Check out Sue Reed's little *Pleurothallis scurula*, bought at the October meeting from New World Orchids. It seems to like her biOrb and cool sunporch. It is a cloud forest orchid from Peru which means it likes cool temperatures. Sue's sunporch in the winter is in the 50's F at night and only in the 60's during the day. The biOrb has its own light source but it does receive some indirect sun light. So cute!



Remembering Steven J. Thimling


Steven J. Thimling, age 74, passed away peacefully in his sleep at home on December 16, 2025. He grew up in Holland Indiana. He graduated from Holland High School and Purdue University. He worked for Dames & Moore before coming to Wisconsin in 1978 where he met his wife, Kathy Alt. Steve worked for the Gordon Flesch Company as a service technician for 35 years before retiring in 2019.



Steve had varied interests including orchids. He was a member of Orchid Growers Guild for many years. In 2010 he was awarded an AOS Certificate for his many years of service: serving for eight years as treasurer plus two years on the Board. Steve grew and bloomed miniature orchids in his orchidarium. He shared some of these blooming plants at Orchid Guild meetings so that members saw new and unusual plants.

In 2014 Steve was diagnosed with prostate cancer. This led his wife Kathy and him to search for new interests and they discovered their love for music. They became the best friends with others who shared their interest.

Steve is survived by his wife Kathy Alt Thimling and son Kyle M. Thimling.



"I'm one of Steve's friends from the Orchid Growers Guild for the past 15 years. He was a dear man and I'll miss him badly. He was a registrar for our annual orchid show for many years and his diligence and strict standards for data and record-keeping were well appreciated. He taught me the ropes for recording our judging results, when I first started, leading by example. Every year he spent all three days at Orchid Quest tirelessly manning the registration computer to assure accurate records were reported out. But in "down" moments I'd see him browsing among the displays to find the beautiful miniatures, sharing pictures of them and seeking out their vendors, like the avid orchid-grower that he was. Steve was always a pleasure to be around and will be missed."

What's Blooming at Home . . .

The Bamboo Orchid, *Arundina graminifolia*, is the sole species in the monotypic genus *Arundina*. On a visit to a botanical garden in Hawaii a few years ago, I purchased a piece of rhizome the size of my thumb pre-packaged with a CITES permit. I took it home, and potted it up. After a few years, it has finally matured into a large enough plant to bloom this year on several canes. It is a sequential bloomer, with 9 or 10 blooms produced so far. The flower is showy, and each lasts 5-7 days. In Hawaii it is classed as an invasive pest species imported from southeast Asia as an ornamental. It is now common in roadside ditches and open areas in the wet side of the Big Island.

And the Winners Are...

Each year the Orchid Growers Guild recognizes members who have contributed much energy and effort into making the organization strong and viable. The various awards go to the people that accrue the most points from December to November with the winner announced at the Holiday celebration in December.

Points are earned by members when they bring blooming orchids to the monthly meetings. Points are 4, 3, 2 respectively for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place ribbon judging. These points are doubled when the member sends blooming plants to "Away Shows" such as Wisconsin Orchid Society's show in Milwaukee or the Illinois Orchid Society's meeting at the Chicago Botanic Gardens so points are 8, 6, and 4 for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place ribbons. Members earn additional points for the total number of plants sent to each show. There are 25 additional bonus points for Best of Class or a Special Award and 50 additional points if your plant wins an AOS or Best

Plant in the Show award at these public shows.

In addition to the Grower Points there are Exhibitor of the Year points earned for setting up and taking down the exhibits at the away shows as well as additional points for award-winning displays.

The 2025 awards:

Exhibitor of the Year Award went to Ken Cameron. Ken, Chuck, Sue Reed, Dan Schmidt and Lynn West did the set-up and take-down for Orchid Quest winning a First Place, Best of Class, and two AOS awards for a total point accumulation of 145 points. And that was just the start of it! The Batavia Orchid Society team of Ken, Brian Thompson, Jeff Metcalf and Jim Wasser once again won a First Place, and Best of Class and an AOS award. The third show that Ken helped set up was Eastern Iowa Orchid Society's show where the team won Second Place but also

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received the award for the Most Spooktacular. All in all, Ken earned 345 Exhibitor Points and gave the Orchid Growers Guild great recognition among the orchid societies of the Upper Midwest. Ken was not the only person who set up exhibits at the Away Shows. Jeff Metcalf, Lorraine Snyder, Denise Baylis and Steven Liu did the Illinois Orchid Society Exhibit at the Chicago Botanic Garden and Lorraine and Denise also did the Wisconsin Orchid Society show at the Mitchell Domes in Milwaukee.

The Novice Grower Award goes to the person with 3 years or less experience growing orchids. This year's winner is Christina Keeley. Christina accrued a total of 41 points. Other New Growers that brought plants for monthly ribbon judging, sent plants to away shows or brought them to Orchid Quest are Justin Endo, Ellen Karlson, Mary Kraft-Lee, Benjamin Miranda and Alice Peterson.

This year's Milo Gilbertson Award, given to a member with more than three years of growing experience, went to Ken Cameron. He accrued 555 points which was only 9 more points than

the next runner up. He sent plants to all of the away shows and Orchid Quest and brought many plants to each of our monthly meetings. Ken definitely set the bar for showing plants!

