PUBLIC SERVICE AN HONOR FOR BROTHER DAVE ARGALL, LYCOMING '78

Brother David Argall, a 1978 initiate from the Gamma Rho Chapter at Lycoming College, represents the 29th District in as a State Senator in Pennsylvania. The district includes 94 municipalities ranging from the farms and growing Berks County suburbs of Reading to the anthracite coal "patch towns" of northern Schuylkill County.

Brother Argall's legislative priorities include enabling meaningful job growth and revitalizing struggling downtowns and older industrial neighborhoods in his district.

One of his proudest moments as state senator is helping recreate and refurbish something near and dear.

"I helped to transform a vacant, decaying junior high school in my hometown of Tamaqua, PA where my parents once taught into a branch campus of Lehigh Carbon Community College," he said. "Since that day, the number of local high school students moving on to higher education has greatly increased, giving so many people new opportunities."

While proud of his accomplishments to this point, Argall knows there is much left to be done.

The areas for which Brother Argall serves are dense in anthracite coal, and for decades, these areas have faced economic decline due to evolving methods of production and increasing sources of energy. For Argall, this is a hugh challenge, but one that could yield real opportunity.

"Many of the communities which I represent really suffered due to the decline of the anthracite coal and railroad

industries in the last century," he said. "My goal is to continue to breathe new life into those old towns through expanded educational and job opportunities and by fighting blight and decay."

Throught these obstacles, Argall and the citizens in his district have become resilient; a trait needed in the most influencial leaders during the most influencial times. Brother Argall's leadership skills have been sculpted over many years, starting at a young age.

"In my teens, I learned a lot in my Scout troop and then in many different organizations at Lycoming College, including Alpha Sig," Argall said. "I learned how to work with other people toward a common goal."

In fact, it was Argall's fraternity brothers who offered him the support he needed at the inception of his career in public office.

In 1984, when I was 25 years old, many of my Gamma Rho chapter brothers traveled hours to help me campaign during my first race for the PA House of Representatives," he said. "I will never forget their loyalty and their willingness to lend a hand when I really needed assistance. To me, that demonstrated the best that a fraternity can represent."

Brother Argall is in his 12th year as a state senator. His resume is as impressive as his drive to improve his community. For him to credit the Fraternity with even a part of his success illustrates that Alpha Sigma Phi in fact can Better the World through Better Men, one district at a time.

That route will take the 2016 Trine University civil engineering graduate to the top level of his sport as he competes on the United States Olympic men's rugby sevens team at the Tokyo Olympics next week.



In a year like nothing any of us have experienced, the very definition of "normal, everyday life" shifted dramatically. Everything from work to school to travel and even simply going to the store changed. As many of us started to get used to working at home or having groceries delivered after ordering online, undergraduates around the country had to find a way to get used to a new idea: how do you recruit new members virtually?

While state and local guidelines varied across the country, many of our chapters were forced to completely re-think their plans on recruitment, new member education and even ritual due to COVID and mitigating the risk of spreading it via in-person events. At the University of Oregon, the Theta Theta chapter proved that this is not only possible, but can be done with grand success.

"COVID had us enter the year with a bleak outlook, but we did not give in. Through the tremendous efforts of our brothers, national office, alumni, and families, we were able to turn this year into a success," stated Chapter President, Max Albrecht. One of the leaders of those efforts was VP of Recruitment, Troy Munson. Though he had not gotten much practice with leading recruitment, he set out to ensure that all events they were able to host (virtually, of course) were as engaging as possible and allowed for both Brothers and New Members to talk with one another.

"The school forbade any in-person rush whatsoever so we had to conduct rush entirely virtually. I didn't want the events to feel one sided, like the brothers were just talking at the PNM's rather than having a conversation,' recalls Munson. To counter this, Brother Munson talked about the event he found to be most effective: Alpha Sig Hypotheticals.

"For this event I made a sheet of a bunch of hypotheticals and gave them to each breakout room leader. They then went down the list discussing each one. These hypotheticals ranged from comedic ones like 'Who would win in a fight? A silverback gorilla or a grizzly bear?' to more serious ones like 'If money wasn't a concern where would you live, what would you do, and what would your lifestyle look like?' This allowed for the brothers to share a little bit of their personality to the PNM's, and vice versa."

