From ORCHIDS Magazine - For the Novice "Bud Blast and Flower Blighting"

Who does not enjoy seeing a jewel orchid with its interesting leaf coloration and venation, or a *Pha-laenopsis schilleriana* with its beautiful variegated leaves? The orchid aficionado always enjoys a well-grown plant with unblemished leaves and a good growth habit. While there are some orchids grown for their foliage, the big payoff for our time and trouble is the appearance of long-anticipated flowers. When the floral display is ruined because the buds blast before opening or become blighted after opening, we wonder what we should have done differently.

NEWLY ACQUIRED PLANTS: Bud blast on plants that have just been brought into your growing area is probably the norm rather than the exception. Think about how your new orchid was uprooted from the cozy greenhouse where its every need was met, jammed into a box or flat, loaded into a truck or airplane, or sat on the shelf at the retail outlet before arriving at your growing area. Every environmental cue an orchid uses to adjust to its environment was confused by its journey. It should not be surprising that these jet-lagged plants drop some or all of their buds.

Book Report

In December the Orchid Guild's book collection was delivered to the Schumacher Library at Olbrich Gardens, in accordance with a new partnership agreement between Olbrich and the Guild. Many thanks to the OGG committee members who edited the collection before the delivery to Olbrich: Sue Reed, Lorraine Snyder, Chuck Acker, Liz Wood, and Nancy Thomas. Thanks also to OGG member Liz Wood, for her past service as our librarian and preservation of the collection. Our books are now in the capable hands of Eva Stefanski, our Schumacher Library liaison. Eva will catalogue them, preserve fragile dust jackets with clear archival covers, and put them on display. OGG's collection will then be included in Olbrich's online catalogue. Eva will be introduced and speak briefly to the guild at our January meeting.

Our collection gets "top shelf" treatment as Eva has selected a prominent location for our books.

Every visitor to Olbrich will be able to peruse our books. OGG members and persons authorized by Olbrich under their lending policies will have checkout privileges. Books can be checked out for 30 days, roughly corresponding to our meeting dates, and the borrowing period may be

extended an additional 30 days if desired. Books can be reserved online and picked up during the next OGG meeting. OGG members need only give their name to the library attendant, who will check the list OGG provides of eligible borrowers, confirm eligibility, and complete the checkout process. OGG may suspend borrowing privileges if a member is more than three

DECEMBER PRESENTATION RECAP Jean Allen-Ikeson on *Oncidium fuscatum* (aka *Miltonia warscewiczii*) and Its Hybrids

Jean Allen-Ikeson is an accredited AOS judge in the Toronto Judging Center. Jean discussed both the current trends and past waves of hybridization programs using Oncidium fuscatum. As noted in the discussion, Oncidium fuscatum, although not a beauty has produced some stunning progeny. Prominent hybridizers such as Charlesworth, Moir, McCully, and McLelland and others had an uncanny ability to see the potential in combining plants which are not stand outs and may even be considered ugly ducklings. Oncidium fuscatum is one such ugly duckling that has been used extensively to produce highly desirable crosses. It is a large epiphytic orchid with large sprays of long-lasting fragrant flowers often blooming twice a year. On the downside, the shape of the lip has been described as looking like a Victorian bustle. However, one desirable characteristic often inherited by the progeny is the flattened Christmas tree shape of the inflorescence. According to Jean, there are 129 F1 and 899 progeny registered with Oncidium fuscatum parentage.

One of the most well-known and awarded hybrid is *Oncostele* Wildcat (*Oncostele* Rustic Bridge × *Oncidium* Crowborough, R. McLelland), created in 1992. This is the most


awarded oncidiinae hybrid. A recently created hybrid, On*costele* Catatante (Oncidium Sphacetante × *Oncostele* Wildcat, 2002, McCully), has nice form, butterscotch color, and lots of flowers. One awarded plant had over 107 flowers on one of the flower spikes. Oncidium fuscatum accounts for 25% of the genetics in both crosses.

In addition to describing the numerous successful hybrids with *Oncidium fuscatum*, Jean provided many cultural tips on growing these hybrids in a northern climate followed by a Q&A session.

OGG 2021-22 Annual Points Awards

At our December meeting, we revealed our annual points winners for growers and exhibitors of the year. In this "post-pandemic" year it was actually points accumulated in 2021 and 2022. Because we'd had so few opportunities to earn points in 2021, the Board decided to carry over points to combine with 2022. A brief reminder: Each member earns points throughout the year (December through November) for the orchids they've shown at our meetings, Orchid Quest, or Away Shows, and for their service in setting up and taking down OGG displays at shows. Each of these activities supports OGG by sharing skills, demonstrating our accomplishments, and reciprocating other societies' efforts in support of our shows, so we reward our members who have excelled on our behalf.

The Milo Gilbertson Award for Grower of the Year is given to the member who earns the most points for the orchids they've shown and ribbons and awards they've won. Milo was a founding member of OGG who so excelled at growing and flowering orchids that the Guild named our annual award as a tribute to him. This year's winner is Jeff Metcalf who earned 249 points including two Best of Class, a Special Award and an HCC/AOS award on his spectacular plants.

The runner up was Sue Reed with 217 points earned as she participated in every one of our away shows in 2021 and 2022—the epitome of a consistently successful grower! We also award a grower in the experience class (less than 3 years experience; or greater than or equal to 3 years experience) that didn't earn the Milo Gilbertson Award. This year's award goes to Sandra Gray who won points in her first year as an OGG member—welcome and congratulations Sandra!


The OGG Exhibiter of the Year earns points for setting up, taking down, and for earning ribbons for OGG displays at Orchid Quest

SILENT AUCTION UP-DATE




