

The Orchid Growers' Guild (OGG) is honored to present the 2012 Orchid Digest Award of Excellence to Chuck Acker. He was one of the original founders of OGG when it was established in late 1985. As a charter member, he served as the first Vice President. Over the last 26 years he has supported the guild in many ways. Chuck has been employed in the orchid nursery business for most of his life; first with his father's business, Orchids by the Ackers, to his present position at Orchids Garden Centre and Nursery. During all of these years he has actively encouraged, and educated his customers in orchid culture and the

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benefits of joining Orchid Growers Guild. Chuck has been a regular presenter at the Guild's November meeting. The November meeting was the start of "Chuck's Challenge." when guild members receive a seedling. The goal is to nurture the seedling in the next year so as to become the "winner" of Chuck's predetermined requirements. Winners receive a gift certificate to use at the nursery.

Chuck has ensured that the Guild is allowed to use the greenhouse as the drop-off/pick up point for our away shows. He has helped us fill in the OGG away show exhibits with orchid plants when we run low on plants. In addition, he has opened the greenhouse late on Sunday evenings when we return with show plants.

In recent years, he has sponsored the Cypripedium Alliance: (Best of Classes 40 through 42) award at Orchid Quest, the Guild's annual show. Most recently, he has become involved in some of our pre-show activities including speaking on the Larry Meiller "Garden Talk" show. He has been one of the biggest supporters of the Guild since its founding. He has done it because he loves orchids and wants to help all those that share his interest. We all appreciate the help and education that he has given each of us when it comes to orchids. We want to give him long overdue recognition.

OGG EXHIBIT for OQ 2012

It is that time of year again to inspect, clean and stake the inflorescences on your plants! This will prepare your plants for our great February show, Orchid Quest 2012!

Staking of the florescence will make it easier to transport your plants and it will improve the presentation of the flowers. You can head off insect problems by early and consistent treatment! The cleaning of your plants will also increase your appreciation of the plants. Remember that the quality of the exhibit depends upon the quality and presentation of the orchid plants in the exhibit!

Please email a listing of your plants to me, Susan Reed, greed@chorus.net, no later than the evening of Monday, January 30, 2012! I will need the full name, if it is a hybrid, and the cross, if you know the cross. I will also need to know the class that you want it judged. Many classes are set for specific colors of the flowers and whether or not there are markings on the flowers. If you have trouble deciding on a class, always choose the first class that the plant might fit into. You can email me a photo and the cross and I can see if I can help you decide upon the class. I will need to send the orchid registration information on to the show registration committee before the show.

Please leave a small plant label in the pot with the plant's name and your name. Your name needs to be on the pot towards the bottom so we can make sure you get your plant back!

ALL plants need to be at the Alliant Energy Center by 12 noon on Friday, Febuary 3. The earlier the better to ease the set up group's stress. You are also responsible to take your plants home af-

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ter the show on Sunday, February 5, no earlier than 4 PM. Please contact others if you need help with getting your plants to or from the show. It is very important that we have as many nice blooming orchids in our exhibit as possible.

Remember we will be having about 70 orchid plants to label and place in the exhibit. That takes a lot of time to do the best placement for displaying your plants. Anything that you can do to make the process run smoothly and on time is greatly appreciated!

We will be doing a garden exhibit again this year, so please consider bringing your nice clean foliage houseplants for the exhibit. The leaves on these plants need to be clean with all dead, dying and brown leaves and tips of leaves removed. Please label the pots on your houseplants at the outside bottom edge also.

We could also use some nice outdoor garden art to add to our exhibit. It is best if it is of a dark color so it blends into the surroundings without over shadowing the orchids. Label these if possible in an inconspicuous spot. Please don't be hurt if we decide not to use your piece, but we will try to use what fits into the display. Again drop off and taking home are your responsibility, but other members are more than willing to help out if they can for the transportation.

Remember for plants in the exhibit and for judging, there is no requirement about how long you have owned the plant. So if the great plant you got at the Holiday Party, for example, is looking great for the show, then PLEASE enter it for the exhibit! Others that are having their plants judged did not grow them into blooming, so you do not have to also! Show off your new plants in the exhibit!

