




A trans woman of color in the early stages of her transition learns to accept herself when welcomed into the sorority of sisterhood in the most sacred of places, the women's restroom.







## DIRECTORS Stewert

In the face of rising anti-trans and anti-LGBTQ+ legislation under the current Trump regime, our stories are more vital than ever. The systematic attempt to erase us, to deny our rights, and to strip away our dignity is a battle we must fight not just with activism and policy, but also through the power of storytelling. As a queer, female filmmaker, I believe in cinema as a form of resistance, a tool for social change, and a space for healing.

"Sorority" is more than a film—it is a call to action. It is a love letter to our trans sisters, a celebration of the resilience and beauty of trans lives, and a reclaiming of public spaces that have long been weaponized against us. This project is deeply personal to me. I grew up finding refuge in the women's restroom—a space that, despite society's constraints, often became a sanctuary for sisterhood, support, and self-discovery. I want to challenge the harmful narratives that paint these spaces as battlegrounds and instead show them as they truly are: places of connection, safety, and transformation.

At a time when trans women, particularly trans women of color, face increasing violence and discrimination, it is imperative that we create narratives that center their joy, their struggles, and their right to exist freely. "Sorority" is about chosen family, about the ways in which we uplift each other, and about the power of female solidarity. It is a direct challenge to those who seek to erase or dehumanize trans identities, a defiant act of love and visibility.

Through this film, I hope to spark urgent conversations and shift perspectives. Policies and statistics can inform, but stories have the power to change hearts. By immersing audiences in the lived experiences of our trans community, we cultivate empathy—something that is desperately needed in this political climate. More than that, we remind each other that we are not alone.

This project also serves as a rallying cry to my fellow cisgender queer women and the broader LGBTQ+ community. If we do not actively combat transphobia within our own spaces, we cannot hope to dismantle it in the world at large. Solidarity must be more than a buzzword—it must be an action. We must stand on the front lines for our trans siblings, amplifying their voices, protecting their rights, and celebrating their existence. Because if one of us is under attack, all of us are.

At its heart, "Sorority" is a film about love—love for our community, love for ourselves, and love as an act of defiance. In a world that seeks to silence us, joy is our rebellion. Visibility is our weapon. We must continue to tell our stories, to create art that refuses to be ignored, and to remind ourselves and each other: we are here, we are worthy, and we belong.





## PRODUCERS



On any given night, in public women's restrooms around the world, magic is happening. Friendships are formed, comfort is given, and confidence is discovered. Women share laughter and lip gloss, tears and tissues.

And yet, <u>more than a dozen states</u> have enacted laws banning transgender individuals from using restrooms consistent with their gender identity in schools, government-owned buildings and spaces, and more, making this necessary, familiar space the center of discrimination against transgender individuals.

"Sorority" seeks to reframe the narrative around transgender individuals and restrooms and capture the magic of a women's restroom in a fun, fast-paced snapshot, with a rotating cast of characters who show our protagonist, Fiona, that there's more than one way to be a woman.



Fiona's onscreen transformation is at the heart of "Sorority", but the transformational power of stories also plays a key role in the inspiration behind this film. As female-identifying queer and ally storytellers, we believe that stories, particularly those that highlight underrepresented and marginalized voices, have the power to transform hearts and minds. It's our hope that "Sorority", which celebrates the power of female community, can inspire more acceptance for and celebration of feminine presentation and values. As a love letter to our trans sisters, "Sorority" shows that everyone is worthy of love, both from their community and themselves.

Currently, "Sorority" has placed as a Semi-Finalist in the Outstanding Screenplays Shorts Competition.

# INCLUSIVE

Production is actively expanding upon and building a predominantly queer and/or female team in front of and behind the camera to uplift underserved filmmakers and ensure the authentic representation of the story.

"Sorority" was produced by a predominantly queer, all-female team with a 98% female-identifying, predominantly queer cast and crew.

