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FROM THE DISTRICT DIRECTOR'S DESK—NANCY J. REDINGTON

Director's Message

I cannot wait for the "End of Winter". . . Both the meteorological event and the big fun weekend for Rosarians everywhere. For Penn-Jersey District, the "**End of Winter Weekend**" can only mean one thing, spring is surely just ahead and it is time to get together for a weekend of rose friends and rose talk. By popular demand, this year's End of Winter Weekend programs will be centered on the photographic side of our hobby. The Penn-Jersey district is blessed with some great photographers and many of them will be sharing their skills and insights with us. This is a great opportunity to come and spend one on one time with your camera and folks that know how to really use them.

As a precursor to the Friday night welcome, **Bruce Monroe** has made arrangements for a **Horticulture Judge's Audit** on Friday afternoon. This is the only Horticulture audit available at this time for our judges to recertify for the next 2 years. I urge any and every member who can to attend this program to do so. Even if you don't have to audit, it is foolish to not avail yourself of this opportunity. Also it means more time with your friends.

Another feature of the weekend will be a chance to meet and greet the two candidates that are running for the **American Rose Society Vice-Presidency**. Every 3 years we ask someone to take on the responsibility of becoming the Vice-President and then after that term, to assume the presidency for another three years. This triennial election is also the time that we select the **District Director, Regional Director, and the PJ member for the National Nominating Committee**. The District Director and Regional Director positions, when contested, are elected on an electronic ballot during the summer along with the **ARS Vice-President** position. The District National Nominating Committee member will be affirmed or elected (if there are two candidates) at the End of Winter weekend meeting. This is the same procedure that is used in all of the Districts and Regions.

The third position of **Regional Director for District 1** is open. **Elaine Adler** is finishing up her second 3 year term in this position and ,therefore, cannot succeed herself for a third term. We thank her very much for her commitment and willingness to bring the concerns and wishes of our District to the full Board during these last 6 years.

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The Penn Jersey District is unique. But then you knew that. Seriously, we have 2 Regional Directors. When this Regional Director position was conceived, it was decided to, after the District Directors were elected by their Districts, that a Regional Director be established. The thinking of the time was to assist in communication and resources. In this age of email, that part of the function is not used as frequently. The other resource that they were to bring to the board was one of experience. Usually the Regional Director is a person who would have already served on the Board as a District Director. Having served a previous term(s) of either 3 or 6 years, it was thought that the experience of this person would also be an asset to the running of the ARS. Actually in the By-Laws, it states that they are to assist with membership and fundraising.

That being said, I mentioned that Elaine has been our representative for the Pennsylvania members of the Penn-Jersey District. The New Jersey folks are represented by David Long from Connecticut. Reason: the New Jersey Zip Code starts with a zero and Pennsylvania Zip starts with a 1. The Penn-Jersey District is the only District in the ARS to be split into two regions.

So, Region 1 is composed of Pennsylvania and New York (Zip Codes that start with a 1). This year we have two individuals running for **Region 1 Director, Bruce Monroe** from Philadelphia and Del-Chester Rose Societies and **Lois Fowkes** from the **New York District**. This will be a contested election and, therefore, be elected by electronic ballot at the same time as the ARS Vice-Presidency in the summer.

I mentioned the other position of National Nominating Committee Person. This is also a three year term and **Gus Banks** has just finished his first of 2 possible 3 year terms. The election of this position will take place at the End of Winter Weekend meeting.

If you are an exhibitor or you really like flower shows, you are in for a very special year. This June, the Columbus area of the ARS will be hosting a super duo. At one time, they will be putting on the **Spring National Convention** along with the **2015 National Miniature Rose Show**. This will be an unbelievable chance to see the best and the brightest in arrangers, and exhibitors. All the **National Rose Show** spring trophies along with the **National Miniature Rose Show** trophies will be available. This will happen in the second weekend in June. Of course, that is also our usual show time for the Penn-Jersey District. Several societies are opting out of a show this year in order for their members to experience a national event. And if that isn't enough. Penn-Jersey is joining with Syracuse and the New York District to put on the **Fall National Rose Show** in Syracuse. Last fall, we voted to combine our efforts with our friends to the north and put on a great event. Our trophies will be there for competition along with the national fall trophies. At this time, our **Pat Shanley, ARS Vice-President**, (Noticed I claimed her for ourselves, as she is in Region 1) will be installed at the **President of the American Rose Society**. This will be a great fun event. The last time a President of the ARS came from our area was when **Frank Benardella** took on that mantle. So local girl does "**Great**" and we want to be there to cheer her on as she leads us forward to a very productive three year commitment of service

And a final congratulations to the district as a whole. The **Frank Benardella Trophy** is officially complete. It will again be offered at the next **Mini National Show**, this spring in Columbus, Ohio. Our hope is that the winners will again bring it back to the district. The site for the **2016 Mini National Show** was awarded to the **York Area Rose Society** and the convention will be held on the last weekend in July just north of Harrisburg. Wouldn't it be great if we could start the trophy out with a trifecta of Penn-Jersey winners.

