Prayool & Anchalee Inboriboon of Natt's Orchids will present "Growing Spectacular Vandas"

Prayool and Anchalee started growing orchids about 40 years ago while they were teaching at the University in Chiang Mai, Thailand. More than 90% of their collections were Vandas and Ascocendas. They came to Chicago in 1974 to further their study at the University of Illinois Medical Center. They started growing orchids again in 1990 and named the business as "Natt's Orchids". Currently, they have more than a thousand Vandas and Ascocendas.

Their presentation will begin with general information on Vandas: how they grow in nature, and how you can tell the good from the bad. Then they will discuss how to grow them in the Midwest, in the house and in the greenhouse.

They will also have plants available for purchase.



Heidi's Growing Conditions for *Oncidioda Chaculatum* 'Golden Pacific'

Water: Every other day with Reverse Osmosis (RO) water and Super-thrive; important to keep pseudobulbs plump.

Food: Every week with Michigan State University (MSU) RO Special Fertilizer; 1 teaspoon per gallon

Light: 8 T-5 Florescent Lights; Light Measurement at plant level taken with a Light Meter: approx. 1000 FootCandles; Received Artificial Light for 14 hours in Winter, and 16 Hours in Summer.

Temperature: 78-82 degrees Fahrenheit

Humidity: 55-65%; I always mist my plant when I water.

Additional Information: I placed the original pot inside a small cymbidium pot. This way, the roots grow down through the cymbidium pot and the pot sits in a saucer of water for additional humidity. The roots are not sitting in water.

LOOKING BACK AT 25 YEARS OF OGG

In the 1980s the orchid society nearest to Madison was in Milwaukee. Local Madison enthusiasts commuted there. It was during one of these commutes in April 1985 when Wayne King was riding with Stan Grand and Milo Gilbertson that they discussed the possibility of forming a local orchid society. Stan offered to get the ball rolling.

With assistance from Olbrich Gardens, Stan sent a letter to “interested orchid enthusiasts” that fall and an initial meeting was held at Olbrich. Over 30 people showed up and the Orchid Growers’ Guild was official formed. Stan was president and George Allez and John Moses was the acting program committee. By the first regular meeting in November at the Memorial Union, by-laws were in place and efforts were well under way to obtain the “Charter of Incorporation” with the state and affiliation with AOS.

At the January 1986 Meeting (Annual Membership Meeting), LeRoy “Pete” Peterson and Les Mieschke, student AOS judges from the WOS discussed ideas for programs, criteria for judging and the first judging of members’ plants occurred. Officers and Board Members were elected and committee chairs appointed. The First publication of judging results was that February. December 1987 Stan finished his term as president and moved away the following June. Subsequently Wayne became president.

The first AOS judged show was held at the end of January 1988 at West Towne Mall (See accompanying article.) Because other orchid societies participated in OGG shows, OGG began to reciprocate. Anne Orcutt volunteered to set up and take down OGG displays with OGG members and continued to do so for five years. The late John Diehl pitched in and it became a dedicated two-person team until they could no longer do so. For the years 1995-97, the Guild also sponsored a fall Mini Show at Olbrich that was not AOS judged.

When the revenue sharing period came to an end, Expo Center leadership decided that, because the Guild’s show was a success, the Guild would need to pay the full cost of the show (but could keep all of the admission receipts). John King’s contact at American Family Insurance led to an exploration of a sponsor for Orchid Quest to provide additional financial assistance. They agreed to sponsor the event and did so for many years. The dreaded blizzard which could cancel the show never occurred. Sponsorship continued and a show never lost money. However, continuing concerns about the cost of parking, spurred an effort to find an alternate site. In surveying the vendors, we found that they were very happy with the show where it was being held and our search did not turn up a better location.

To maintain financial health, as the Expo Center increased its facility charge from year to year, the Guild needed to increase both table fees and admission charges. So far, the increased cost for attendance and table fees has not resulted in significantly lower attendance by either the public or vendors. The decision by Orchid Garden Centre & Nursery to sponsor the next Orchid Quest helps to ensure financial success of Orchid Quest

John Moses, who was the first 3 year OGG Director and chair of the first Program Committee operated his own orchid business “Orchids By Vera.” In 1990, John began appearing on the WPS

radio program “Garden Talk”, fielding questions specifically about orchids and orchid growing. John was the author of several AOS articles on phalaenopsis hybridizing and his hybrids gave John worldwide recognition. This was not a Guild sponsored event but was consistent with the Guild’s public education mission. Ultimately, the Guild and the Orchid Quest Show have benefited from the additional publicity as Garden Talk producer Jim Packard and host Larry Miehler have aggressively promoted Orchid Quest and the selection of dates for the call-in is meant to come just before Orchid Quest.

After 6 years, John arranged for Wayne to replace him on the talk show. With the 2010 call-in program, Wayne will have completed 14 years on Wisconsin Public Radio. Due to various issues, Wayne has asked Chuck Acker to take over the talk program and his debut will be the end of next January.

For its first two years Stan Grande produced the newsletter by typewriter. Beginning with Wayne’s term as President, he began producing the Newsletter on his Commodore 64 computer, then having it copied, folded, and stapled. He continued to produce the Newsletter until 1994 (6 yrs).

Over the next 10 years there was a succession of Newsletter editors, each building on the work of their predecessors. These included Kirk Zentner, Kathleen Johnson, Tony Arment, Arlene King, and Doug Dowling. In these latter years, Microsoft software improved the quality and ease of production. The first colored pictures appeared in the newsletter in 2002. Eventually the newsletter was incorporated into the Guild website.

