A highlight of the day was a biographical lecture by Hermann Pigors. He arrived in Chicago from New York in 1957, not knowing that he was going to Chicago, the location of the church that sponsored his immigration from Germany. In his early years here, he was an employee of nearby Hausermann's Orchids until he purchased the Dundee property in 1973. These were his reflections on how orchid propagation has changed over the last fifty years.

business in Illinois. Hermann purchased Oak Hill with one greenhouse and a home on five acres. At that time, orchids were imported and grown mainly for cut flowers and corsages, which was Hausermann's primary business. In the 70's Herman also sold a great many house plants and garden supplies. At that time, orchids were imported from the Philippines, Hawaii, Thailand, Indonesia and even Canada. The CITES (International Trade Protection Program) trade restrictions and international fear of pests and viruses have resulted in greatly reduced international trade.

Hermann noted several other economic changes over the past 50 years. Because there have been times when he never received payment for orchids sent abroad, he now asks payment for the orchids in advance. Exporting orchids (for example shipping to Canada) has become more difficult. Overseas shipments cannot be guaranteed, as orchid plants are sometimes held up at customs. Energy costs have increased, decreasing his margin of profit. Competition has intensified since the big box stores started selling orchids.

Cloning is much more labor intensive than raising orchids in flasks from seed; because of this, Thai growers have an advantage in labor costs for cloning, so Oak Hill emphasizes selective breeding and raising orchids from seed. Hermann works hard in his lab to develop new hybrids and improved species lines. He has developed his own growing mixes, a greenhouse pest control system and semi annual mail catalog. During his career he has seen orchid growing change from a cut flower and corsage industry, to today's market for orchid plants sold to individual hobbyists and home growers. He has seen many changes, good and bad, but remains enthusiastic and is an excellent speaker. The urban area around Oak Hill is growing rapidly, but their location near a park and golf course ensure a bit of country feel at Oak Hill.

The skies were cloudy which made walking through the greenhouses comfortable despite it being a summer day. OGG also had a bit of luck that day, winning two of the four door prizes. We hope more of you will be able to attend next year.

Porcelain painting is a form of decoration for porcelains and other ceramics that involves multiple layers of special glazes applied to a piece of previously glazed porcelain or ceramic to form a visual design, often flowers. It is kiln-fired after each layer to set the color. The end result is a rich, permanent design on the piece.

The show, “**Spectrum of Wisconsin Porcelain Artists**” is on display in Gallery II until September 12 and is free.