These efforts by Brother Munson and the rest of Theta Theta Chapter yielded 29 accepted bids for the year; 13 during fall/winter and 16 in the spring.

"The greatest takeaway from this year that I think contributed significantly to our success is that while much can be achieved alone, so much more is possible when we admit we need help and work together. This translated to all facets of leadership and fraternity operations, from mental health to logistical matters. We are truly our strongest when we are with our brothers," said Brother Albrecht. He also noted that the chapter redoubled their efforts in recruitment and philanthropy dollars raised, greatly exceeding past performances. They also enhanced their family and alumni newsletters to increase engagement.

The persistence and attitude of the Theta Theta Chapter is certainly one of note, and typifies the use of the Phoenix as the symbol of Alpha Sigma Phi.

In a time where our country and the rest of the world were aflame with the terrible effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, these young men were able to rise from the ashes and maintain the strong bonds of brotherhood while safely and successfully growing their chapter base so that the Old Gal will remain a steadfast pillar of the Greek community at the University of Oregon.

ALLAN MENSE arizona '64 a distinguished life of achievement and brotherhood

Becoming either the Chief Scientist for President
Ronald Reagan's Strategic Defense Initiative, a vice
president of the Florida Institute of Technology or the
Principal Engineering Fellow for Raytheon Missile
Systems would likely be the highlight of someone's
professional journey. For Brother Allan Mense, Arizona
'64, these roles are just part of his distinguished career.

The son of a secretary and cab driver, Mense did not grow up with riches. However, it was evident while attending West Phoenix High School that Mense had a passion for math and technology. He recieved in-state scholarships to Arizona State University and the University of Arizona. Ultimately, Mense decided to attend the University of Arizona because it was the larger engineering school and it was only a couple of hours from his home.

Mense did not join the fraternity his freshman year because of his studies, despite being interested in Greek Life the moment he stepped on campus. He was an only child and always wanted siblings. The Fraternity would provide him with that comradery.

"The high school buddies I had joined big fraternities.

That was a time in Greek Life when fraternities were very

strong," he said. "I was hesitant. I was going to be an engineer and that would take a lot of time. I was looking for a smaller fraternity and one in which the members were a little older."

Many of the Greek alumni were ex-Gls who had returned after serving in Vietnam. Mense was later initiated as Roster No. 69 for the Gamma lota Chapter. During his time as an undergraduate, he served as the HJP and the HSP. In addition, Mense also served in the Air Force ROTC, where he expanded his skillset in motivating others.

"Having the experience of being in the fraternity and being the fraternity president got me involved in the University in like a VIP-kind of situation," he said. "When I graduated, I had confidence I could lead a group of people. I had confidence in those areas – maybe more than ability."

This leadership experiences signaled to Mense that he would thrive in an individual contributor-type role. After earning his Bachelors in Engineering Physics, Mense would earn his Masters in Nuclear Engineering at the University of Arizona before attending the University of Wisconsin for a Ph.D. in Nuclear Engineering.

After three years as a research scientist at Oak Ridge National Laboratory, in which he served as the principal investigator in the Fusion Energy Division, Mense got his first taste of Washington D.C. on the Senior Scientific Staff of the Science and Technology Committee of the US House of Representatives.

"You had to explain scientific things to Congressmen in eighth-grade English," he said. "That was quite the experience. It honed my executive skills. I had to take in information and distill it down to a few paragraphs."

Mense described his role as being one of those young staffers running behind committee members, handing them notes and questions to ask witnesses in hearings that viewers may see on the news.

After four years with McDonnell Douglas Astronautics Co., Mense was selected to serve on President Reagan's Strategic Defense Initiative, better known as the Star Wars initiative. As the Chief Scientist, Mense was responsible for the "technical direction" of the \$3 billion/year budget. While never having briefed President Reagan directly – that was the responsibility of the Generals in the Department of Defense – he did brief Vice President George H.W. Bush, the public, foreign governments, the press and members of Congress.