Thank you all for your great participation in the Guild's exhibit!

In Quest of *Phragmipedium kovachii*

Chuck Acker first went to Peru in September 2003 to view the natural habitat of a newly discovered orchid, *Phragmipedium kovachii*. He took a guided 3 ½ hour hike into the Peruvian jungle where the plants were growing on a south-facing calcareous cliff. This was the exact site where earlier that year a local farmer had picked the first specimen of *P. kovachii*, brought it to town and sold it to an American tourist named Michael Kovach. Mr. Kovach then brought the plant back to the U.S. for identification and naming.



In April 2005, Chuck Acker and Jerry Fischer of Orchids Limited traveled back to Peru to be the first commercial orchid growers to import flasks of this beautiful orchid into the U.S. They first met with Manolo Arias of Peruflores who was the only nursery to successfully propagate *P. kovachii* by seed and legally export them. They had to sign stacks of papers involving the legal importation of the flasks and sign documents stating that there would be no sales of these plants for a two year period from date of purchase. Plants from these flasks can be tracked with DNA technol-

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ogy which will ensure that the hundreds of illegal plants sold on the black market will stay at bay. Chuck has successfully grown these plants and was the first person to publicly show a *P. kovachii* in bloom at Orchid Quest 2009. *Phragmipedium kovachii* is now the basis of Phragmipedium hybridizing by Chuck, Jerry Fischer and other Phragmipedium grower's world wide.

Glen Decker (see article below) is another orchid grower with a stock of *P. kovachii* in his greenhouses. He will speak at Orchid Quest, February 4, 2012 at 11:00 AM in the Alliant Energy Center Exhibition Hall on "**How to Grow Great Slipper Orchids**". That evening, he will speak at 6:00 PM at a sit down banquet about "**Phragmipedium kovachii and Its Hybrids**"

OQ SPEAKER GLEN DECKER

Glen Decker a proprietor of Piping Rock Orchids in Galway, NY, will be at Orchid Quest February 4, 2012. Glen began growing orchids at the age of 15 and holds a degree of Associate in Applied Science in Ornamental Horticulture. His topic will be "How to Grow Great Slipper Orchids." The world of orchids is a fascinating tale indeed. He has traveled to South America on one of his orchid adventures in search of the once-elusive *Phrag. kovachii*. After years of going through the various legal maneuvers required for importing restricted slipper orchids into the USA, Piping Rock Orchids is one of the few American nurseries with extensive stocks of *Phrag. kovachii* (all totally legal and documented). These are very large flowers ranging in size from 6" to over 9" in some cases. These are not as difficult to grow as you might think, however they are very slow to get going, you just need some patience.

Glen will be bringing plants to sell at the Orchid Quest. Pre-orders are definitely welcomed with a 10% discount. Order through the web site, noting to bring it with him; this saves shipping and handling. Or, just e-mail him your want list. Glen was the previous chair of the American Orchid Society's Publications Committee and is presently a Director of the Orchid Digest Corporation. Glen has won numerous AOS awards, including the Butterworth Prize, Nax Trophy, WW Wilson Award and the Carlyle A. Luer Award. He has appeared in Martha Stewart's Better Living Magazine and on a PBS TV special "Orchid Delirium". He rewrote the Slipper section of the Brooklyn Botanic Garden's "The Best Orchids for Indoors" and was the technical editor for the "Orchids for Dummies" book.

WHY DO A TABLETOP EXHIBIT?

Tabletop exhibits (Class 4) are fun to do and educational for the exhibitor and as well as educational and interesting for the visitors at the orchid show. Small exhibits give you an opportunity to highlight your orchid related talents and interests. The exhibit could be put into one of the various open classes such as educational, orchid related collectables, personally created orchid related art (including photography, quilting, beadwork, knitting, ceramics, leaded glass to name a few) as well as orchid flower arrangements. Your creativity and imagination are your only limits. One thing that is consistent across the different types of exhibits is to remember that orchids are the important element, so don't let the staging extras take the emphasis away from orchids. A table cover and small backdrop help set off the display with the items arranged in various heights is the most pleasing to the eye. 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TABLETOP EXHIBIT

poorly set up display detract from the items, resulting in lack of interest in the exhibit by the public and by the judges.

