(BCP265; Ash Wednesday)

Dear Good Shepherd Family,

Because our next newsletter won't be out before Ash Wednesday, I want to ponder Lent with you this time.

I want to reverse the usual Lenten trend and ask you to add something for the season, not take something away. Would you consider the practice of a Wednesday noon Eucharist and healing service? Beginning Wednesday, Feb 14th, Good Shepherd will have a traditional Episcopal noon Eucharist with a healing litany and anointing.

There are three things that every Episcopalian should do as an Anglican pattern of life. The first is to read scripture each day; the second is to come to the communion table each week; and the third is to get through the church year every year by following the calendar and its celebrations and traditions.

If you are like the rich young ruler who responded to Jesus, "All these things I have done from my youth," then good for you! Now comes the addition. Would you consider inviting someone who has never attended an Episcopal church service to attend a Wednesday Eucharist with you?

What is so special about this new service, you may ask? It is a short and low-stakes introduction to the Eucharistic liturgy in a traditional setting, and it is the chance for you to bring a hurting friend to a healing service that is very per-

sonal and tactile. I cannot tell you how many people, coworkers, and friends with whom I have met and attended weekday services. Afterward, over coffee or lunch, their stories would come pouring out. It was healing for them and a chance to offer Christian presence to them as I accompanied them. Many would later return to the Church to explore a Sunday service. Wednesday Eucharists are the gift that keeps on giving!

Here is my prayer for you this Lenten season 2024:

"Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth: Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen."

For Lent, let us resolve to share this experience with others. That includes the people you know who have wandered off during COVID-19, even (dare I say) if they are currently attending somewhere else. Let's woo them back!

Port Jervis PD celebrates Ronnie Gioia's retirement

Port Jervis. Gioia served many years as a crossing guard and a police matron for the department.



On January 3, the Port Jervis Police Department bid a fond farewell to longtime employee Ronnie Gioia upon her retirement. According to the announcement, Gioia started working with the Port Jervis Police Department on October 23, 2012, in the capacity of a school crossing guard, which she held until July 19, 2021. She also served as a police matron from September 22, 2014, to December 31, 2023, which involved conducting searches of female prisoners, supervising their safety, serving meals, and accompanying female prisoners to and from courts.

"She honorably and professionally served the residents of our community with devotion and distinction, whether safeguarding the lives of our young children walking to school or serving as a police matron being subject to call-out throughout the day and overnight hours to provide for the care, custody and control of female prisoners incarcerated at the Port Jervis City Police Department," the department said in its farewell message to Gioia.

"Ronnie's dedication to public safety in our community is commendable and we greatly appreciate her service. On behalf of the City of Port Jervis, we wish you the best of happiness and good health in your well-deserved retirement."