Following this position, Mense was named Vice President for Research at the Florida Institute of Technology, which he said was probably the position he enjoyed the most.

"Since it was a private non-profit, we weren't big. But it was still the largest private technical college in the southeast," he said. "I was one of the youngest vice presidents for research in the country."

Stints as a consultant to government agencies, a visiting scholar at MIT, at the Industrial & Management

Systems Engineering Department at Arizona State
University and the lead systems engineer at Motorola
led him to his 19 years with Raytheon Missile Systems.
After retiring in July 2019, Mense returned to the start
of his career: the University of Arizona.

He's currently an adjunct professor for Systems & Industrial Engineering and conducts research for the University.


When the Gamma lota Chapter was restarted in 2011, Mense was eager to assist. He took a true advisor and consultant approach because of his experience as an undergraduate with alumni. During the re-start, there were a few members of the first two or three classes who were active in advising the re-founders.

"When I was president, we didn't have a good alumni group. They were too nosy," he said. "I looked at it as being an officer-lead experience."

Being involved with the undergraduates reminded Mense of his past experiences as a leader in the Fraternity, which he was able to share with the newer members.

"Being an officer in Alpha Sigma Phi and having an opportunity to go to conferences was a great networking experience with people who had similar responsibilities," he said. That kind of kick started my career because I had confidence in myself. Doing the things I did, and getting involved by being an officer is an experience that you can seldom get in college."

The confidence Mense gained as an undergraduate leader in Alpha Sigma Phi fueled his path to a distinguished career of service, innovation and research that included 59 published works and three patents. He's a man of great integrity and has shown continued commitment to the Old Gal and the young men of our fraternity. For He's an Alpha Sig.





"If you would have told me by 28 years old I'd be in this position I've been dreaming about," Roumeliotis said, "I wouldn't have believed you."

His experience with NBC Sports Chicago began with an internship during what he described to be a "hectic" senior year at Elmhurst. In addition to the internship his senior year, Roumeliotis was also involved with the radio, newspaper and stayed on top of his classes.

He worked his way up at NBC Sports Chicago from intern to Blackhawks Insider in October 2019, a dream come true for a lifelong fan. Now with 15,000 followers and a blue checkmark on Twitter, Roumeliotis is truly living his dream.

"I grew up watching this sport and this team,"
Roumeliotis said. "I truly feel like I do not work
when I go to my job. All of it is rewarding. Even if I
weren't being paid to be here, I would want to be
there. It's exactly where I would want to be."

Roumeliotis' gameday routine, in non-pandemic impacted seasons, includes going to the game, speaking with players in the locker room and writing stories in the media room. In normal years, he'd travel as the team traveled, but road game media availabilities were conducted via Zoom.

"You miss the face-to-face interactions," he said.

While the benefits and joys of the job are plentiful, there is one part that is not so enjoyable.

"The worst part of my job is transcribing interviews," he said. "If you get one of the guys or the general manager and you're talking to them for 30 minutes, it's a few hours to compact that."

His interest in making sports journalism his career grew greatly during his time at Elmhurst. His first radio show, C&J Sports, aired from 10-midnight and was co-hosted with fraternity brother Jeremy Ried, Elmhurst '07, who is now the Senior Director of Alumni Engagement and Chapter Operations of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

This and similar connections with brothers are one of the greatest benefits Roumeliotis sees in his time as an undergraduate.

"I am so grateful. I can't pinpoint one thing or one moment," he said. "The best part of the fraternity was the entire experience. It's a lifelong bond you build."

While an undergraduate, Roumeliotis served as Sergeant-at-Arms and Brotherhood Retention Director. In addition to the Fraternity and leadership experiences with the organization, the institution itself allowed him to shine and cultivate his craft.

"Elmhurst isn't really known to be a sports school, but it allowed me to stand out and build relationships," he said. "I was a larger fish in the Elmhurst pond."