I have found that polyester fabric generally in a dark color, plain black or dark green set off most items very well. Small boxes under the fabric will give a varied height for interest. Three pieces of pegboard laced together make a nice small backdrop when covered with fabric.

So what to put into your exhibit? If you wanted to do an educational exhibit you would need to pick some thing or type of orchids that interests you or that you would like to learn more about! An educational exhibit can be all photos and printed information, or a mix of orchid plants, orchid growing media with printed information. Remember to have a theme and stick to it. The information should not be over whelming by being too much to read and too technical. Make it something that you would enjoy seeing at a show.

Collectibles could be anything orchid related from pottery, cards, jewelry, and dishes arranged in an interesting manner. These would be items that you have not made yourself. The collection can be judged (class 106) as well as the exhibit in class 4. (Check the show book for the exact class numbers.)

An exhibit of items that you have made would be entered into the Art Entries (classes 103-105). You must be the person that created the items to have them in one of the classes 103-105. If the items are something that you purchased then it would be in class 106 for Collectibles.

photographs and painted ceramics have been popular items for Guild members to show off their talents, but other possibilities could be but not limited, to beadwork, knitted items, metal art and jewelry. Think about an exhibit for this year and if you are interested please contact Judy Stevenson for Orchid Quest 2012!

FAVORITE RECIPES FROM A SELF-CONFESSED “VANILLAHOIC”

MAIN DISHES

Roast Meat with Vanilla - Cherry Sauce

The flavor of roasted meats such as lamb, pork, venison, duck, or chicken can be wonderfully enhanced with fruit sauces. Orange - rosemary, red currant, and blackberry - sage sauces are among the classics, but this unique sour cherry sauce is made extra special and less tart with the addition of Vanilla.

Ingredients:

- 1 tsp oil or pan drippings
- 1/3 cup finely diced shallots
- 1/4 cup ruby port (or hearty red wine)
- 1 Vanilla bean, split lengthwise (Tahitian Vanilla is recommended)
- 1/4 chicken stock or water
- 1/3 cup dried sour cherries
- 1 tsp brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp balsamic vinegar
- 1/2 tsp thyme leaves
- 1 Tbs butter



Sautee the shallots in the oil until softened, then add the port and Vanilla bean. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Add all the remaining ingredients except the butter, and cook until reduced by half and thickened. Prior to serving, stir in the butter to enrich the sauce. Serve on the side in a gravy dish or spooned over the cooked meat before serving.

Seafood with Vanilla - Coconut Sauce

Vanilla is widely cultivated throughout the Pacific Islands of French Polynesia where fresh seafood of all types (shrimp, lobster, fish) is an important part of local cuisine. Another main staple is coconut. This dish or any variation on it, marries the flavors of Tahiti and the islands of the Pacific. Vanilla works very well with seafood, pork and other savory dishes. The adventurous chef should use this dish as an inspiration to consider adding Vanilla extract to other main course dishes rather than just to desserts.

Ingredients:

- 2 lbs of fresh seafood: peeled shrimp, lobster meat, or firm white fish (monk fish would be an ideal choice)
- 2 Tbs oil
- 1/2 cup rum
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 whole Vanilla bean, split lengthwise (Tahitian Vanilla bean preferred)
- 3/4 cup coconut milk
- Cooked white rice
- Lemon & lime wedges for garnish

Heat the oil in a frying pan and sauté the seafood until it is browned (3 - 5 minutes is plenty). Transfer to a plate and keep warm by covering loosely with aluminum foil.

Use a paper towel to absorb and discard any of the excess oil in the pan, then add the rum and vanilla bean to the pan. Continue to cook until the liquid has reduced down to just a few tablespoons. By this point the alcohol will have been cooked off. Doesn't that smell divine? Then add the cream and coconut milk, and continue to reduce the mixture until you achieve a desired thickness for the sauce (this is a matter of personal preference).

Remove the Vanilla bean and discard it. Return the seafood to the pan just long enough to reheat it slightly. Serve over the rice, and garnish with the lemons and limes. An orchid flower placed on top for decoration would add an appropriate touch of the exotic!
