ORCHID QUEST (OQ) Orchid Growers Guild of Madison February 1 - 2, 2025

The Show

1. General Information

Orchid Quest 2025, sponsored by the Orchid Growers Guild of Madison, will be held at Monona Terrace, 1 John Nolen Dr, Madison, WI, 53703 with public hours from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, February 1, and from 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, February 2, 2025.

2. Requests for Exhibition

Requests for exhibition space should be sent to the Orchid Growers Guild (OGG, P.O. Box 5432, Madison, WI 53705). A reasonable effort will be made to provide the amount of space requested, but should space be less than planned, the Show Chairs reserve the right to limit space allocated to the exhibitor.

3. Exhibit Set-up and Take-down

Exhibitors may set up exhibits from 9:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Friday, January 31, 2025. Entries for judging will be accepted until 5:00 p.m. Subsequent entries may be exhibited but not judged. All entries whether or not entered for ribbon judging will be considered for A.O.S. judging unless otherwise marked by the exhibitor. All exhibits must be left in place until 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, February 2, 2025.

4. Show Judging

Show judging will begin promptly at 7:15 a.m. on Saturday, February 1, 2025.

5. Important Change in Show book

Due to the new location for our show with limited space for exhibits, we have to modify the types of exhibits. We anticipate that we will not have room for Art entries and Orchids in use, in classes 114-120. We are sorry for this exclusion, and we hope to allow these classes to be exhibited in future shows.

JUDGING PROCEDURES

1. General information

This show has been approved for American Orchid Society (AOS) judging and therefore must comply with the current rules of the American Orchid Society's Handbook on Judging and **Exhibition** and any interim rules issued by the AOS Judging Committee. At the show there must be three or more judges accredited by the American Orchid Society (AOS). The decisions of these judges will be final. The American Orchid Society system of judging will be used in all events. The show schedule and orchid classification will follow the Mid-America Orchid Congress guidelines, updated summer of 2020 as listed **below.** All judges and clerks are expected to familiarize themselves with the show rules. All plants will be considered for recognition based on present quality, without regard to previous awards. To maintain highly competitive standards, no trophies or other recognition will be awarded if, in the judges' opinions, the flower, the plant, or the exhibit does not warrant such recognition. Judges may subdivide or add additional classes for awards at their discretion.

2. AOS Awards

This show has been approved for AOS judging. **All named flowers**, whether entered for ribbon judging or not, will be considered for AOS awards unless otherwise marked "**Not for AOS Judging"** by the exhibitor. *If the flowers have previously been exhibited at an AOS-approved function, they are considered to have been screened and therefore are not eligible for further consideration. They should be marked,* "**Not for AOS Judging.**" This will not disqualify the flower from consideration in the proper ribbon or trophy class. Submission of plants for judging shall obligate the exhibitor to accept any award granted and to pay any fees connected with such an award except where they have clearly indicated before the judging that their entry is not to be AOS judged.

3. Ribbon Judging

First, second, and third place ribbons may be awarded to the best three (3) entries in each class other than a trophy class. Multiple ribbons may be awarded or withheld at the judges' discretion. All plants and cut flowers must be correctly entered

in the appropriate class, or reclassified by a judge, to be eligible for ribbon judging (it is the exhibitors' responsibility to properly enter their plants). Judges may, at their discretion, split up classes for ease of judging, thereby giving 2-3 first, 2-3 second, and/or 2-3 third ribbons depending upon the division -- up to 3 sections of a class.

A spreadsheet will be available on the OGG website (https://orchidgrowersquild.org/orchidguest) for entering items for judging, requiring to be listed: name of the plant, including any clonal name (if assigned), previous awards, hybrid parentage (if known), the judging class, and coded ownership of the plant or item. Exhibitors will enter their plants by providing an electronic version of the plant registration information by furnishing a memory stick with the Excel spreadsheet registration information to the plant registration desk on Friday, January 31, by 5 p.m. Computer generated judging show tags will be printed for all items entered for judging. After completing the registration of the material, the printed registration tag goes on the plant. A copy of the 2025 Orchid Ouest Show book will be at the entry desk.

The OQ Show Rule book closely follows the MAOC Show Schedule (https://midamericanorchids.org/education). All ribbons and Best of Classes are at the discretion of the judges.

Where a plant could conceivably fit into more than one class, the exhibitor shall enter it into the first applicable class listed. A mericlone is considered a vegetative division of the original plant and must be treated as such. If a plant is a *mericlone*, it should be so designated, and the *clonal* name given. Species classes will include natural hybrids. Criteria employed in ribbon class definitions refer to characteristics prevailing for mature plants grown according to normal horticultural practices.

Plants can only be entered into **one** class, with the **exception** of **Class 112 Seedling flowering for the first time from Classes 11-111** and **Class 113 Specimen plant.**

This 2025 Orchid Quest Show Book will be posted on the OGG website, www.orchidgrowersguild.org.