Another great feature is the raffle extravaganza. Let's be honest. We love it. There is an extra twist this year. **Elaine Adler** and **Pat Bilson** have secured for the district a treasure trove of arranger supplies. They gave a donation for this bulk of material, with district funds, so that we could resell it to our members. Supplies like these are really a treasure. We all know the expression –*"They don't make it like they used to."* Well that is true, and these arranger items are from the past when quality in Kenzans was the standard. This alone should give every rosarian a chance to get those needed supplies to get out there and exhibit. Along with **Leslie Cox's** exquisite handmade goodies, who needs outlets in order to shop?

My final hope is that with our decision to move our weekend to the first full weekend in March, we will have helped to eliminate these constant snowfalls and we will have a sunny, dry weekend to start off a great rose season of 2015.

Plan Now for the Penn-Jersey District Spring Forward Rose Photo Contest

If you haven't already done so, prepare your color picture prints for the **Penn-Jersey District Spring Forward Rose Photo Contest** so that you can enter them next **February**.

The photo contest is open to any photographer who is either a member of the Penn-Jersey District and/or who has registered for the 2015 End-of-Winter Rose Weekend. Exhibitors do not have to attend the End-of-Winter Rose Weekend to enter the competition and need not be present to win.

Each photo entry must be an unmatted 5"x7" color print. Mail entries with your name, the class number, and the name of rose or other photo identification attached to the back of the photo to: Bruce Monroe, 3030 Maple Shade Lane, Wilmington, DE 19810-3424. **All entries must be received by February 9, 2015.** Although not required, contact information, a phone number and/or an email address, would be appreciated.

Except for the novice class (class 1), exhibitors are limited to two entries per class. Entries in excess of two per exhibitor per class in classes 2-14 will not be considered for awards. Novice exhibitors may enter up to five photos in class 1 and may enter other classes as well, provided the same photo is not entered in more than one class. The Novice class is open only to those exhibitors who have won three or fewer blue ribbons in previous district and national photo contests.

All roses, gardens, and activities must be correctly identified. Rose photos will be evaluated 50% on exhibition quality of the rose and 50% on photographic excellence. Arrangement photos will be judged 50% on the arrangement design and flower quality and 50% on photographic excellence. Classes 11-14 will be judged on photographic excellence only.

All photos entered will be on display and final judging and awards will be made at the End-of-Winter Rose Weekend, **March 6-8, 2015**, in New Cumberland, PA. The judges' decision is final. Ribbons will be given in each class and awards to the top three photos overall.

All rights to the submitted photos are retained by the owners of the photos. However, by entering the contest, the owner agrees to allow the Penn-Jersey District of the American Rose Society to display the photo at the 2015 End-of-Winter Rose Weekend and publish the photo in the District Newsletter, the **Rose Vine**. Owners who enter photos that win blue ribbons also agree to allow the local rose societies in the Penn-Jersey district to publish their winning photos in the societies' newsletters.

Please note the following definitions:

An **exhibition bloom** is a specimen that has one bloom per stem without side buds. Unwanted side growth, side buds and/or spent blooms may be removed from any specimen to improve the appearance. At its most perfect phase of possible beauty an exhibition bloom is generally one-half to two-thirds open, gracefully shaped with sufficient petals symmetrically arranged in a circular outline, and tending to a high center. An **open bloom** must have the stamens showing. A **spray** has two or more blooms per stem with or without unopened side buds. Roses classified as **single or semi-double roses** by the ARS are generally at their most perfect phase when fully open.

