Pastor's Page:

Dear Friends,

A distinguished historian declared that, "Once the modern world convinced itself that nothing is real except what we can see, taste, and touch, the modern world has gone downhill ever since." Today's world seems to operate under the assumption that there is no reality, other than what we can see.

Mary Magdalene appeared at the tomb of Jesus early Easter morning. When she saw that the huge stone at the door of the tomb had been rolled away, and that the tomb was empty, she immediately saw what had happened. Obviously, someone had stolen the body of Jesus and she did not know where they had put him. Even when an angel appears and asks her why she is weeping, Mary still says that someone has stolen the body of Jesus.

Even when Jesus himself appears to Mary, she first thinks that the risen Christ is a gardener. Mary just can't get it out of her mind that she is at a cemetery, a place of death and loss. She can't refocus her eyes, even when the risen Christ is standing right in front of her.

What does it take to get us to see what is there? We've all had the frustrating experience of seeing something at some distant point across the landscape. And then we say to the friend beside us, gesturing as we speak, "Look, over there!" The friend looks, squints, but can't see. The thing is so obvious, so apparent. But the friend just can't get it. We attempt to point to certain landmarks, hoping that the friend will move from seeing those apparent objects to this less apparent thing we are trying to get them to see.

What enables us to see? What is it that turns our heads in the right direction, and brings everything into focus? For Mary it was the risen Christ. He did not leave her to rely on misperceptions, but rather he called to her. He turned her gaze away from what was expected and accustomed toward what was being revealed. Maybe that is why we call Christianity a revealed religion. You can't see it until it is revealed, given to you, until one has experienced the gift of the presence of the Risen Christ, and then one's eyes get in focus.

That's Easter. It wasn't just that Jesus was raised from the dead. It was that He was raised for us. He returned to his friends, revealed himself to them, and enabled them to see and to believe. They got a vision of who they were meant to be, of who they could be. Their world changed. May it be the same for all of us.

A big thank you to April Honan and her friend, Kerri, for teaching self-defense techniques after our pizza dinner in March. When we asked April for some information on her self-defense background so that we could "brag" a little about her and her school, this is what she shared...

My martial arts style is Goshin Jutsu karate. I have been practicing since July 2013. KJ started in February 2007, then Brandon in September 2010. The three of us have all earned our black belts. I am continuing to work for higher achievements, which would be a second degree black belt. There are 10 levels. My school is run by Shihan Frank Williams. Our school works with children ages 4 all the way through adult. We also have cardio classes every Tuesday evening and Saturday mornings. Women's self defense classes are taught monthly.

A couple interesting things about my journey is that I am only 1 of 3 female black belt instructors at my school. Only 10% of students reach the black belt status. Most leave at the yellow or brown belt level. My boys sat on the panel to judge my test. This was another first for our school. The dojo (school) has become my place of peace and safety. 




Slide 1 Expenses ('25 budget vs. '24 actual) are shown in a narrative style by combining various expenses in different categories versus by committee as in your annual report.






Slide 3 5 Year actual Income Sources (2020-2024) are shown. 1. Gifts from living donors trending up the last (3) years. 2. Financial Markets have done well the last (3) years. 3. Designated funds are almost depleted since being used along with the budget for some committees. 4. Previous year carry-over has not existed in the last (3) years since we have had deficient budgets.



Slide 4 Pledging Changes 1. Pledging units has had a steady decline in the last 10 years. 2. Dollars per pledging unit has had a steady increase for the last 10 years. 3. Total dollars pledged has been trending down, and flat the last 4 years until 2025. 4. Gifts from living donors (this includes both pledges, non-pledged offering envelopes and cash) has been trending down until the last 2 years.

General Endowment



Slide 5 General Endowment

- 1. 2023 and 2024 Financial Markets were good.
- 2. Markets helped us maintain our endowment, while we have been deficient spending and using principal and interest to balance our costs the last few years.
- 3. 2024 looks higher than it would have been without the sale of Clark Park which added \$166k to our endowment. Without that \$166k we would have where the RED box is. Very slight increase to endowment.
- 4. The risk is that as soon as our investments/financial markets do not perform at least at 9% level we will be reducing our endowment.