4. Trophies and Special Awards

All trophies (Best of Class Awards) and Special Awards are open to all exhibitors in this show, provided the exhibit is entered properly and show rules are complied with, unless otherwise specified in this Show Book. Best of Class Awards: a minimum of two first place ribbons must be given in the group of classes for a Best of Class Award to be given.

5. Plant Trophies

In order to be eligible for any special awards, plants and exhibits must be entered for ribbon judging. No separate entry is required.

6. Exhibit Trophies

Each exhibit may be entered in *ONE CLASS ONLY*. All exhibits must be entered through the computerized digital registration system of OQ. The printed registration tag goes on the exhibit. All exhibits are eligible for the AOS Show Trophy and will be judged in accordance with the criteria in the current *AOS Handbook on Judging and Exhibition*. Any other exhibit trophies shall be determined by the sponsoring organization.

SHOW CLERKS

There are two types of <u>registration clerks</u> and each has a different responsibility:

- 1. **Classification registration clerk**. Reviews entries to ensure proper show schedule classification, checks to see that the plant name, exhibit and exhibitor information are correct. *Note: The exhibitor is ultimately responsible for the correct classification of an entry.*
- 2. Entry registration clerk. Located at the entry registration desk, clerk(s) receive plant/exhibit digital entries from exhibitors; proper entry numbers are generated and subsequently added to the other entries in the same class via computer. These responsibilities are often shared by two or more people.

Three types of **show (ribbon) judging clerks** assist the judges during the judging process:

- Head Clerk. Responsible for the efficient performance of the judging process. This also includes recording the decisions of the judges, making a record of the awards given, and leading the judges to the next class to consider. When personnel are available, this person should be assisted by additional clerks.
- 2. **Ribbon clerk**. Responsible for maintaining the ribbon supply, <u>adding class</u>, <u>entry number and date</u> to each ribbon awarded, obtaining the signatures of the judges, and placing the ribbons in accordance with the awards granted.
- 3. **Spotter**. Assists in locating exhibits and plants plus any other duties that may be assigned.

During the show judging clerks are **not** to participate in the process unless asked to do so by the judges. Judges are encouraged to make ribbon judging an educational experience for all involved. Ultimately, the judges' decisions will be used to determine the results of competitive awards. Further deliberations, when verbally expressed, <u>must not be repeated</u> or discussed with others.

SHOW RULES AND REGULATIONS

All exhibitors are expected to familiarize themselves with the show schedule and exhibition guidelines.

- 1. Each exhibitor agrees upon entry to abide by the rules and regulations of the show. All questions regarding the interpretation of these rules shall be referred to the Show Judging Chair, Cheryl Erins, for a decision.
- 2. Exhibitors may register as many entries in a class as they desire.
- 3. Each plant shall be entered into <u>ONE</u> class only, except Classes 112 Seedlings flowering for the first time and 113 Specimen plants, which may be entered in more than one class.

- 4. Improperly entered plants/exhibits may be either reclassified or disqualified at the discretion of the judges.
- 5. In order to sell orchid plants at the show, a vendor must place a tabletop exhibit with at least five blooming orchids in the show exhibit. Vendors not selling blooming plants must set up an orchid informational exhibit with permission from the Orchid Quest Show Chair. Exhibits must conform to the *quality* of the show in accordance with the Show Committee.
- 6. Foliage plants, moss, etc. may complement exhibits, but no artificial or dyed moss or foliage of any kind will be permitted with the exception of artificial grass used as a floor covering. Plants in flower or cut flowers other than orchids will not be permitted in an exhibit. Newly imported and un-established plants are discouraged in exhibits. No dyed flowers will be permitted.
- Neither the host society nor show sponsor is responsible for loss or damage to any plants, blooms, containers or other property of exhibitors. However, every precaution will be exercised for their safety.
- No lighting or water features are allowed in the exhibits without expressed permission by the Orchid Quest Show Chair.
- 9. All exhibits and plants must be properly labeled. Plant/exhibit ownership should not be visible prior to judging.
- No cut flowers will be permitted in flowering plant exhibits, and no flowering plants will be permitted in cut flower exhibits.

ORCHID CLASSIFICATION

- 1. Entries not in accordance with the schedule may be disqualified.
- 2. In general, plants should be entered in the first applicable class.
- 3. A meristem plant or cut flower may **not** be entered as a seedling blooming for the first time.
- 4. For purposes of this schedule, the word "hybrid" means a cross made within the genus listed unless preceded by the work 'intergeneric', in which case, two or more different genera are used in the cross.
- 5. For the purpose of this show, an amateur is defined as any person who has not sold more than a total of five hundred (500) plants and/or flowers in the last year.
- 6. Color Definition:
 - a) In general, blush colors and two-toned flowers should be entered in the "Other Colors" classifications with the exception of Phalaenopsis, which has a dedicated blush class.
 - b) Color in *Paphiopedilum* hybrids is based on the dominant flower color.
 - c) *Phalaenopsis* with 'harlequin coloring' should be entered in the class of the base color markings.

