## ANNUAL OGG AWARDS

### From Judy Stevenson

Thus far the Program Committee has not received any names in nomination of those members of OGG who deserve to be honored. If there is someone you would like to be honored, supply their name and the reason. For example, "Outstanding Service" with examples of this service is good. It can be whatever you want to say.

We can give up to two AOS awards per year. The AOS Certificate is now printed out by the AOS in Florida. We need to let them know as soon as possible since the December meeting is when they are awarded.

In addition to the AOS certificate award, two OGG members can receive a special OGG certificate for outstanding service. Lastly, only one member may receive the Orchid Digest Diamond Award (this is a gorgeous crystal). Please get all nominees to the Program Committee so that they can approve nominees.

## ANNUAL CHUCK'S CHALLENGE

More than a dozen (live) plants were submitted for judging. Judy Stevenson had already won for 'First Bloom' as her plant bloomed last summer. Steven Thimling won for the 'Most Unsuccessfully Grown Plant' and Lynn West won for 'Most Robust Plant.' Chuck showed his own entry which fell somewhere in between. Each winner received a \$24 gift certi-

cate from Orchids.

The current challenge, taken up by 32 OGG members, is *Doritis pulcherrima* var *cham-porensis*.

The plant will be judged in two categories: for 'First Bloom' as documented by a photo or a personal visit to Orchids with the plant. The second will be awarded at the November 2013 meeting for the plant that produces the 'Most Flowers' during its blooming period of summer/fall. Be sure to keep a record of the number of flowers your plant produces. The winners will receive a \$25 gift certificated from Orchids to be presented at the November 2013 meeting.

*Phalaenopsis pulcherrima* [The Beautiful Doritis] is a species of orchid found from Hainan Island to western Malesia. This is the only species in this genus, but it is highly variable.

It was first described by John Lindley in his Genera and Species of Orchidaceous Plants in 1833 as *Doritis pulcherrima*, basing his account on a dried specimen in China and preserved in the Herbarium of the East India Company.

In 1917 Robert Allen Rolfe by chance came across an old watercolor of Lindley's *Doritis pulcherrima* which bore the original collector's number. It was clear that this was the same as *Phalaenopsis esmeralda* and, since it had priority as well as sufficient differences to be retained as a separate genus, the name *Doritis pulcherrima* was accepted. It blooms during summer, requires low to medium light and intermediate to warm temperatures. Its cultural requirements are the same as *Phalaenopsis* but requires more light to flower well.

## MEET OUR ORCHID QUEST

### KEYNOTE SPEAKER

For the past two years, Orchid Quest has featured nationally-renowned keynote speakers. We have been fortunate to have two outstanding keynote speakers thus far: Fred Clarke and Glen Decker. This year's keynote speaker is no exception, and we are thrilled that Tom Miranda from the Smithsonian Institution has accepted our invitation to speak at Orchid Quest 2013.

Because the keynote speaker is one of the first things we begin planning for, Judy and I began thinking about our options shortly after last year's show. I always not-so-secretly hope that Marilyn LeDoux from Windy Hill Gardens will join us for the show. So, each year, I extend an invitation, and each year she graciously declines due to her schedule. I enjoy having an excuse to write her.

When I asked Marilyn for recommendations, she told me that Tom Miranda was the first person that came to mind, and that he was both knowledgeable and entertaining. Although I have never met Tom in person, many people have told me that he is an excellent choice for our show!

Tom Miranda is the Orchid Collection Specialist at the Smithsonian Institution. He has been there for the last ten years and according to his biography, cares for and curates an extremely diverse collection of orchid species and hybrids from all over the world. He also develops and produces huge educational exhibits using the collection plants. Sometimes these exhibits last for four months, and they are typically visited by hundreds of thousands of visitors.

Tom was originally trained as a Marine Biologist, but decided to begin working with orchids in his twenties, when he was living in Hawaii.

Tom has worked with orchids at the New York Botanical Garden, Brooklyn Botanic Garden

and an extensive private collection at Greentree Estate in Long Island. He is also a regular contributor to ORCHIDS magazine, and is currently developing a new book based on these writings.



Although this was not in

Tom's biography, I happen to know that Tom has a very pretty pet bird named Celia. When I asked if Celia would be coming to the show, Tom said that he wished she could, but Celia tends to tear up hotel rooms. So, I guess we won't have the privilege of meeting Celia, but I am including this picture of Celia as a teaser. Tom often features Celia in his talks, so you may be privy to more pictures of Celia...if you go to all of his talks! (He has not revealed which talks Celia will be featured in).

Tom will be giving three talks at this coming year's show. He will speak twice on Saturday, and once on Sunday. On Saturday, he will speak on "Mysteries of Orchid Pollination" during the day, and "Orchid Travels in Costa Rica," at the evening banquet. (Please remember to RSVP—you will not want to miss this!). 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## NOVEMBER MEETING RECAP

### Ask The Orchid Doctor at Orchids Garden Centre & Nursery

Welcome Linnzi!

Chuck Acker welcomed us to the Garden Centre for what has now become an annual event. Linnzi, the new 'Orchid Doctor's' assistant, was introduced by Chuck. She comes with horticulture education and training and will be working closely with Chuck with the orchids. She handles the on-line part of the orchid sales plus has become an expert at mounting orchids and Latin name pronunciation!