Entering college, Roumeliotis said that Greek Life was not something that he was looking for. It took a friend of his to convince him to join Alpha Sigma Phi, and he is thankful for the experience that it gave him, especially when he needed it most during that stressful, yet rewarding, final year of college.

"Elmhurst was very reassuring about Greek Life being different," he said. "I have no idea what I would have done or where I would have been."

In the Words of Colby Kreider, Maine '18



Going into freshman year of college, I lived in a single dorm. I was diagnosed with touretts, depression and anxiety when I was in high school. I wasn't having a good time in college. I considered dropping out either at the end of freshman year or sooner, and I didn't have many friends. So, I thought maybe joining a fraternity would be good for me.

I rushed a few fraternities, but because of my touretts, I twitched a lot. They'd be like "oh, you twitch, we'll call you Twitchy." I really didn't like that, so I waited a few weeks and saw a post from Scott Sleeper, Maine '16, on our class of 2020-21 Facebook page talking about joining a fraternity where you can start it as a Founding Father.

I thought that sounded really interesting, so I went to an event at The Roost. I walked in super nervous, so I was obviously twitching, both vocally and facially. None of the guys said anything about it. They were having a conversation. They looked me in the eye. They didn't focus on my neck popping out or my one twitching eye. They just had a conversation.

That's when I knew I really wanted to join Alpha Sig.

About two weeks after I was initiated, Scott Sleeper, our chapter president at the time, offered me the VP of Service & Philanthropy position. I was really excited because I was a new brother, and they were taking a chance on me. They taught me how to approach businesses and ask them for donations, how to explain to them what we're doing, and how to plan an event from start to finish.

From there, I went on to holding the position as VP of Service & Philanthropy for another year, then I was VP of Finance. Through that position, I joined the Interfraternity Council where I held the VP of Scholarship my junior year and then Executive Vice President my senior year for IFC.

Now, I'm going to grad school next year. Through the experience and struggles I had to overcome, I'm going to be back here at the University of Maine as a grad student. I couldn't have gotten here without the help of my chapter and I look forward to being an alumnus so I can help the brothers to come.

And every brother said they were.




decision to say for sure I wanted to come to Westminster.

There's no other way to spin it. The COVID-19

Pandemic took an immediate and lasting toll on all of us, and the last year and a half has felt like a lifetime to some. But as we inch toward our return to normalcy, we take a look at how Alpha Sigma Phi managed operations during this pandemic, what success has looked like for our chapters, and how the Old Gal has endured through an event that we will all remember for the rest of our lives.

When COVID-19 arrived on our shores early in 2020, the level of uncertainty was at an all-time high. Brotherhood as we knew it was about to change, and the Fraternity came to grips with that reality almost immediately.

The middle of March 2020 marked the official beginning of the pandemic in the United States and Canada. Sporting events were cancelled, offices and restaurants closed, and students were sent home from campus. Within 48 hours, Alpha Sigma Phi's leadership team begin planning for life in the COVID-19 era, not knowing how brief or how long that era would last.

Within a week, the Fraternity was adding virtual brotherhood resources on its website and social media platforms. These COVID-specific resources helped our undergraduate men stay connected in ways they may or may not have considered on their own. The message was simple; we can maintain our brotherhood by adopting a victor mentality, avoiding the ever so easy mentality of victim during a time of unforseen uncertainty.

The world was now virtual. Our brothers were holding chapter meetings on Zoom, playing in gaming tournaments on Twitch and having coaching calls with staff members on FaceTime. Our world had changed, but the groundwork was laid early to succeed despite the pandemic.

It was important for Fraternity Headquarters to exhibit the victor mentality it had preached to its undergraduate members up to this point. Now, looking back on the last year and some change, Alpha Sigma Phi can say with confidence that the majority of its chapters and volunteers were on board from the start. On pages 19 and 21, you can see how a few of our chapters navigated the pandemic in the words of our chapter leaders and volunteers.