Lc Mari's Magic and Lc Purple Cascade are examples of "splash petal" orchids. A "splash petal" refers to a striking pattern in orchids like Cattleya, Dendrobium, Cymbidium, Phalaenopsis) where contrasting colors, often white or yellow, "splash" or streak onto the edges of the petals, creating a unique, painterly, or feathered look, a desirable trait prized by collectors for its dramatic beauty and varied patterns. The 'splashing' from the flower's lip onto its petal is referred to as peloria

Farewell to *Dendrochilum* and Days of Auld Lang Syne

On December 31 we said goodbye to another year and also to the orchid genus *Dendrochilum*. As Ken mentioned at our last meeting, all species of “chain orchids” have now been reclassified under the name *Coelogyne* primarily because of new DNA evidence. Superficially, these two genera of orchids appear strikingly different - are the botanists blind?! Species of *Coelogyne* usually produce just a few large flowers that either droop downward or are held upright on long stalks. Species of *Dendrochilum*, in contrast, usually produce many small fragrant flowers that hang down like a necklace or chain. However, those stereotyped descriptions are based on only a few of the species that are common in cultivation, and size alone is rarely a good reason to classify one group of organisms differently from another. When we consider the full range of diversity shared between these two genera we find many intermediate forms. In fact, there are more than 200 named species of *Coelogyne* and possibly 300 species of *Dendrochilum*, but the line between them is rather fuzzy when you look carefully at their flower structure. Furthermore, when DNA analyses were performed to determine the genetic relationships among the species it was discovered that some *Dendrochilums* are more closely related to some *Coelogynes* than they are to other *Dendrochilums* and vice versa. The different species are mixed up on the same family tree. A third genus, *Pholidota*, which shares various features with its cousins, is also part of the mix. How to resolve this predicament? Well, rather than create dozens of new generic names to clean up the mess, taxonomists have proposed the simplest and most conservative solution . . . to lump all three genera together under one name. But which one? Fortunately, the “International Code for Botanical Nomenclature” has rules that must be followed in situa-

tions like this. The genus *Dendrochilum* was first published by the German-Dutch botanist Carl Ludwig Blume in 1825, the same year that the genus *Pholidota* was formally published. By comparison, the genus *Coelogyne* was first established and published by the English botanist John Lindley in 1821. Since that name predates the others (albeit by only four years) it has pri-

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ority and must be used.

Regardless of what you call them, these SE Asian orchids are beautiful and have a place in everyone's collection. Many of us grow *Coelogyne cristata*, which can become an impressive specimen with proper care. Have you seen the giant hanging baskets of this species at Olbrich Botanical Garden? Another popular species is *C. pandurata* which produces bizarre green flowers with a jet black lip. You need a lot of space to grow that one! If you are looking for something a bit more compact, perhaps consider *C. flaccida*. Several Guild members have divisions of that species which has been cultivated in the UW-Madison Botany Greenhouse collection for decades. Another great option is *C. wenzelii*, which comes in red and yellow forms. I got mine from New World Orchids at Orchid Quest last year and it's already flowered twice! Similar to it is *C. glumaceum*, which looks like a pure white bottle brush grass, wheat, or barley. Indeed, the name is derived from a Latin botanical epithet meaning "glumaceous," which refers to being covered in or resembling glumes. What are glumes you ask? The A.I. Wizard says . . . "glumes are specialized, husk-like bracts

(modified leaves) found at the base of the spikelet (flower cluster) of grasses, sedges, and some orchids. They are typically dry and papery, like chaff or husks." Makes sense to me! If you got a chance to sniff it at our holiday party you know why it's called the "hay-scented orchid" (although Ted described it as smelling like Lake Mendota in July).

I'm going to miss the old name *Dendrochilum* (meaning tree lips [don't ask]), but I'll confess that I've always enjoyed saying *Coelogyne* (generally pronounced see-LODGE-uh-nee but sometimes as see-loh-GYE-nee. The name originates from Greek, with *koilos* meaning "hollow" and *gyne* meaning "pistil" in reference to the shape of the orchid's female reproductive structure). In any event, time moves on and we do our best to keep up . . . Should old acquaintance be forgot | And never brought to mind? | We'll drink a cup of kindness yet | For the sake of auld lang syne.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW TO SHOW YOUR ORCHID

For all of you entering orchid plants in the OQ exhibit the following information must be sent to the people doing the orchid plant registration for OQ. For Orchid Quest the information must go to Ken Cameron (kmcameron@wisc.edu) and to Lynn West (LynneWest15@yahoo.com) by February 2. No additions after February 2, but we MUST know about any deletions as soon as possible.

What we need from you by Monday, February 2 is:

- The COMPLETE Orchid name copied off the orchid's name tag
- If it is a species the last part of the name will be lower case.
- If it is a hybrid it should be all in Capital letters and any awards listed (i.e. AM/AOS)
- If it is a named hybrid, please include the parental names used in the cross
- If the parentage is not listed on the tag,

please research by Googling the name to find the parentage. This is important

- If you still cannot find it ask Chuck or Ken for assistance.
- With 100 plants in the exhibit, the registration people do not have hours to research your crosses, so please make every effort to find the parentage.
- The parentage helps the judges evaluate your plant correctly
- If an unknown orchid please list it as such, using flower for the correct class

Please include the correct CLASS for your orchid plant. Remember only you are responsible for the correct class entry of your plants.

Come to the meeting on Sunday, January 18 with questions on how to class your orchid.

Remember some classes depend upon size and/or color of the flower which only YOU know.