Orchiata™ bark:

Orchids Garden Centre now carries Orchiata, a new orchid bark from New Zealand that has some great characteristics for orchid growing. The bark is unique in structure so it will not break down as quickly as other pine bark, which seems to keep the orchid roots much happier. From Chuck's personal experience, plants that were stressed and failing have made remarkable recoveries when planted in this bark. The bark comes in four nugget sizes in hobby bags and larger bags. The size of the pot determines the size of the Orchiata bark to use, with large pots using the larger bark. Chuck mentioned some differences in potting with Orchiata: 1) Do not pack the mix into the pot as tightly as he has previously demonstrated with orchid bark mixes. 2) Do not wet the bark before using. 3) It takes about 2 weeks of more frequent watering for the conditioning of the bark before the usual watering routine can be established. Besides the improved growth of orchids in the bark without having to mix in any other ingredients like charcoal, pumice etc, the bark can last from 6-8 years before it begins to break down. Therefore you can repot into a slightly larger pot than with other bark. Since the orchid will be staying in the new pot longer this is important, saving pots and time. Another interesting feature is that it is not important to take off all of the old bark, just leave it with the roots, thereby decreasing root damage, and increasing the natural organisms in the old mix that will then stay with the plant. There is less repotting shock to the orchid because of these features.

The Scent of Scandal, by Craig Pittman:

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Chuck also made some comments about the book, The Scent of Scandal by Craig Pittman. Chuck was used as one of the sources of information about his efforts to legally bring into the US *Phragmipedium kovachii*. The book deals with the illegal entry of the *Phragmipedium kovachii* into the US with information of the cast of characters involved. Chuck was one of the first to legally bring the plant into this country. He brought in flasks and but had only one bloom, just in time for the 2009 Orchid Quest, where it caused quite a stir and earning Best in Show. Chuck knows and has traveled with several of the orchid dealers mentioned in the book. Chuck mentioned that if he had known what was happening at that time, he probably would not have gotten involved in the quest for kovachii! Chuck mentioned that the author said that Chuck furnished him with the happy ending for the book! (Available from Amazon or from the OGG library)

### "The Doctor is In":

- *How do I get a longer spike on my Phalaenopsis like it had when I bought it?*

A: The Phalaenopsis growers turn up the heat during the day to 82-85° F with good light after spike initiation to elongate the spike. A drop in temperature of 58°F brings about the spike initiation, but after the spike appears heat is needed for spike growth.

- *What does spider mite damage look like?*

A: Spider mite damage looks like small areas of lack of chlorophyll on the top or on the bottom of the leaf, or if a bad infestation, webbing on the plant. There might be punctate white spots. Mites suck the plant juices including the chlorophyll out of the leaves. Wiping with a white paper towel will let you know the type of spider mite, for if you see small red spots it is spider mites, and black or brown means one of two spotted false spider mites. Mites like warm dry conditions so if the humidity goes up they become inactive. (More information check out: <http://www.aos.org/Default.aspx?id=98>, a video on identifying spider mite damage.) To treat, increase humidity and spray with



Bayer Advanced Insect, Disease, & Mite Control (which can also be used on roses and other

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outside shrubs). Shake up the bottle before spraying. Neem oil and Safer Soap can also be used. Mites are not insects so insecticides need to state that they work on mites to be effective for mites.

- *How can I get an Oncidium to bloom?*

Oncidiums and Brassia need lots of light during the growing season to bloom. The light needs to be high enough so that the leaves are a light green in color. They also like cool nights, especially the Brassias. The Brassias need to be treated like a Cymbidium allowing them to experience almost freezing conditions and when brought inside to continue the very cool conditions in the house for initiation of the spikes. A trick of completely stopping fertilizing might shock it into blooming.



- *When should I use Bloom booster?*

A: Check out the new care sheets that are online from Orchids ([orchidsgardencentre.com/orchids](http://orchidsgardencentre.com/orchids)). Orchids is not recommending the use of bloom booster but a balanced fertilizer of 20-20-20 all year long. Paphiopedilums do not require as much fertilizer as other orchids. It is best to error on the light side of fertilizing rather than being too heavy which can cause permanent root damage. One half to 1 teaspoon per gallon every 2 to 3 weeks with even a lighter amount for paphs is recommended. Cymbidiums that are outside for the summer could use a top dressing of the pellet fertilizer Osmocote.

- *Why aren't my orchids blooming?*



A: The most common reason is not enough light. If under lights, lighting as close to sun light, 6500k, is best for Cattleyas, Laelias and Oncidiums. Mottled leaf Paphiopedilums like less light than the solid green leaf varieties. Dendrobiums require some UV light.

- *Why do the leaves look bad?*

A: Dendrobiums can have brown leaf tips, oncidiums can have wrinkled leaves, some of this means dead roots. Nancy Thomas found these problems with her plants. She re-

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searched this and discovered that the pH of her municipal water was very low. Sue Reed bought a kit from Paradigm that has the pH indicator and one bottle to adjust the pH up and one to adjust the pH down. She finds that adding fertilizer almost always gives the water a low pH that needs to be adjusted up. The best pH is between 6.0 to 6.5 for fertilizing orchids. Chuck stated that the pH is very important and that fertilizer, and bark breakdown all lower the pH of the orchid growing mix.

### **Some general comments on how to grow deciduous orchids:**

- There are a number of deciduous orchids, some have corm-like growths in the potting media (Habenaria), and some more cane-bulb-like growths above the media (Cycnoches, Calanthe, and Dendrobium)
- If growing media is moss, Chuck suggests slight watering even during dormancy to keep the moss from getting dry as a brick.
- The bulbs contain water but if they start to shrivel then give some water
- For Habenaria he suggests misting the mix periodically when in dormant phase
- Some suggest giving a very slight amount of moisture monthly
- Water when new growth starts, but slowly start watering, maybe with misting at first
- Some suggest starting to water on 'tax day' for Habenaria
- Keep on the dry side until leaves start to develop, then water heavily
- Water and fertilize when in active growth
- High light for Cycnoches types
- Calanthe light levels similar to Phalaenopsis
- When leaves are dropping in the fall start withholding water.