In the Words of Hayden Jaco, Murray State '18 // President of the Delta Tau Chapter

I am most proud of the willingness to adapt by the men of Delta Tau. Each brother knew the importance of staying connected to further our success internally and externally. The brothers of Delta Tau prioritized health and safety while continuing to schedule small group brotherhood events. To ensure the growth of our chapter, the brothers of Delta Tau revised our recruitment plan to accommodate COVID-19 safety mandates. By doing this, we recruited twenty-five new members and had the largest fall 2020 recruitment class on campus.

At Delta Tau we focused heavily on small brotherhood groups, to abide by COVID-19 restrictions. Every two weeks we would randomize our roster and create groups of eight, each group was given fifty dollars to help pay for a social event that stayed within COVID-19 safety restrictions. Many brotherhood groups went golfing, bowling, grilled-out, or went out to eat at a restaurant. We found this to be very successful to keep brothers connected and comradery alive within our chapter.

For many students, the transition from in-person classes to online classes was difficult. The men of Delta Tau were no different. Overall as a chapter, our GPA decreased. To effectively improve our grades we created the "Best Big-Little Tournament". A duo must have the best term GPA, lowest chapter dues balance, and highest community service hours recorded to win the Big-Little tournament. The winners were given a large trophy, with their names engraved on it, and displayed at the chapter house. The tournament was made to incentivize our members, improve our GPA, increase dues collected, and grow our community service hours recorded.

The men of Delta Tau are eager to be back on campus for in-person events. For many of us, on-campus events are our favorite part of college. We hope to win the Gold Cup in intramural sports, compete in sorority philanthropy events, host Alpha Sig Olympics and Greeks Got Talents, attend in-person recruitment, go on large brotherhood retreats, and have an awesome formal. We have high hopes the next year will be very exciting times in our lives and we are very eager to share those moments as a brotherhood. At Delta Tau, we understand all of these fun events are important, but we must continue to focus on our academics, involvement on campus, and our community. We will continue to work hard on our chapter and keep our values from decade to decade, so when we come back as alumni we can always say, "Proud to be a Sig."



In the Words of Jacob Legallais, Virginia Tech '18 // President of the Delta Upsilon Chapter

I am most proud of the chapter for managing to uphold a positive and optimistic mindset during the 2020-2021 academic year. From our new members all the way through to the Prudential Board, brothers never resorted to feeling sorry for themselves or giving in to the struggles brought about by COVID-19. Rather, they stayed as involved in chapter activities as possible, continuing to participate via chapter meetings and other events such as philanthropies. Brothers took it upon themselves to communicate with and support each other. As a result of this mindset, I have seen the chapter's excitement grow as we move closer to returning back to our normal operations.

Our chapter had grown to a size at which we were able to quickly adapt to the rules and guidelines placed upon us by the state and the university. The brothers who lived in the chapter house interacted with each other while keeping outside contact to a minimum. Brothers who lived near to each other out in town did the same. This way, we were able to maintain the critical function of in-person social interaction that is necessary for a brotherhood to flourish while obeying the ever-changing directives of our government and institutions. In lieu of formal chapter events, these small but frequent gatherings were responsible for keeping our brotherhood alive.

The inability to engage as a complete chapter carrying out normal activities was the greatest challenge faced by the brothers this year. Although we were able to conduct minimal gatherings and a fraction of the events we would typically participate in, brothers were not able to witness the chapter out in full force—nearly 90 of us—doing what we joined to do, whatever that may be at a given time. As our recruitment efforts have resulted in a series of large, successful new member classes and our member count has exploded, brothers have become proud of where we have taken the chapter in such a short period of time. It was difficult this year for our brothers, especially the newer ones, to realize and fully appreciate how far our hard work has brought us. Yet they stayed committed and motivated, and as a chapter president I could not have asked more of them.

My goals for this next school year are geared towards our chapter leadership, the Prudential Board. We are nearing a critical point at which the chapter is eager to pick up right where we left off pre-COVID. Our chapter officers must meet the demands of all the responsibility that comes with the increased events, heightened inter-organization communication, and logistical elements that will be present with returning back to normal. But, they must proceed cautiously: we cannot afford the failures that result from an inability to rein in the more-than-enthusiastic chapter members or a grave lack of planning. My goal for chapter officers is for them to acquire all the tools necessary to ensure they are truly comfortable in their roles and are ready to return back to normal. They can accomplish this through talking with previous chapter officers, consulting with our chapter advisor, or seeking guidance in the university staff who work in the office of Fraternity and Sorority Life.