At the close of 2002, Helen Rawson was the Guild’s first webmaster. In 2005 Brook Johnson took over both the website and the newsletter. He was succeeded by Svetlana Kot as webmaster and Denise Baylis produced the newsletter. In 2009, Gary Brendenmuehl became webmaster.

THE BIRTH OF ORCHID QUEST

For the first ten years, the Orchid Growers' Guild annual orchid show was held at West Towne Mall. The first AOS judged show was in January 1988 with Herman Pigors as chief Judge. There was no inside unloading, but we did have a hospitality room where we always provided food for all vendors, societies and judges. The outside loading and unloading was done during mall hours without much protection from the weather and the show seemed to be during the coldest weekend in January!

We used an empty store for hospitality and for storage. The Guild members provided food for set-up as well as for Saturday and Sunday. The Judges' luncheon was held at a nearby restaurant. The AOS judging was held in the hospitality area. The Guild rented tables for food and displays, and supplied the exhibit barrier ropes

The WT Merchant's Association subsequently conducted a survey of business generated during the show weekend and were satisfied that the show actually was good for business and they provided a subsidy of \$500 thereafter to help meet expenses. There was free parking and no admission fees thus our only revenue was from table rent but there was minimal financial risk to the Guild. New mall owners wanted to rent kiosks in the large corridors so there was no longer room for our orchid show.

About 1996, Kathy Johnson was President of the Orchid Growers' Guild with a new member, Carmen Golde as Vice President and Susan Reed, a former Guild Librarian, and former Board Member, was Treasurer. Kathy had been a show chair at West Towne Mall, so she had knowledge of what was necessary for a successful orchid show. (Kathy also had also been Show Chair for several of our small October shows at Olbrich Gardens.) Carmen came from a business family so she had a good understanding of what it takes to make a show a successful financial endeavor. She also

knew how to interact with businesses and how to negotiate contracts. Carmen spent a lot effort researching, visiting possible locations, meeting with the location owners to find the best site and deal for the new Guild orchid show venue before we settled on the Alliant Energy Center. The three of us met almost weekly to work on details for the new show. Carmen said that she was always looking for that one special orchid, so she asked “Would Orchid Quest be a good name for the Guild’s show?” We all agreed that it was perfect for the Guild’s show at a new location.

The labor was long for it took a number of Guild meetings to have the Guild decide to proceed with an orchid show at the Alliant Energy Center. There was much vigorous discussion, disagreements, and more discussions before it was finally agreed to try this for three years. We did not get a cash donation to help subsidize the show from Alliant Energy Center, but we did get a no-fee contract with us splitting the gate. We had electricity at no extra charge, plus tables, side rooms, drapes and the show ropes (pipes).

But the birth of that first show was a success with many large exhibits from area florists, including exhibits with running water! Carmen had visited many florists and had gotten several to put on huge displays without realizing that only orchids could be used in AOS judged shows. But we could judge them!

Carmen worked closely with Ted Ballweg who was our Alliant Energy contact person. He gave her advice on the maximum to spend on advertising, suggestions on advertising and other aspects of the show. We ran an ad in the newspaper that was also a \$1 off admission coupon. We collected many of these ads at the admissions table, so we knew that people were seeing our newspaper ad. Carmen worked with a TV station to produce and air a TV ad for the show.

Carmen organized the show for two years. She had a folder for each area, such as plant check room, raffle table, etc. with instructions on how many people were needed, what tasks needed to be completed and who was helping. She had set up the process to obtain the necessary permits and the signs for two overpasses in Madison. She arranged to have an Orchidarium as the top Raffle prize for two years, plus many other innovations that we still use today.

After two years, with increasing attendance each year, and making money, some members still were not satisfied with the new location. John Diehl was not happy with the location despite Herman Pigors’ recommendation that we not change the location or date of the show. Every change means loss in attendance. John Diehl was a doer so he proceeded to duplicate all of Carmen’s leg work to find a good show location. John was show chair of a successful Orchid Quest show at ---- you guessed it – Alliant Energy Center. John readily admitted that Alliant Energy Center was the best location after all for the large Orchid Quest show.

Gradually over the years fine tune-ups were done and some steps backwards, but all the time the Guild was learning how to present a successful and profitable orchid show.

Now with Judy Stevenson and Judith Rapacz, we have entered into another great chapter of organization, advertising, thinking outside the box to add new life to the show to continue the tradition of having the best orchid show in the Mid West! But without Carmen’s vision, drive, knowledge, intelligence, hard work and organizational skills, we would not have our annual Orchid Quest.

“ASK ME ABOUT ORCHIDS”

At the 2010 Orchid Quest, we took a survey asking how the public heard about Orchid Quest. Of the 1825 people who attended last year, 1100 filled out the forms for entry in the “door prize” contest. Of that number about 70 % of the attendees told us how they learned about Orchid Quest.



Most interestingly, WORD OF MOUTH (WOM) was the largest and cheapest advertiser of OQ. More than twice as many heard about OQ by WOM versus television, and the newspapers. The radio and the WEB each accounted for 11%. Postcards and posters did not seem to be a significant way people learned about OQ, but they did show some benefit.

The conclusion of the OQ committee is that WORD OF MOUTH is by far the best advertisement of the orchid show. It behooves all of us to wear your "Ask me about ORCHIDS" button on your overcoat from now and until the show in February.
