Experiences with Growing Deciduous Orchids By Gary Lensmeyer, Photographs by Gary Lensmeyer

OGG member Gary Lensmeyer has developed a successful regimen for his decidious orchids. The deciduous plants under discussion are Cycnoches, Cycnodes, Calanthe, Galeandra, Catasetum and their hybrids. Decidious plants are characterized by a distinct period of rest, followed by the emergence of new growth ramping up to rapid vegetative development culminating in the setting of flower spikes. Inflorescences eventually fade/drop and the leaves yellow/dry/drop and the plant cycles back to the rest phase.






Culture

Deciduous orchids require a rest period, typically in the winter [thus they are the perfect orchid for snowbirds!] They cycle by a breaking dormancy/sprouting period (spring), active growth (late spring, summer, early fall), flowering period (early fall-early winter), moving towards rest period (late fall – early winter to late winter).

<u>During the rest period</u>, NO WATER, NO MISTING, NO NOTHING! OR AS Gary's mother would say "You mussn't, you dassn't water or the plant will rot." But place the plant in bright light at 60-70 degree F.

Breaking dormancy, NO WATER, NO MISTING, NO NOTHING! Continue to keep the plant in bright light at 60-70 degree F. Allow roots and leaf sprouts to reach about **3 inches** in length

Period of active growth. When the roots/shoot each or 3 to 5 inches long, repot. Under pot for best results. Start a regimen of heavy watering and fertilizing. Give the plant as much light as possible without burning its leaves.

Fertilizing

Fertilize at each watering during period of active growth.

Allow pot to set in saucer with water Fertilizer Mix: 1 gallon R.O. water, 1 drop Physan, 2 drops Cal/Mag, 1 drop B-52. To this mix add, on a rotating basis, 1 teaspoon DynaGrow liquid high nitrogen(9-3-6); or 1/2 teaspoon Jacks Fertilizer(20-20-20); or 1/2 teaspoon Michigan State Fertilizer (13-3-16).

Aereate water prior to mixing in additives.

Flowering Stage

When flower spikes appear, use only Jacks fertilizer plus the other additives.

Don't allow the pot to set in water but continue the watering regimen.

When the flowers fade and drop/leaves turn yellow gradually water less and eliminate all fertilizers/additives.

Stop all watering as leaves yellow and drop Do not water during dormancy Restart watering only when new growth is 3-5

Restart watering only when new growth is 3-5 inches

Christmas Orchid or Darwin's Orchid Angraecum sesquipedale

The *Angraecum sesquipedale* is called the Christmas Orchid because it typically blooms in December or January. The flowers only last 4 to 6 days. The plant is quite large, sometimes reaching three feet. The flowers are 6 inches across.

Native to Madagascar, Darwin identified the plant in 1862. The spur is an incredible 10 to 12 inches long. Darwin predicted a moth would be found with a proboscis long enough to reach the end of the spur. This was considered unlikely (crazy) at the time. The moth was discovered in 1903 and observed pollinating the flower. This can now be seen on You Tube. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=VUiZDhsoJrA

It is a warm growing orchid requiring a loose potting medium and likes frequent watering. This is one species that does not like to have its roots disturbed. When potting put it in a large enough pot to accommodate years of growth.

This orchid was exhibited at Orchid Quest 2017.

UP DATES FROM THE ORCHID CONSERVATION ALLIANCE

Orchid Art by Charles Hess Mission Statement:

Inspired by both the unique floral paintings, as well as the Amazon conservation efforts of renowned botanical artist Margaret Mee, all proceeds from purchases of limited edition prints from Orchid Art by Charles Hess are donated to the preservation of orchid habitats in the rainforests of South America and Asia, and to the study and preservation of native orchid species in North America. Donations are made annually to 3 organizations: the Rainforest Trust, the Orchid Conservation Alliance, and the North American Orchid Conservation Center at the Smithsonian.



Travelers will gather for this trip in Chania on the island of Crete, where we will spend the first two sections of the trip. We will then fly to Athens where we will spend some time with Grecian antiquities as well as mainland orchids and have some free time for shopping.