Below are just a few aspects of Alpha Sigma Phi and how the pandemic has effected each.

CHAPTERS

Only one chapter closed in the past nine months, though about 8-10 chapters will emerge from the pandemic with very low membership.

CLVEN HOUSING

The 2020-21 academic year was the first in CLVEN's existence where it was cash flow positive. Furthermore, 95% of anticipated residents moved in and lived in a CLVEN property last year.

FINANCES

Alpha Sigma Phi has not raised its membership fees and still offers a Price Match Guarantee. The Fraternity reduced expenses (reduced travel, no Grand Chapter), which allowed us not to have to dip into our Reserve Fund, while still providing unrivaled support and services.

FOUNDATION

The 2020 Founders Day Challenge raised more funds, with more donors, than any previous annual campaign in Alpha Sigma Phi's history.

HEALTH & SAFETY


Alpha Sigma Phi reported zero major COVID-related incidents/outbreaks, in large part because of extensive coaching and education by Fraternity Staff/Advisors over the course of the pandemic.

LEADERSHIP PROGRAMS

The Fraternity's officer training program took on a virtual and year-long approach in 2021 that began in January and will conclude in December.

RECRUITMENT

Fewer new members joined Alpha Sigma Phi in the fall than in recent years, which is expected in the climate of a global pandemic. However, the Old Gal recruited more men than the budget projected and membership decline was smaller than many other 20 fraternities.





In the Words of Matthew Posniak, Connecticut '18 // President of the Gamma Gamma Chapter

I'm most proud of my chapter's continued efforts to be leaders in our own chapter, as well as our university's IFC. For example, one of our own brothers (Guilmar Valle) came up with an idea for a new Extended Officer position, the Health and Wellness Chair. The person elected for this role serves as an outlet for brothers to go to for advice, assistance overcoming any mental or physical health issues, as well as someone to talk to anonymously about anything. Many brothers have utilized this new position as a resource already, and we hope to continue that trend. Outside of our own chapter, two of our brothers worked extremely hard and were elected to positions on UConn's IFC Board. Our brother Rudy Kurup was elected IFC President, and our brother Adith Velevan was elected IFC Scholarship Chair. We are all proud of their hard work and efforts to improve Greek life as a whole here at UConn.

We were able to maintain a sense of brotherhood by holding weekly virtual chapter meetings, which helped give everyone a sense of normalcy. Also, as the State of Connecticut and the country began to open up we were able to have small gatherings that were in alignment with current state guidelines. Although small, these get-togethers were important in preserving our brotherhood as a chapter.

The greatest challenge we faced as a chapter was keeping brothers involved and excited about being a part of our fraternity. Due to the strict guidelines in place by Connecticut and the university, we were extremely limited in what we could do together, especially since we had 75 total brothers this past Spring. That being said, we had to find other ways to keep people interested. We did this by making sure our group chats were active and brothers could communicate with everyone openly. Like I mentioned before, we also utilized small gatherings. However, I think the most important thing we did to make sure we maintained high member retention was pairing brothers together based on academic major for assistance in school. This was done by our Scholarship Chair in order to both integrate younger members with older ones, as well as keeping brothers involved with the chapter.

The biggest goal that I have for my chapter moving forward is to bring in a recruitment class of at least 20 members this upcoming Fall. With recruitment hopefully returning to normal, and with 25 seniors graduating this Spring, we are poised to bring in a big class of new members.



In the Words of Max Zeller, Seton Hall '20 // President of the Zeta Alpha Chapter

In spite of the pandemic, we were able to host our annual Miles After Myles event with social distancing on campus. We were able to raise over \$5,000 for the Depression and Bipolar Support Alliance after repeatedly being hampered by Covid guidelines and administrative pushback.

The Prudential Committee and I decided early on that if we were going to maintain a sense of brotherhood we were going to have to stay connected as much as possible. We found success in hosting virtual video game tournaments and social hours.

