The coming division in the United Methodist Church-

A series of articles to answer questions many people have.

Part 1. History

The UMC was formed in 1968 by a merger between "The Methodist Church" and the "Evangelical United Brethren Church". At its formation, the membership was about 11 million, virtually all in the US. Since 1968, US membership has steadily declined and stands today at about 7 million. Meanwhile, the UMC began a strong global evangelization effort so that by 2020, there are about 5.5 million members outside the US, for a total membership of about 12.5 million.

Over this period, the US membership has become more polarized over scriptural understanding. The progressive viewpoint increasingly focused on social justice issues and "inclusiveness" at the expense of Biblical teachings. Some would say the effort followed secular trends of increasingly liberal social norms.

Meanwhile, the more traditional members continued Biblical interpretations and social norms they considered true to 2000 years of Christianity. They do not see the most recent 40 years of social revolution as any basis for rejecting historical Biblical teachings.

Most surveys and informed opinions show the 7 million US members divided somewhere between 60-40 and 40-60 around these points of view. There are many shades of gray and lots of people who would rather not have to explicitly decide.

For a number of reasons, the leadership of the US conferences has become predominantly progressive. In particular, the US Bishops are considered at least 75% progressive. The process for Bishop selection, as well as the process for accountability for doctrinal disobedience does not permit a majority of lay members a way to reverse this liberal trend in leadership.

On a world basis, the majority of UMC laity are decisively traditional in their views of Biblical teachings, since most lay members outside the US live in very traditional cultural settings. <u>Thus, we have a worldwide majority traditional</u> <u>membership led by unremovable progressive Bishops.</u>

The real turning point in the last few years has been a change in tactics by progressive lay members, Pastors, and Bishops. Unable to change the rules that govern key social principles, many progressive Pastors, Bishops and lay members have engaged in deliberate disobedience to several doctrinal principles. This unaccountable disobedience has led to a broken and dysfunctional organization.

The most recent big step to solve this broken organization's dilemma is a <u>broad consensus that a peaceful separation</u> <u>must take place</u>. The present rules for separation do not have a fair process.

The leaders of this consensus plan come from all sides of the divide. Thanks be to God that such a reconciliation through separation has become very likely.

This separation plan is called "A Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation". Copies of this agreement are available on many UMC, WCA, Good News and other websites. Paper copies are on the fellowship hall table.

Because of Covid-19 concerns, the vote to implement this separation is delayed until September 2021, rather than the much anticipated May 2020 GC which was cancelled.

Missions Report:

You may recall that back in December 2019, at the time of our Mission's budget distribution, the mission's committee reported on our giving to local ministries and to those in the USA. In those instances we could send directly to the mission without having to pass the money through the UMC Conference. However, direct giving was difficult when it came to those missions we support that are outside the USA. The Wesleyan Covenant Association had established a matching fund program to encourage giving to the Central Conference The term Central Conference refers to all those countries which the UMC supports in Africa, the Philippines and Russia. By sending our, out of country, mission support money to the WCA earmarked for the Central Conference we were able to continue our support of the African ministries at double our giving. Below is their report on how they are using the funds like we as WCA members sent to them. Many progressive-liberal United Methodists in the US have opted to punish African United Methodists by withholding their apportionments. In response the WCA has actively sought to replace these funds with donations from its membership. Here's an exciting report on the results of this campaign.

Central Conference Ministry Fund Keeps Vital Projects Moving Forward

Over the past eight months the Wesleyan Covenant Association has made ministry grants totaling \$205,687 to 11 projects in Africa and Russia. The grants were disbursed from the association's <u>Central Conference Ministry Fund</u>, a fund established in the aftermath of the 2019 special General Conference. Some U.S. annual conferences and local churches withdrew support for some ministries due to disagreements over <u>The United Methodist Church's adoption of the Traditional Plan</u>. Seeded by a \$100,000 WCA grant, the fund has attracted an additional \$235,000 in gifts from WCA members and friends to date. Additional grants totaling at least \$100,000 will be made in November 2020.

Grants have been made to ministries in Angola, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Kenya, Liberia, Russia, and Zimbabwe, and have funded a wide variety of projects, including theological education, construction of churches, schools, and health clinics, provision for clean water, and revitalization of hospitals.
