## SPOTLIGHT ON LOIS WIDLY



Lois Widly is a force to be reckoned with, even at the young age of...well it's not nice to disclose a women's age. But many of us have had the pleasure of her company as a neighbor, a friend or as a past President of OPAWL. To know Lois is to understand where she gets her never ending energy and passion for OPA. So, I set out to interview her to find out how she came to live in OPA and how she became the past President of OPAWL, not just for 1 term but for 3 terms!

Earlier this month, my son and I knocked on her door and were quickly greeted and whisked inside by her husband, George, followed by the open arms of Lois. They adore my son and have known him from the day he was born, babysitting him at times. After our hugs we were ushered into the kitchen and sat at their table and promised appetizers and tea. The clacking of dishes occasionally disrupted the small talk we were having with George, forcing him to look up and let out a small laugh. "She has much more energy than me. She never sits down" he states. It is this energy that Lois possesses that has transcended into all she does.

They lived for a bit in Italy where their 3 kids where born, a daughter and two sons. At the time, Lois did not speak Italian but as George put it, "You may have noticed, Lois loves to talk. It took her all but a day and a half to learn Italian. Nothing was going to stop her from being able to talk to those people". Yes, that is Lois, especially being a Nurse, she loves people. When they moved back to the states from Italy because of a job offer George got in Anaheim, they were on the hunt for a home. While George worked in Anaheim, a real estate agent would drive Lois around with her 3 young children in the backseat, looking for their dream home. Lois didn't like the places in Orange that she was seeing and finally the real estate agent told her, "Well, I'll take you some place that is little bit different." "I didn't know what the heck he meant. So, he brings me out here to OPA and I thought, oh this is heaven. I love this place!", she states. There was a house on each end of what is now their street and several empty lots. So, they bought an empty lot and hired a builder because George had already drawn up plans while living in Italy. It took them 5 years to build their home, partly because George built 3 prototypes of their kitchen, living with the mock kitchen for 3-4 months and then George would break it down, rebuild a new model, and live with the new model for another 3-4 months. That is one patient women which George recognized.

As their children grew, Lois got busier and busier with them. She was even Goat Leader and very involved with 4-H and at one time they had 70 goats and 6 pigs. Wow! That was a lot of organization of scheduling for meals, milking and making cheese. Little did she know that those skills she was learning would come in handy in the future when she would become President of OPAWL.

Lois got involved with OPAWL when a neighbor down the street invited her to a progressive dinner. She was not very active in the beginning because she was very busy raising her children. But then one year, she rose to the challenge when no one else stepped up to be President, becoming a shaker and mover and making things happen. She was known for meeting a lady who recently moved into OPA and immediately inviting them to become a member. That is how I met her. Within weeks of moving into my home down the street from her, she knocked, introduced herself and invited me to a holiday party at her home. That was the start of our now almost 17-year friendship.

Under her leadership, much of the money raised in the fundraisers went to OPA for the trails and the white fencing. She directed garage sales, home tour fundraisers, Secret Santa for Camp Pendleton families, St Patty's Day fundraisers, and so much more. But her claim to fame is the

monuments at the corner of Orange Park and Chapman were erected. This passion project was her last project as President of OPAWL and it was her persistence and connections that took the unsightly corner to what it is today, statuesque marquees with the OPA logo, bench for the bust stop, trails for pedestrians and horse riders and drought tolerance landscape. It is affectionally known today as the Pony Park because as residents and guests drive into OPA or drive out of OPA, they are waved to by children riding a pony.

When I asked her, what is it about OPA Women's League that made you stay and be involved for so long? Lois reflected and responded, "I really felt part of OPA and I love bringing people together and that is what we were doing...we were bringing the women of OPA together to know one another. I think it makes such a difference because if you don't know the women here outside of your next-door neighbor, I think that's such a shame because they are really missing the whole blessing of this community."

#### Pack Walkers