Additionally, most of the production services – including fiscal sponsorship, camera rental, lighting gear, production insurance, and more – were secured through female and/or queer female-owned businesses. *The film is a true testament to the power of female and queer collaboration*.

As we face the immediate threat of **Project 2025** and the systematic dismantling of the rights of LGBTQIA+, Trans, and Female U.S. citizens, it is more critical than ever to tell stories for, about, and by these communities.

Trans, queer, and female representation on screen uplifts and empowers those who see themselves reflected in the characters and enlightens those who live outside these communities. Sharing stories that demonstrate connection and compassion creates empathy among audiences, challenging the ignorance and fear that leads to hatred and intolerance. It reminds us of our shared humanity, that we are all alike in our desire for belonging and acceptance.

As of November 2024, <u>the ACLU</u> is tracking 530 anti-LGBTQIA+ bills in 41 states, many of which specifically target members of the trans community. This includes bills restricting access to gender-affirming care for youth and adults; barring trans and nonbinary individuals from changing their gender on state-issued identification, and preventing trans student athletes from participating in school sports, *with some of the most controversial legislation targeting public restrooms*.

Accurate and authentic representations of trans and LGBTQIA+ characters play a pivotal role in combating this bigotry and ignorance. According to Megan Townsend, GLAAD Senior Director (Entertainment Research & Analysis), "We...know that 'portrayals in entertainment media' is one of the strongest positive influences on people's attitudes towards trans people, according to GLAAD's 2024 Accelerating Acceptance study, so telling authentic stories by and about the trans community is crucial at a time when a record number of anti-transgender bills are being introduced and passed."

## IN TRUMP'S 1ST MONTH IN

# Defending Women from Gender Ideology Extremism and Restoring Biological Truth to the Federal Government (January 20, 2025)

This order establishes federal policies that define sex strictly based on biological terms, recognizing only two genders—male and female. It rescinds previous executive orders related to gender identity and dissolves the White House Gender Policy Council.

## **Ending Radical and Wasteful Government DEI Programs and Preferencing (January 20, 2025)**

This order terminates Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) initiatives within the federal government, aiming to eliminate programs deemed as promoting "radical gender ideology."

## Ending Radical Indoctrination in K-12 Schooling (January 20, 2025)

This order directs the Department of Education to ensure that educational content aligns with the administration's definitions of sex and gender, prohibiting the promotion of concepts related to gender identity in K-12 schools.

## Restoring America's Fighting Force (January 27, 2025)

This order reverses previous policies accommodating gender identity in the military, effectively banning transgender individuals from enlisting and halting gender-affirming care for current service members.

### Protecting Children from Chemical and Surgical Mutilation (January 30, 2025)

This order directs federal agencies to prohibit the use of federal funds for gender-affirming medical procedures for minors, including hormone treatments and surgeries.

## Keeping Men Out of Women's Sports (February 5, 2025)

This order mandates that participation in women's sports at educational institutions be based on biological sex assigned at birth, effectively barring transgender women and girls from competing in female sports categories.

## National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year 2025

Signed into law on December 23, 2024, this act includes a provision that prohibits TRICARE, the military's health care program, from covering genderaffirming care for minors. This restriction affects military families seeking such care for their transgender children.

## Safeguarding American Values in Elections (SAVE) Act

Proposed by Representative Chip Roy, this bill mandates in-person proof of citizenship, such as a passport or birth certificate, for voter registration.

Critics argue that it could disproportionately affect married women who have changed their last names and transgender individuals with legal identity discrepancies, potentially restricting their voting access.


Telling meaningful LGBTQ stories is not just the right thing to do, it's also just smart business," according to the 2020 GLAAD Studio Responsibility Index & a recent CAA analysis found that, "female-led films outperform male-led films at all budget levels!" Audiences are craving original queer and female stories told by queer and female filmmakers, as the recent success of films like "Will & Harper," "I Saw the TV Glow," and "Love Lies Bleeding" demonstrates. These films show that, regardless of genre or form, there is much about the queer and trans experience that has yet to be explored and reflected in cinema.