- Class 1:** Novice Class – Photo appropriate for any of Classes 2-14.
- Class 2:** One Exhibition Bloom, Hybrid Tea, Grandiflora, or Floribunda—no side buds
- Class 3:** One Exhibition Bloom, Miniature or Miniflora – no side buds
- Class 4:** One Open Bloom, Hybrid Tea, Grandiflora, or Floribunda (other than roses classified as single or semi-double varieties by the ARS)—no side buds
- Class 5:** One Open Bloom, Miniature or Miniflora (other than roses classified as single or semi-double varieties by the ARS)—no side buds
- Class 6:** One Open Bloom of a Hybrid Tea, Grandiflora, Floribunda, Miniature, or Miniflora classified as a Single or Semi-Double by the ARS—no side buds
- Class 7:** One Spray, Hybrid Tea, Grandiflora, Floribunda, Polyantha, Miniature or Miniflora
- Class 8:** One Bloom or Spray, Species or Old Garden Rose—side buds permitted
- Class 9:** One Bloom or Spray, Shrub or Climber –side buds permitted
- Class 10:** A Rose Arrangement (identify arranger, if known)
- Class 11:** A Rose Garden (identify garden)
- Class 12:** A Rose Society Activity (identify society and activity)
- Class 13:** Rose Potpourri—a horticulture specimen that does not fit the criteria for Classes 1-9. For example, an extreme close-up. rose hips, foliage, hybrid tea or miniature blooms with side buds, multiple sprays, critters in the garden, portion of a rosebush with companion plants, snow on roses, etc.

Horticulture Judging Update at the End of Winter Rose Gathering

There will be an update for horticulture judges on the afternoon of Friday, March 6, 2015, at the Clarion Hotel and Conference Center in New Cumberland, PA, as part of the End of Winter Rose Weekend (A/KA the “Winter Meeting”). Speakers include: **Bruce Monroe, Curtis Aumiller, and Diane Wilkerson.** Judges from all districts are welcome to attend.

Horticulture judges are required to attend an update at least once every four years and are encouraged to do so more frequently. Because of the Penn-Jersey District’s participation in the ARS Fall National Meeting, September 9-13, 2015, in Syracuse, New York, **the Penn-Jersey District will not have a horticulture judging school and update in the fall of 2015. The next update will not occur until at least 2017.** Penn-Jersey horticulture judges should have received an email that indicates when they will be required to update. Horticulture judges who need to update in 2015 and 2016 should plan to attend this program. All other horticulture judges, as well as anyone who wants to learn about rose judging, are welcome to attend.

ARE YOU A CONSULTING ROSARIAN? WOULD YOU LIKE TO BE ONE?

I kept saying “No” to being a Consulting Rosarian. Finally, they wore me down and I said, “Yes.” And, I found out it wasn’t that bad being a Consulting Rosarian. Anyway, I had been doing most of the things for which Consulting Rosarian is responsible all along. To be a consulting rosarian, you have to attend a **Consulting Rosarian School** and take a test. After attending 12 years of school, then 4 years of college, classes for work, then more college classes, I was schooled out. The word “test” sent shivers up my spine! This “school” turned out to be very enjoyable. Gus Banks did most of the presentation of the information for the consulting rosarian school. He did his usual “If it flies, it dies.” presentation along with very pertinent information on chemicals. Chemicals were the hardest part for me. The test itself wasn’t so bad because it was an open book test. To keep up your accreditations as a consulting rosarian, you must renew your Consulting Rosarian status every 4 years by taking 4 credits (1 of which is chemical safety) of approved subjects. It is easy to do because there are usually credits available at local, district, national meetings and conventions.

There were quite a few of us that day. Great friendships, laughter, and learning. I have found that when I am out and about in garden centers and such places and I hear someone trying to decide what type of roses to buy, I try to be helpful and ask if they want any help. Most garden centers welcome any free help they can get. However, when asked about chemicals, I tell the person to make sure to read the label. I do not get involved in chemical discussions because I use a no spray program. If you do not feel comfortable is giving someone information on a specific topic, refer them to the ARS website for more information. So give it a try – you’ll enjoy being a Consulting Rosarian.

Frank Benardella National Challenge Trophy

The Penn-Jersey District has been trying to establish a fitting trophy to honor the late Frank Benardella since his passing. A committee to create the Frank Benardella National Challenge Trophy was assembled last year consisting of Penn-Jersey District Director, Nancy Redington, PJ Trophy Chair, Bill Kozemchak, PJ Treasurer, Georgie Papale, and Andrew Hearne. The District also agreed to fund a start up for the trophy. I'd like to thank Andrew Hearne, who got the ball rolling by contacting Sandy Lundberg to get information on how the Top Gun Award was established and submitting the forms to appropriate committees for their approval with some assistance from his lovely new wife Julie. The timeline was quite tight as we wished to be able to award this for the first time at the Mini National Convention in Marlton, New Jersey in July. We had a lot of help from many of Frank's friends around the country in support of this effort including Jolene Adams, Pat Shanley, Jim Hering, Lois Fowlkes, Tommy Cairns, Luis Desamero, Bob Martin, John Mattia, Sandy Lundberg, and so many others.

