also served our Township and residents as the Township Emergency Management Coordinator. This position is an appointed position by the Governor of Pennsylvania, after being recommended by the Township and Dauphin County. Although we were unable to confirm an actual date that Bill had been appointed by the Governor, we believe Bill was the only person to serve in this role for West Hanover Township, since the enactment of Chapter 73 of Title 35, in November of 1978.

In addition to the many roles Bill faithfully fulfilled for the Township, he also served many years as a representative for West Hanover Township on the South Central Emergency Medical Services Board of Directors.

Not only was Bill a husband, father, and grandfather, he was an ambassador for West Hanover Township, our Fire Company and the residents. He has always been a leader, a mentor and most importantly a friend for anyone who served with him. He left very large shoes to fill, but along with those large shoes, Bill provided many fond memories for so many people throughout the Township. Rest easy brother,

we will take it from here!

ZONING ORDINANCE RE-WRITE

Currently West Hanover Township's Zoning Ordinance (Chapter 195) is going through a re-write process. This re-write will take several months to complete and will address numerous topics such as: timber harvesting, chickens, Airbnb's and other zoning-related issues. A committee of Township residents was formed to assist township staff and the Township hired a consultant from Michael Baker International in order to prepare the amendments for review. The committee is comprised of a group with diverse backgrounds including the Board of Supervisors, the Environmental Advisory Council, the Planning Commission, Parks and Recreation, the Zoning Hearing Board, the Township Solicitor, and engineers. Prior to the completion of the re-write, the zoning ordinance will be reviewed by the Planning Commission, Board of Supervisors and a public hearing will be held before adoption. Public input is encouraged at these future Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors meetings. Overall, the goal of this committee is to make the ordinance clearer and to update certain laws, as this ordinance has not been changed since 1995.

It's About Trees


Who doesn't love a beautiful tree? Maybe it's suburbanites who grumble every fall about leaves covering the lawn. (Especially if they are the *neighbor's* leaves!)

But we owe a lot to trees: Trees give us shade in summer; provide food and homes for birds, squirrels and many other critters. We even use their wood to build *our* houses and enjoy fruits and teas that trees produce! Like other plants, tree roots hold the soil and absorb water. This helps control erosion and flooding.

Trees actually improve the air by absorbing carbon dioxide. You may have heard about Forest Bathing. Walking in a deciduous forest when the sun is shining can make you happier! And that's not only because of the exercise! Trees are doing photosynthesis, changing the sunlight to sugar. The process absorbs carbon dioxide and releases oxygen. More oxygen makes us feel better!

Recycling Reminder

Check out the West Hanover Township Recycling brochure available online at www.westhanover.com or pick one up in the township office to know what and how to recycle. Brochure includes information on curbside, yard and leaf waste, WHT Compost Center, oil and antifreeze and e-cycling.

Don't have a recycling container? West Hanover Township does not require residents to have an official recycling container. A recycling container can be as simple as a plastic garbage can. The point is to **RECYCLE!** To further help Waste Management separate recycling containers from trash, free recycling container stickers are available at the township office.

As many West Hanover Township residents already know, electronics like TVs, computers, printers, radios, pagers, cell phones, etc., <u>cannot</u> be placed with your trash. The Covered Device Recycling Act requires that all electronics be properly recycled.

Chipseal (also chip and seal) is a pavement surface treatment that combines one or more layer(s) of asphalt with one or more layer(s) of fine aggregate. In the United States, chip and seals are typically used on rural roads carrying lower traffic volumes, and the process is often referred to as asphaltic surface treatment. This type of surface has a variety of other names including tar-seal or tarseal, tar and chip, sprayed seal or surface dressing.

Why use chip and seals?

- 1. A chip and seal treatment costs considerably less than conventional asphalt overlays.
- 2. By extending the time between asphalt overlays, chip and seals result in better return on investment and performance over the long term.
- 3. Chip and seals increase safety by providing enhanced skid resistance.
- 4. Chip and seals provide an effective moisture barrier for the underlying pavement against water intrusion by sealing cracks in the pavement.
- 5. Chip and seals prevent deterioration of the asphalt surface from the effects of aging and oxidation due to water and sun.

Will this process damage my car?

Chip and sealed roads are safe to drive on, but it is important motorists do not exceed 35 mph. Driving 35 mph or less will prevent loose stones from kicking up. While a freshly chip and sealed road appears coarse, the stones will further compact into the road surface over time.



West Hanover Lions Club Awards Scholarship

Maggie's community activities include Rotary Club of Harrisburg Youth Development Team, Capital Area Soccer Association, Eagle FC Club, and Robin Flight Team — a focus group for high school mental health strategies. Maggie also works at Vino Italian Restaurant and Hershey Park, is a volunteer for a local church youth group, and took part in a mission trip to Camp Courage at LifeSong in Haiti.

In addition to annual scholarships, the West Hanover Lions continue to fund local youth athletic teams and facilities, support the West Hanover Senior Van service and provide grants to the Central Dauphin Vision and Autism Support Programs. 
Donald Steinmeier West Hanover Township, Dauphin County 27 years of service

A resident for more than 50 years and member of the board of township supervisors for nearly 30, Donald "Don" Steinmeier is passionate about serving West Hanover Township in Dauphin County.

