8. **Stick to the Prompt:** Ensure your essay clearly answers the question being asked.
9. **Highlight Growth:** Show personal development, resilience, and learning from challenges.
10. **Conclude with Impact:** Finish strong with a message that ties back to your main idea and leaves a lasting impression.
11. **Capture Ideas as They Come:** Keep a notebook or app to jot down ideas and observations at any time.
12. **Embrace Vulnerability:** Sharing challenges or imperfections shows courage and builds connection.
13. **Read Aloud for Clarity:** This helps catch awkward phrasing and ensures a natural

flow.

14. Focus on Specific Moments: A detailed snapshot can be more powerful than a broad summary.

15. Avoid Clichés and Overused Themes: If tackling a common topic, approach it from a unique or personal angle.

16. Show, Don't Just Tell (Again!): Instead of claiming traits, demonstrate them through real experiences.

17. Seek Diverse Feedback: Ask for feedback from people with different backgrounds and perspectives.

18. Reflect on Personal Growth: Essays should show how you've evolved—emotionally, intellectually, or socially.

19. Maintain Your Authentic Voice: Let your true self shine through in tone, humor, and reflection.

20. Conclude with Purpose: Reiterate the core message or theme, and leave the reader with something to remember.