The next step was to come up with an appropriate national trophy. A few ideas were kicked around and we thought rather than something that mimicked an existing one, we would like something more original. Andrew found glass artist, Will Dexter, of Taylor Backes in Boyertown, Pennsylvania who does work similar to Dale Chihuly. We thought it would also be nice to have someone who resides in our district to create the trophy. The committee met with Will to come up with a design and then again to choose from several different prototypes for the final one. The trophy is a bowl type design of red coloring faded dark at the top to clear at the bottom to represent many of Frank's famous miniature and miniflora roses. It sits on a clear glass block inscribed with Benardella on the side. There is one base that stays with the trophy and each winner will get one to be inscribed as a "keepie trophy."

The ARS Board approved the trophy earlier this year at the San Diego ARS Spring Nationals and it was to be available for the first time in Mount Laurel in Frank's home state of New Jersey. I had the pleasure and honor of being able to attend the convention and call both June Benardella and Nancy Redington to tell them it had become a reality. Frank's wife, June, gave the final approval for the specification for the class which require seven different exhibition miniature blooms in separate containers. This specification was thought to make it available to many rose exhibitors, while still maintaining a challenge to have seven different excellent blooms. It was also decided not to require one or all of them to be Frank's roses as this would limit it or maybe force an exhibitor to use a lesser quality rose to meet the specifications. We didn't think this would be something he would want since he always thought the best quality should win.

The West Jersey Rose Society hosted the 2014 National Miniature Rose Show and Conference at the Hotel ML in Mount Laurel, New Jersey in July. This was the first conference and rose show to present the new Frank Benardella National Challenge Trophy. There were four entries in the class this year and all of great quality. Penn-Jersey's own Michael & Sally Wrightstone were the first winners of this new national trophy with the following roses: Renegade, Bee's Knees, Soroptimist International, Joy, Dr. Tommy Cairns, Ty, and Edisto. This included two roses bred by Frank, Soroptimist and Dr. Tommy Cairns. The Wrightstones were also winners of the Harm Saville Challenge Bowl, Miniflora King, Prince and Duchess, Miniature Duchess, Miniflora Spray Queen and Miniflora English Box. It was a very impressive show for them.

At dinner Penn-Jersey District Director, Nancy Redington, presented June Benardella with the first keepie block for the Benardella National Trophy inscribed for her on this special occasion. June and both her daughters Karen and Jane were able to be present for the inaugural presentation of the trophy. June and Nancy then presented Michael & Sally Wrightstone with the trophy. Nancy Redington and Bill Kozemchak also presented the Saville Challenge Trophy to the Wrightstones. It was wonderful to see this dream come true for all the Penn-Jersey District and Benardella family members. The fact that it was also won by one of our members made it even better. Mike and Sally made us proud! Sally told me winning this trophy was Mike's focus for the rose show.

A thank you should also go out to Nancy for spearheading and coordinating this effort and Joe Redington for serving as Nancy's chauffeur to Boyertown and also to our Treasurer, Georgie Papale for keeping track of all the funds and donations we received from outside donors. WINTER STORAGE OF POTTED ROSES

There are several options for newly rooted cuttings and roses in containers to make it over winter. Though my garden falls in zone 7, the microclimate in my garden makes it more like a zone 5 garden as it is in a high wind zone. I have used all of the options listed below successfully in my zone 7 garden.

1. The container can be kept indoors next to a sunny window.
2. After the first hard frost, keep the containers dormant in the garage over winter making sure that the soil doesn't dry out.
3. Keep the containers under a gro light in the basement. This option allows the plant to grow actively over the long winter and rewards you with beautiful blooms throughout the winter.

4. Plant the newly rooted cutting in the ground, put a glass jar over it and cover it with mulch leaving just the top of the bottle exposed to sunlight. This makes a nice greenhouse for each plant and the plant remains green in the bottle over winter.



5. Dig a trench and place all the containers in it. Fill soil up to the height of the containers. After the first hard frost when the leaves shed, bury the entire plant in mulch.

6. Make a cold frame for outdoor storage. After roses have gone dormant in fall, water containers thoroughly, store in cold frame and seal well for winter storage.



The option you choose will depend upon the amount of space you have indoors or outdoors.



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
