#### PURCHASE OF LAPTOP COMPUTERS FOR THE GUILD

We live in a wired world. The Guild has a web site and most of our members receive the newsletter via email but the Guild doesn't own a computer. Board members who use computers either use their own personal computer or access one at work. Don Fago has suggested that the Guild purchase at least one laptop computer, and preferably two.

Don is currently Treasurer and he depends on computerized records (including Quicken software) which he keeps on his personal computer. He feels that access to a computer is essential to the position of Treasurer and the transfer to a new Treasurer of all our records would be made much easier and more accurate if they are kept on one computer. He suggests that a second laptop could be used to maintain a historical account of OGG records including Bylaws, newsletters, and manuals for positions as well as Wildcatt software. Members may not be familiar with Wildcatt (see accompanying story) but OGG owns a copy of the computer program that could be placed on both computers for members to use and help in registering plants at Orchid Quest (OQ) and other shows.

Those of you who worked registration at the 2006 Orchid Quest may have noticed how difficult it is to process all of the necessary data on one (borrowed) computer. There are more than 600 plants to be registered. In addition there are issues with the limited number of members familiar with the computer program used for registration. Don suggests that the Guild needs to decide if it will continue to use computers for registration or return to the old paper system. If we decide to go with computers, we need to decide what program we will use. Our present Access database is on Elaine's computer; we need to obtain new software (Access or Excel) for the new computer and then find someone to write the code to adapt it to our OQ registration. Then members must be trained at least a few months in advance of next year's OQ, preferably during the fall so that there is a pool of experienced members available.

We also realized the value of having people pre-register their plants before Friday check in. This would save an enormous amount of time and it can be done using a CD or 3.5" disk. Plant information can be emailed to us via a form created in Word or Excel prior to the show. This information could then be electronically transferred into our Orchid Quest "database". This of course assumes that we have decided not to go back to the paper method of registering the plants.

Don has tentatively budgeted \$1500 for two laptop computers and software, not including a printer. This would come to \$300 per year over a period of 5 years which should be a minimum lifespan of the laptops.

Liz Wood and Liz Barlow also volunteered to investigate the use of Excel as an alternative to Access and the old paper method. If anyone else is proficient in Excel and would like to provide some input, please contact Liz Barlow.

## WIRED WORLD

The Board approved the purchase of a laptop at the May Board Meeting. First the Board appointed a committee to include Don Fago, Jeff Baylis, and Rich Narf. They will submit three different vendor options with various packages/features to the Board hopefully at a meeting to be held right after our monthly meeting on the 21st. We hope to have enough information to make a decision on what to purchase at that point. The Board felt that the purchase of a laptop was justified regardless of the pending OQ '07 registration decision. It will serve as a repository for the guild finances and other pertinent documents (Bylaws, Newsletters, Orchid Quest, Wildcatt, etc). It will allow us to pass along information to new officers

## WHAT IS WILDCATT YOU ASK?

From the Wildcatt website: The list of registered orchid hybrids maintained by the

Royal Horticultural Society has grown to more than 100,000 total entries. There have been well over 50,000 awards granted to orchid species and hybrids in the last 27 years since the Awards Quarterly magazine was first published, with more than 1500 new awards being added each year. Sifting through these publications to find information about particular hybrids can be time consuming.

With the Wildcatt Orchids database you simply type in the first few letters of the hybrid or species you are interested in and its information is immediately displayed. Further specialized parts of Wildcatt allow you to quickly generate genealogies back to species, create progeny lists for any number of generations, find out if a cross has been registered, and more. Any of the lists, graphs or trees that can be generated can also be printed for presentations. Progeny and tree lists can also be printed to a text file.

Wildcatt can also simplify the registration process when our Guild hosts a show. The "quick search" feature lets you quickly look up the name of any registered cross or find the parents of any registered hybrid. Updates are available every six months, allowing Wildcatt to stay current.