PROCEDURE FOR ENTRY OF PLANTS AND EXHIBITS

- 1. A separate entry must be made for each plant and exhibit.
- 2. Complete the computer-generated Excel form that was sent electronically (also posted on OGG website, http://www.orchidgrowersguild.org) prior to registration.

The Excel form contains instructions for entering information.

(orchidgrowersguild.org/OrchidQuest *drop down/* OrchidQuest/DOWNLOADS/Plant Exhibit Registration Forms & Directions.)

- 3. The ENTRY TAGS will be generated by computer. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to check and *confirm* that the *entries are correct before placing the tag on the plant, flower or exhibit.*
- 4. The EXHIBIT NUMBER, EXHIBITOR NUMBER and ENTRY NUMBERS are generated by the computer and printed on the ENTRY TAGS. They assist the clerks and judges in locating plants and exhibits during judging. On each ENTRY TAG the CLASS NUMBER for the entry is listed. Check show schedule for correct class. It is your responsibility to classify your entries correctly. Incorrect entries may be disqualified.
- 5. If the plant with the current bloom has been to a previous AOS judged event or if the exhibitor does not wish the plant to be considered for AOS judging, write "Not for AOS Judging" on the entry tag.
- Plants with no name or that are unregistered are still eligible for ribbon judging but should be listed as "Not for AOS Judging".

MID-AMERICA ENTRY SCHEDULE

EXHIBITS

Exhibits shall NOT be disqualified solely on the basis of size, but shall be moved to and judged in the appropriate size class. Therefore, judges are requested to judge exhibit classes from small to large size order. Tabletop exhibits are judged in the classes below according to their size (25 or 50 sq. ft.)

A. Open Competition

Trophy: Best of Classes 1 through 3

- **1**. Orchid plants in flower, arranged for effect, 25 square feet maximum.
- **2.** Orchid plants in flower, arranged for effect, 50 square feet maximum.
- **3.** Orchid plants in flower, arranged for effect, more than 50 square feet
- 4. Educational exhibits, no space limitations
- **5.** No class 5

B. Orchid Societies Affiliated with the American Orchid Society

Trophy: Best of Classes 6 through 8

- **6.** Orchid plants in flower, arranged for effect, 25 square feet maximum.
- **7**. Orchid plants in flower, arranged for effect, 50 square feet maximum.

8. Orchid plants in flower, arranged for effect, more than 50 square feet.

C. Amateur Competition

Trophy: Best of Classes 4, 9, and 10

- **9.** Orchid plants in flower, arranged for effect, 25 square feet maximum.
- **10.** Orchid plants in flower, arranged for effect, more than 25 square feet.

D. Cattleya Alliance

Trophy: Best of Classes 11 through 16

- 11. Epidendrum, Encyclia and Prosthechea species.
- **12.** *Epidendrum*, *Encyclia*, and *Prosthechea* hybrids and intergenerics, but **excluding** *Cattleya* and *Guarianthe*.
- **13.** Brassavolla and Rhyncholaelia species, hybrids and intergenerics other than above but **excluding** Cattleya and Guarianthe.
- **14.** Broughtonia species, hybrids and intergenerics other than above but **excluding** Cattleya and Guarianthe.
- **15.** Laelia species, hybrids and intergenerics other than above, but **excluding** Cattleya and *Guarianthe*.
- **16.** Cattleya allied genera species other than above.(Excluding *Cattleya* and *Guarianthe*)

Trophy: Best of Classes 17 through 27

- **17**. *Cattleya* species and *Guarianthe* species flowers 4 inches or less.
- **18**. Cattleya species and Guarianthe species flowers larger than 4 inches .
- **19.** Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Lavender/Mauve, flower 4 inches or less.
- **20.** Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Lavender/Mauve, flowers larger than 4 inches.
- **21.** Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, White, Semi-alba.
- **22.** Cattleya and *Guarianthe* hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Yellow/Orange flowers 4 inches or less.
- **23.** Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Yellow/Orange, flowers larger than 4 inches.
- **24.** Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above Red/Red shades, flowers 4 inches or less.
- **25.** Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Red/Red Shades, flowers larger than 4 inches.
- **26.** Cattleya and Guarianthe hybrids and intergenerics other than above, Other Colors
- **27.** *Cattleya* allied genera hybrids and intergenerics other than above.

E. Cypripedium Alliance

Trophy: Best of Classes 28 through 30

- **28.** *Paphiopedilum* species, normally one flower when mature.
- **29.** *Paphiopedilum* species, normally two or more flowers when mature
- **30.** Paphiopedilum species, sequential blooming.

NOTE: A primary hybrid has a <u>species</u> as each parent.

Trophy: Best of Classes 31 through 36