"Public service is a big thing to me," Steinmeier says. "I enjoy being involved in the community. It has done so much for me so I believe in giving back." Steinmeier is no stranger to the township. In 1971, Steinmeier's wife wanted to open a beauty shop. However, his family lived in Lower Paxton Township, which did not legally permit the operation of a business from a home at the time. Therefore, the family moved to West Hanover Township, which both allowed home businesses and had many activities for his three children.

After moving to the township, Steinmeier became a board member of the Mountain View Swim Club, where other members would discuss the problems in the township. This inspired him to run for township supervisor in 1977. Steinmeier lost that election, as he was running against a party-



endorsed candidate. However, he did not lose hope.

"In 1979, I came back, and a lot of the people accepted the fact that I did get a lot of votes in '77. They asked me, 'Are you going to run again?' and I said, 'Certainly. I'm going to run until I win,'" he says. Steinmeier won the election, becoming a supervisor in 1980 and serving for 15 years.

Keeping up with the community

Steinmeier's service to his community extends beyond local government. In 1995, he resigned from the board of supervisors to go into real estate and Donald Steinmeier says being able to make important decisions and communicate these decisions to the public is one of the most important qualities a supervisor can have.

avoid a conflict of interest. He was also a career education counselor and teacher at Central Dauphin High School for four decades until he retired in 1993. However, he actively applied his passion for municipal government in his other careers. As a real estate agent, he helped others in the field with their questions about zoning ordinances. As a teacher, he encouraged students to become local representatives.

"I had just about every social studies teacher who taught problems of democracy to seniors invite me into their classroom to discuss how to become a township supervisor and get involved in your township," Steinmeier says. "I got some paperwork from the county board of elections, and I passed it around the classroom, showing the students how to become a candidate. Some actually did run for school board and later supervisors in other townships."

Beyond his service on the board of

township supervisors, Steinmeier is also involved in other aspects of local government. In the past, he has been part of the parks and recreation, zoning hearing, water and sewer authority, and municipal authority boards. He also ensures he donates to charities and previously coached football, baseball, softball, and basketball in the community.

Stacey Connors, the chair of the West Hanover Township Board of Supervisors, says that Steinmeier's involvement in his community is especially beneficial for the board.

"He keeps a pulse on the community," she says. "He meets with people all the time to discover what they want from the board and the things that concern them. He stops into the township office frequently, so he's able to communicate those concerns to our township manager and the rest of the staff."

Qualities of a strong supervisor

Steinmeier says being able to make important decisions and communicate these decisions to the public is one of the most important qualities a supervisor can have. For example, he recalls when the state issued a public sewer mandate in his township in the 1980s. However, some of the community was not pleased with the mandate.

"I had to deal with a lot of people who were very upset," Steinmeier says. "I had to listen to what they had to say. That's another thing — you have to be a good listener. When the public came to meetings and complained, I had to tell them no, we have to move forward with public sewer. If people don't like to make decisions, they should not be a township supervisor."

Although supervisors must handle large decisions like adopting a public sewer system, other decisions are more routine. One of the first actions Steinmeier took as a township supervisor was to post the list of current bills on a bulletin board rather than reading them out at the start of each meeting. While this decision was small, it saved substantial amounts of time during meetings.

Passion is also vital to bring to a supervisor role. Steinmeier says one reason he has served as a township su-

How PSATS has helped this Hall of Famer

Steinmeier has relied on PSATS' advice over his 27-year tenure as a township supervisor, especially when he has legal problems or questions about ordinances. He also enjoys attending the Annual Conference.

"PSATS is a great organization because they help solve problems for local government," he says. "I look forward to the PSATS conference every year, and I'll be there this year. The board has designated me as a voting delegate for the last 10 years."

pervisor for so long is to share his and his wife's dream of running a business from the home.

"I came to West Hanover because it had a more open-door policy on home occupations," Steinmeier says, "and I always pledged I would try to keep the home occupation idea in existence as long as I'm on the board."

Looking to the future

In 2010, the community again requested Steinmeier run for township supervisor after a 16-year hiatus in real estate so in 2011, he ran for supervisor again and won.

After completing 10 more years of service, Steinmeier, who turns 84 this year, has recently started his last six-

year term on the board. Once retired, he plans to travel and spend more time with his family: his wife, three children, six grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren. He also plans to stay active in his community and is excited to continue enjoying West Hanover Township's thriving recreation programs, including an indoor flea market, craft fairs, and a monthly senior luncheon.

Reflecting on his time in West Hanover Township, Steinmeier says time has flown by.

"I have been quite involved in every aspect of life out here in West Hanover Township," he says. "I look back at this point in my life and wonder where did the time go?" •

BUILDING PERMITS Residents are reminded that ALL building permits require a FINAL INSPECTION to closeout the permit. It is the homeowner's responsibility to make sure a final inspection is scheduled and completed.

BURN PERMITS A Burn Permit is necessary anytime you want to burn on your property. The permits are only valid for one burn. Each individual burn requires a new, signed permit. Burn permits are available at the Township Building and on the Township website. If caught burning without a permit, or burning items that are not allowed, you will be subject to legal action.

COMPLAINTS All complaints must be submitted to the Township in writing on a Township issued Complaint Form. Forms may be picked up at the Township Office, or downloaded from the website at www.westhanover.com. All complaint forms must be filled out completely and signed by the resident. The Township will not investigate any anonymous complaints.

FRIENDLY REMINDER All properties with on-lot septic systems must have their systems pumped every four (4) years. A report from the pumper/hauler must be sent to West Hanover Township. Please call the Township at 717-652-4841 for a complete list of licensed pumper/haulers.
