Pastor's Page:

Dear Friends,

Allen Emery, the author of the delightful little book titled, A Turtle on the Fencepost, argued that if you see a turtle on a fencepost, you can be pretty sure that the turtle did not get there by itself. If that turtle brags about getting there itself, we know it is lying.

As people of faith, we give thanks and give credit to the one who has put us where we are. We are extravagantly grateful but we express our gratitude in a variety of ways. Our gratitude often reflects our unique personalities.

Brant Baker in his book, P.R.A.Y.E.R.: Guidance for Church Leaders, teaches in a rather fascinating way using the different personality types represented in the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator to show how people pray in different ways according to their personalities.

The first prayer mentioned is the Thomistic Prayer. This type of prayer is "logical; critical, demanding, likely to schedule even play time; communication tends to be precise."

The second type of prayer is what they call the Ignatian Prayer. This type of prayer "wants to feel useful; typical of givers, rather than receivers; practical; tends to enjoy ceremony and ritual; industrious; and always prepared."

The third type of prayer is called the Augustinian Prayer. The characteristics of their prayers: "usually creative, optimistic, tends to communicate with others easily; hates conflict, prefers face-to-face encounters; always searching for meaning, authenticity, and self-identity."

The final type of prayer is the Franciscan Prayer. This prayer is "free; unconfined; impulsive; dislikes being tied down to rules; loves action; good trouble-shooters; flexible and open-minded.

Do you fit into one of these four categories when you pray and express your gratitude to God? It's good to be aware of different personality types since we all don't express prayer and thanksgiving in the same way, even though we may be as authentic as the next person.

Finally, our core gratitude to God may be all that might be required. Meister Eckhart, the Christian mystic, once wrote that "if the only prayer we ever prayed our whole life was 'Thank you' that would be enough."

Bethany Women's Retreat 2023:



On Saturday, April 15th, 37 women and friends participated in a retreat, *Wonderfull World-Where Women Explore God's Wonder and Love*. This year we traveled to Europe, Australia, and South America. In the opening session, women began an imaginative journey by "visiting" Australia. We spent time in worship and read the Bible to explore one women's miraculous encounter with Jesus' love. (Mark 5:25-34). While in Europe, we delighted in the history of the European continent- and "became royalty" through a fun friendship-building experience. We explored the Bible's royal promises. (1 Peter 2:9-10) In South America, women discovered the blessings of amigas (friends) as they created their own version

of the ideal "Wonderful Friend". They explored the true power of God's eternal friendship in their lives, and spent time journaling in response to worship and Scripture. (Luke 8:42-50 and Philippians 4:13) We are grateful for this experience where women were able to relax and recharge their faith and friendships!

BPWC Budget Update: In March we received an additional \$550 in Pledges. Pledges to the end of March are now at \$3,795.00. In March we had two expenses. The first was for our March speaker, Jonathan Westfall in the amount of \$50 and the second for the purchase of yarn in the amount of \$28.61. This yarn will be used for our Afghan project. Total expenses to the end of March are \$672.88.

So now we need to ask: how do our physical bodies contribute to our faithfulness to follow Jesus and our experiences of God's love?
