Paphiopedilum S. Gratrix ('Lemon' x 'Amarillo') grown by Gary Lensmeyer. Registered a century ago, it is a primary slipper orchid hybrid between *Paph bellatulum* and *godefroyae*. The flowers last for about a month. Keep it slightly drier and cooler during the winter months. This paphiopedilum tends to like brighter light than other mottled-leaf paphs.



Rhynchostylis gigantea grown by Lynn West. This species was first described in 1896 by Lindley and occurs in Myanmar, Thailand, Malaysia, Laos, Cambodia, Vietnam, Hainan China, Borneo, Bangladesh and the Philippines. Rhynchostylis differs from Vandas by the one-lobed lip. Rhynchostylis are also commonly called Foxtail Orchids because of their long thin densely packed inflorescences that get up to 37 cm with sweetly fragrant blooms. The inflorescences appear in autumn and winter.



Cymbidium Sarah Jean 'Ice Cascade' grown by Gary Lensmeyer. It will tolerate warmer temperatures and will still bloom well. The pendulous spike habit makes it an excellent hanging plant or displayed in a tall pot. It is easy to grow and flower. East windows in spring and fall and south windows in the dead of winter work best. This plant likes winter nighttime temps from 58 to 63 °F and day temps of 68 to 78°F. Summer temperatures can be warmer as the plant is in active growth. It likes winter nighttime temps from 58 to 63°F and day temps of 68 to 78°F.