Obviously, recruitment is always a challenge at a smaller school like Seton Hall, but with administration not allowing us to have in-person rush events, things got even harder. We were able to overcome this by completely restructuring our recruitment strategy and applying it to a virtual environment. Creative online events, increased brotherhood social media usage, and word of mouth became focal points of our efforts which paid off with two great new member classes in both the fall and spring.

With Covid guidelines beginning to subside, our major goal is to reestablish most of our local traditions and events that couldn't happen during the pandemic. Most of our underclassman have not seen the brotherhood before Covid, so the transition back to normalcy is very important.



In the Words of B Bernheim, UNC-Charlotte '80 // Grand Chapter Advisor for the Eta Xi Chapter

The Chapter created an opportunity for Junior/Senior engagement digitally through the Virtual Career Night. At the same time, they also offered opportunities for alumni brothers nationwide to engage meaningfully with young men seeking an upward trajectory. I was pretty proud of them for that.

Eta Xi's greatest challenge was/is Digital Engagement as a way to keep our brotherhood to the front of all things on our undergraduates' tables. Though they got it to a functional level, I really hope they will explore the depth that Digital Engagement can offer even post-COVID.

In closing, I'm not certain that the pandemic is behind us. But accepting that it is, my hope would be the men focus on brotherhood. Every event that Eta Xi does I hope will have a focused brotherhood element first and foremost. I also hope they survey their chapter frequently to ensure what they are creating is what each end user is seeking.

BENEFICIARY DESIGNATION GIFT



AKNUAL GIVINGES



Brother Richard Gibbs, Oklahoma '51, who entered the Omega Chapter in 2018, had served as a dedicated volunteer for both the Alpha Alpha Chapter and the Foundation Board of Directors. Before his passing, Brother Gibbs bequeathed his fraternity ring and made his final donation to Alpha Sigma Phi. In the letter that accompanied his gift, Brother Gibbs recounted that, during the Third Founding fundraising campaign, "any donation over \$5,000 would be celebrated." We can now celebrate every annual contribution above this level in Richard Gibbs' memory.



This society is named for The Alpha Sigma Phi Memorial Fund, now known as the Alpha Sigma Phi Foundation. Formed in 1945, the Memorial Fund collected charitable gifts to be used to support scholarships. In 1963, the Memorial Fund defrayed costs for the fraternity's first educational conference. This support made Alpha Sigma Phi one of the first national fraternities to educational programming to its undergraduate members. Support for educational programming continues to this day through a yearly grant provided by the Alpha Sigma Phi Foundation.



The Golden Era of Alpha Sigma Phi was a phrase coined by past Grand Senior President Rich Ritter, Beta Rho '91, Ohio Wesleyan '13. This era is marked by a period of rapid expansion, with an increase in the number of chapters from 61 to over 175. During this time, the number of alumni, undergraduates, fraternity volunteers, and donors increased exponentially. The Golden Era positioned Alpha Sigma Phi as one of the nation's leading social fraternities.



This society is named in honor of the Fraternity's Grand Senior President, the highest-ranking volunteer within the entire Fraternity. The Grand Senior President leads the Fraternity's Grand Council, which sets Alpha Sigma Phi's goals and strategies.



This society is named after The Tomahawk Magazine, which first appeared in November 1847 at Yale University and remained until the university suspended it in 1852. The Tomahawk has been continuously published since its revival in April 1909 and is the oldest running college fraternity publication.



This society is named for Williams Street, located in Delaware, OH. This street was home to the Alpha Sigma Phi Headquarters Office from 1946 until 1996 and served as the home office for Ralph F. Burns, the Fraternity's longest-serving Executive Secretary.



This society celebrates our heritage and reminds us that we are all connected to one another. The club honors our three founders Louis Manigault, Stephen Ormsby Rhea and Horace Spangler Weiser but also honors the men since Louis, Stephen, and Horace who have started new chapters of Alpha Sigma Phi at colleges and universities around the United States. It is because of these men that the Fraternity thrives today.

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
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
