serve a wide va-

riety of plants and how they grow. If you can believe it, six plants grabbed my arm and forced me to take them home!

Hermann gave an informal talk covering several subjects. He explained what he has done to reduce cost of operations through the use of several insulation materials, clear plastic for the roof, and which ones worked best at various locations. His cost for natural gas has doubled since last year, sound familiar? His second subject was the time for repotting. To summarize, he suggested the following schedule: November to January - no potting; February the Paphiopedlum's after blooming; March through May the vandacious plants when it is hot, humid and bright; August to October the Phaleanopsis; October the cool growing orchids. Thirdly what does high, medium and low mean as temperature for plant growth? Hermann sets his thermostats to the low temperature and lets the sun heat the greenhouse. If there's no sun that's just fine; not everyday has to be warm. For cool plants the temperature is 55F, intermediate is 60F and warm is 68F.

What I gleaned from Hermann's presentation was a growing concern about costs to the large growers and to the individual grower. We are losing Hoosier Orchids (see accompanying letter) and their contribution to orchid propagation and, as a consequence, their support of orchid growing in Central America. Consider all factors when you purchase that next plant and support those that give us these great plants. If that plant you like so well fails, where will you get a replacement?

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APRIL CHINA VISIT

By now the Olympics have come and gone. My husband Walt had a preview of China this past April 1st — 13th. We arrived in Beijing for the Third Annual International Potato Conference sponsored by CIP (International Potato Center head-quartered in Lima Peru). Walt was one of two scientists from the USA among representatives from 35 countries presenting scientific information to 150 attendees. I was fortunate

to tag along.

Our impressions of China were varied. The country was very excited to be the hosts of the 2008 Olympics. "One World, One Dream" was advertised on the television, at the airport and on billboards. The people are proud of China and were friendly and warm toward us. They were anxious to show off their famous sites such as the Forbidden City, Summer Palace, and Temple of Heaven, which ten years ago tourists would not have been allowed to see. We also saw the "Great

Wall" which had been open to tourists. Much has been done to restore these sites to make them ready for Olympic tourists.

The country is experiencing an economic boom.

Construction workers were working day and night in order to complete the Olympic Village and surrounding structures as well as finish five new subway lines. Elsewhere, we saw many cranes building tall, new apartment buildings in the cities of Beijing and Chengdu. (It is estimated that one quarter of the world's cranes are currently located in China).

A total of 1,500 new automobiles are added to the streets of Beijing daily and bicycle traffic is down. We have heard so much about the pollution in China. When we were there it was variable. Initially skies were clear because there had been a lot of wind before we arrived. The skies in Chengdu seemed more gray and cloudy. Back in Beijing, it was cloudy but after a cold front and rain, the sky was clear again. On our final day, our trip to the Great Wall was gorgeous with clear blue skies and bright sun. China is in hopes that the Olympics will give people of the world enough of a glimpse to encourage tourists to return and explore their country. China has indeed changed.



While Walt was in meetings, I had a chance to explore the

area around the China Agricultural Science Academy (CASA). Near the Plant Pathology Department, there was a complex of greenhouses which CASA sold to private industry because they were too expensive to maintain. This is where I would go to get my 'orchid fix." Numerous vendors sold orchid plants or arrangements of orchids for weddings or funerals. Almost none of the orchids were identified, but I enjoyed them just the same. Surprisingly, one grower was from Taiwan. He explained that relations between mainland China and Taiwan had relaxed so that now he was welcome to sell his





goods in Beijing. Of course I could not bring any of the orchids back with me, but I had the opportunity to take lots of pictures. The prices of the orchid flowers were very reasonable which is perhaps why we saw orchids on display in hotel lobbies and restaurants. Orchids are indeed a universal wonder!

Coming soon —

Beginning next month I hope to have a series of articles about orchid growing in Thailand. Bill Beamish, a Canadian, has lived in Thailand the past eight years. He and his wife probably have 400+ orchids. Their neighbor has more and is mostly interested in the domestic varieties such as Dendrobium, Vanda and Cattleya. They have purchased many domestic varieties but also have collected a number of "wild" species in areas being cleared for agricultural purposes. Prices are quite reasonable there. For example Dendrobium-type orchids run from 40¢ to \$6+ depending on size and "newness." Cattleya are a little more costly at \$2.50 and up, some are extremely expensive.

Nineteen years ago Hoosier Orchid Company moved into our facilities here on the northwest side of Indianapolis, building on a tradition of providing species and fine hybrid orchids that traced back through Sea Breeze Orchids, Great Lakes Orchids and Margaret Ilgenfritz Orchids. We joined our legacy with those of Fred Hillerman, the late Madeline Elder, Steve Stevenson, John Schwind and others. Over these 19 years we have experienced great success in getting to know our customers, providing you with fantastic service as well as fine plants, and the joy of learning about orchids and sharing our love of orchids with you.

It is in recognition of that joy and success that I write to let you know that Hoosier Orchid Company will close as a retail nursery on August 30, 2008. We have enjoyed growing and sharing our orchids, developing new and exciting lines of breeding, discovering new species, speaking to orchid societies, educating our local customers, displaying at shows around the country, making rare species available, and so many other aspects of our business. Our closing is a bittersweet recognition of the changing aspects of the orchid industry and societal trends.

We are in the process of inventorying our plants and breeding program, and will shortly be offering these items for sale. We will be offering groups of plants and flasks for sale first, and then we will be making a general offer of our inventory to the public. Many plants we offer will be from our breeding and display collections gathered over nearly thirty years and will include awarded plants and species otherwise unavailable, as well as new and groundbreaking hybrids, and our flask collection.

Sales of our inventory will be in a deliberate, public way with email and web announcements of offerings at each stage. Until August 30th we will continue our regular business, and sales will continue through our website and at our nursery. Following August 30th we will begin our inventory reduction. You are receiving this letter because you are on our e-mail list. Because we value your business and your friendship you will continue to receive regular updates on our closing offerings. Please notify us by e-mail if you wish to opt out of these updates.






Fall in Love with Orchids, 2008
