FROM THE PASTOR'S PEN



⁸In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. Luke 2: 8-11

Life certainly gets exciting around the church come Advent and Christmas! Folks are busy with all that goes into making St Paul a Christmas wonderland. There are smiles on faces and an extra bounce in steps. We look forward to what's next in the festive agenda before us. Oh, don't get me wrong, it's a lot of work, worry, and extra effort. But, somehow, we all seem to think it's worth it.

A perfect example is our Hanging of the Greens Service this year. The Advent folks swarmed the church right after Thanksgiving, decorating every nook and cranny with lights and glitter. Sharon did an outstanding job planning a meaningful worship experience involving people from all over the church. The musicians, soloists, choirs, Gentry Ringers, readers, all prepared rehearsed, and performed their assignments with skill and inspiration. And weren't the children's and young people's contributions something we will always remember?

On the surface, it's all very easily explained – it's Christmas after all. But I'm wondering if there might be a little more to the heightened sense of anticipation and excitement if we look a little deeper. Our celebration of Christmas was set arbitrarily by the early Church. If the "shepherds were in the fields keeping watch over their flocks by night," Jesus was likely born in the spring, not the winter. The season of Advent was established as a

season of preparation for Christmas mirroring the season of Lent that prepares us for Easter. Even December 25th was assigned having more to do with the winter solstice than historical fact. The Christmas season is what it is because we decided to celebrate it then. I'd like to suggest that a significant part of the current "spirit" we feel this time of the year, is that we decided to come together expecting "Christmas" to happen and then worked to make it so

I remember a sentimental and frankly naïve song I've heard: "Why Can't Every Day Be Christmas?" Maybe it' can't be, but why can't every Sunday at St Paul be characterized by pews filled with people who come expecting something special will happen? Why can't every Sunday at St Paul be a celebration of the grace of God Who cared so much for each of us, He sent His Son among us? Why can't January and March 25th find me as fired up as December 25th?

Sure, the decorations might be less, and as important as they are, are they really what fuels and sustains our faith? I don't think so. In the final analysis, what makes Christmas at St Paul so special is that the people of St Paul work together to make your church all that it is this time of year. And when you do, Christ comes to us (Advent) and will be born anew in any heart that openly receives Him (Christmas). True to His name Emmanuel, (God with us), Jesus shows up (where two or three are gathered in my name I am in the midst) His presence makes each week a "potential Christmas" if each of us decides to make it so.
