

APRIL MEETING: A Look Behind the Scene at the Bolz Conservatory

John Wirth, the Conservatory Curator, treated us to a tour of the Bolz Conservatory, greenhouses and the behind the scene workings that make all of this possible. In the Conservatory itself, there are 220 fogging nozzles that keep the relative humidity above 60-percent as well as a 20-foot high waterfall feeding into a stream and pool. The temperature is regulated between 65 and 95 degrees Fahrenheit year-around. A computer linked to an outside weather station controls heat, humidification, exhaust fans, and window vents. Plants are watered daily by hand with reverse osmosis water. A layer of rich soil 18 inches thick sits on top of 12 feet of sand, for drainage. Diseases and insect pests are controlled naturally. After we admired the tropical plants and orchids, we also spotted the free flying birds which included singing canaries, orange-cheeked waxbills, diamond doves, and common and button quail (which eat harmful insects). The water features are

home to Koi carp. We went behind the scenes to see how all this is made to happen.

A noisy and complicated system of piping and pumps create the waterfall and stream. A generator which functions on natural gas is run every day to make sure it can be relied upon in case of a power failure. The generator supplies sufficient power to run the environmental equipment that regulates the interior climate.

The water they use in the Conservatory and green houses is reverse osmosis, a process which removes dissolved salts. The water is stored in tanks to ensure a sufficient supply. There are small bird cages in the maintenance area where birds are placed for observation for disease, as well to place birds that the public has released into the Conservatory under the misapprehension that they are doing anyone any favors. Ill advised release of birds (and fish) present a risk of introducing diseases and pests into the captive population, as well as introducing species that may harm the collection of plants.

There is a corridor as well as two green-

houses which contain the very large and diverse orchid collection as well as a selection of tropical plants. Every plant is labeled and a plant census is maintained. Desirable plants can be a kind of currency between ar-

boretums, facilitating trades beneficial to each institution and the continuation of endangered species. Everywhere we looked in these greenhouse we spotted blooming treasures.

ORCHID QUEST 2016 UPDATE FROM THE CHAIR
