CONSERVATION

THOUGHTS ON SCENT

While at the Philadelphia Flower Show, a couple of us were in front of a plant that made us back up; it smelled foul. In another environment it would have attracted flies to pollinate it.

But scent can lift your spirits, magically. It is elusive, sometimes there, sometimes not. Sometimes you must stick your nose in a flower and sniff, which you really can't keep up for very long. Sometimes it's there on a breeze, but gone if you enthusiastically have a big sniff to try to catch it again. Sometimes it needs warmth. Sometimes it ages horribly. Sometimes people hate it. Can't bear lilies? I can't get enough - but it's still guite elusive after the first burst. Violets especially wicked - they numb your nose so you just can't have a second go.

And, in the garden, too many things which are scented, or reputed to be scented, are at your feet and quite inaccessible to a nose, five feet up. However, one can cut flowers and move them up closer to one's nose and the scent can please your nose for a few days. This time of year, Hyacinths

can be in a pot and later planted outside for next year's beauty in the garden and deer are not fond of them. If you have Mahonia in your garden, bring in some blooms. It will keep the flowers from going to seed and will give you some daily scent pleasure. Witch Hazel is another fragrant addition to the garden this time of year as well as some Camellias which can be stunning when you suddenly come across one in bloom.

On a warm summer evening I love walking by 4 O'Clocks in the garden as they can envelop one in their lovely scent and they attract many bugs and hummingbirds to them. I have watched hummingbirds early in the morning going to 4 O'Clocks to catch the bugs that fell asleep in the flowers and the flowers often stay open until 10 AM.
