May Meeting Re-Cap

The very successful 2023-2024 Orchid show and meeting season came to a close on May 19th. At this last meeting of the year the members voted on a slate of candidates for the open Board of Directors positions. Sue Reed renewed as OGG president and Nancy Thomas renewed as OGG Member at Large. New to the Board of Directors is Ken Cameron, who will take over the position of Treasurer for Denise Baylis.

Even though most orchids are at the end of their blooming cycle, we once again had beautiful table plants for ribbon judging. The meeting agenda didn't allow for a detailed discussion of individual table plants, but the quality of the plants was undeniable.

A silent auction of members' orchids, house plants, and miscellaneous supplies was ongoing from the start of the meeting until after the speaker's talk. Members brought in an incredible number of plants and supplies. All but two orchids were sold to members. Thanks to everyone who bid on plants and to those who organized and ran the event.

The speaker was Nick Rust, owner, and founder of Rusty Exotics Orchids. He has only been hybridizing orchids since 2018, focusing on Habenaria but had a large number of crosses to analyze during the talk. His talk provided a basic overview of the breeding traits of the species used in the hybrids. The colors and shape of the blooms are spectacular and unique. If you are interested in adding Habenaria to your collection but aren't quite sure if you can meet their needs, then check out the cultural document available on his website. This is not a one or two paragraph culture summary. The cultural guide is 13 pages and includes many color photos to add clarity to the text. Nick provided a discount code to OGG members interested in purchasing plants. Thank you Nick for the discount and for providing the updated list of available plants.



Dendrobium cuthbertsonii': One Member's Obsession

I am obsessed with our *Dendrobium cuthbertsonii's* or, as we call them at home, "The Babies" and hope one day to have a *D. cuthbertsonii* forest! I haven't had these cuthbertsoniis very long. My daughter bought her plant at Orchid Quest 2024. I bought two of mine from Golden Gate Orchids and another from an individual sale. Even though I haven't had them an entire growing season, they are developing new growths and buds in their current growing conditions, and I am exploring ways to grow them outside. I am looking forward to stretching my skills to find how to keep these cool-loving plants that like to be wet-all-the-time- but-not-too-wet happy as my house goes through its seasonal changes.

The fact that their flowers are bigger than the plants and are very long lasting really adds to the appeal of my growing area, and I wasn't aware until recently that they come in so many colors. Also, I find it so appealing to have a tiny, flowering plant in a 1.25" pot - like something that belongs in a doll's house.

It is also rewarding to grow a plant some consider fussy. Two years ago, I bought a *Sophronitis coccinea* at Orchid Quest. Standing in line to buy the plant, the customer behind me said I shouldn't get it, because they are difficult to grow, but I always wanted one and bought it anyway. That plant never looked back even with some neglect while I was traveling and even rewarded me with flowers this year.

My daughter grows the first one we got and does it all wrong by what information is out there on them. She waters hers with well water. It lived in an east-facing window until the sun got too hot the beginning of May. Now it lives under a combo of LED and T5 grow lights over a humidity tray. The light can best be described as "intermediate," where paphs and phals do well. This plant has never had a bad day and has developed many new growths and flowers since she acquired it. It is potted in sphagnum moss and gets 1/2 strength MSU fertilizer in distilled water weekly and Kelpak added every 2-3 weeks.

When I got my first one, it was living in a 1.25" pot filled with sphagnum moss. My plan was to put it next to her plant in the east-facing window. After 3 days, I realized it didn't like that as it developed several red leaves. I immediately moved it under the lights over the humidity tray, and slowly it rebounded. I water it twice weekly with distilled water, spray it with fine mist distilled water mid-day every day, and follow the same feeding schedule as my daughter's plant. This is new territory for me: plants that like to be wet all the time but not too wet. The mounted specimens are a lot more straightforward. They get watered every day with distilled water and misted mid-day. They also have the same feeding schedule. Any morning there are no rain storms, I round them all up to set out on the porch to experience the cool temperature and early morning sun for a few hours. I never risk letting the moss in the pots get old and stale. If it becomes discolored, I replace it.



As part of our Mission Statement, OGG supports orchid conservation and we have supported a variety of organizations in the past. This year the board has authorized the donation to go to the Orchid Conservation Alliance. This organization forms partnerships with local organizations and foundations for the preservation of biodiverse, orchid-rich habitat in South America and they are open to supporting creation of orchid preserves else where in the world. They also fund raise by sponsoring educational ecotours around the world.

This year our donation was targeted at the Salvamontes Reserve, Colombia. The reserves of Corporación Salvamontes include all three known sites of *Dracula lemurella* and many other endemic orchids of the region.


I'll have Brats and Burgers. Please bring your favorite dish to pass, beverage(s), a chair, good weather and a smile!
