#### NEXT MEETING MARCH 19 Harry Gallis, "Antelope Dendrobiums, My Twisted Passion"

Harry Gallis will cover some background on Dendrobium in general, then look at the various antelope species. What is an

antelope dendrobium? "Depending on who is classifying and when there are 10-15 sections of dendrobium species, generally arranged by morphology and geographic location. The two sections I will concentrate on in this talk are spatulata ("antelopes") and phalaenopsis - inflorescence and flowers look like phalaenopsis. These species generally come from the South Pacific including Australia, New Guinea and New Zealand. They are easily grown in intermediate to hot temperatures and Cattleya or more light. I will try to cover the most interesting species and currently available hybrids."



I began growing orchids in 1980, initially purely as a hobbyist, ultimately growing my collection to a small commercial backyard operation with 3500 plants. I have been a member of the AOS since 1980, entered the AOS judging program in 1991, chaired the Carolinas Judging Center, served as AOS judges' training coordinator, AOS Trustee from 2004-2010 and 2013-16, and as Chair of the Judging Committee of AOS from 2010-14 and now an Emeritus Judge. I left the board in April 2016 but continue to serve as an Honorary Vice President and member of the AOS Governance Committee. I have been active in the Triangle Orchid Society here in Durham mostly also since 1980, past president, program

chair and everything else.


Paphiopedilum (Joanne's Wine 'Siren' x Red Zinger 'Double Fun')

My plants have received 56 AOS awards including three of my own hybrids: Den Alex Gallis, Den Sara Gallis and Rct Savannah Hope Gallis. My collection consists primarily of Cattleyas and Dendrobiums."



#### **RE-CAP FEBRUARY MEETING** Fred Clarke on Catasetinae

The February Orchid Growers' meeting was also the Guild's annual public meeting. After a briefing by Orchid Quest Show Chair, Terri Jozwiak,



on show attendance and revenues, the standing room only crowd was treated to the first book review by Chuck Acker of the book Orchids for *Everyone*. The book is now available to members from the Guild's collection in the Olbrich library. It is just one of the many excellent Orchid reference materials in the collec-


tion. Although the book was originally released in 1987, Chuck described the work as inspirational for both the novice and experienced grower. Chuck is planning to review a new book each month. Next month he will review the latest addition to the collection. The library is open during the monthly meetings as a benefit to our members.

Fred Clarke, founder of Sunset Valley Orchids (SVO) in Vista, California, gave a presentation via Zoom on the use of Cycnoches, Mormodes, and Catasetums in his breeding program which has produced numerous awarded hybrids. His many hybrids are not only spectacularly beautiful but are excellent plants for the orchid hobbyist. One of the best known of these crosses produced the Fredclarkeara (Fdk.) After Dark 'SVO Black Pearl' clone which is described by Fred as having black flowers. According to the Orchid Roots website this hybrid has in its parentage 25% Morm. sinuata, 25% Ctsm. tenebrosum, 19% Cl. rosea, 13% Ctsm. expansum, 13% Ctsm. pileatum, and 6% Cl. warczewitzii. His latest direction in hybridization with Catasetinae has produced the six-time awarded Ctmds. Dragon Glade. Some of the plants of this grex produced nearly black flowers, while others produced yellow flowers. Flowers of the hybrid are longer The Orchid Grower March 2023 page 4 of 9

lasting than any of the parents; almost as if the flower life from each parent was additive.

In addition to wowing the audience with beautiful images of his many hybrids, Fred also described the fascinating breeding strategy of sexual dimorphism in Catasetums and Cycnoches (Mormodes have perfect flowers). This strategy makes self-pollination virtually impossible thereby increasing genetic diversity. Catasetums are famous for their pollen ejecting capability. The male flowers have the capability to eject pollinarium at a speed of 60 feet per second effectively attaching it onto the thorax of the pollinator, a species of Euglossine bee. Stunned by the attack from the male flower, the once bitten twice shy bee seeks out a flower with the same fragrance signature but with an entirely different look leading the bee to the female flower. The bee may forget the encounter with the male flower quickly and repeat the process.

Fred mentioned several times that these hybrids are excellent plants for the hobbyist. However,



there are important cultural requirements that must be followed to grow these plants well. The plants grow naturally in monsoon conditions. They like hot and wet conditions during the summer when they grow rapidly. Water

frequently and fertilize every watering with ½ tsp of fertilizer per gallon of water (Use MSU for RO water if using RO, distilled, or rainwater, or (Continued on page 8)

use a 20-20-20 fertilizer if using hard tap water. This will help ensure the pH is in the correct range). Around Thanksgiving the plants begin to go into dormancy. The leaves start turning yellow and will eventually drop as these are deciduous plants. Reduce watering gradually at this point and stop fertilizer application. When most or all of the leaves have dropped, discontinue all watering. Repot as needed when the new growth just starts using a well-draining potting medium. The roots develop in anticipation of the "rains" coming not due to the application of water. But don't water yet. Wait until the roots on the new growths are at least 3-6 inches long before starting the cycle over.
