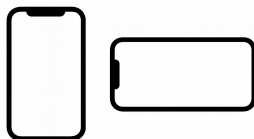

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Calling: The Awakening of Purpose

Moreover he said, I am the God of thy father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. And Moses hid his face; for he was afraid to look upon God. — Exodus 3:6

Every great story begins with a call, and every calling begins with discomfort. God rarely calls us when we feel ready; He calls us when He knows we're needed. The call doesn't come to the qualified, it qualifies those who answer. Most people spend their lives searching for purpose, when purpose has been calling their name all along.

This chapter isn't just about Moses, it's about you. Because sooner or later, every person reaches that moment when the ordinary catches fire, and you realize God's been waiting for you to step into the water.

Moses: The Weight of a Calling

He wasn't searching for destiny, he was hiding from it. Once a prince of Egypt, Moses had traded gold for sand and power for peace. He thought he was finished with Egypt, finished with Pharaoh. But God wasn't finished with him.

One day, while tending sheep in the wilderness, Moses noticed something strange, a bush engulfed in flame but never consumed. He turned aside to see, and from that fire came a voice that would alter history.

Could you imagine if God told you to walk into the White House and command the President to let your people go, with no army, no plan, and no credentials but faith?

Moses froze. His fear whispered louder than God's words. He stammered, "*Who am I that I should go?*" He reminded God he couldn't speak well, that Pharaoh wouldn't listen, that he wasn't qualified. But God wasn't asking for qualifications, He was asking for obedience. God told him, 'Take off thy shoes from off thy feet; for the place whereon thou standest is holy ground.' Moses obeyed. He took off his shoes, and with them, his excuses. That moment, that surrender, changed the world.

When Moses finally said *yes*, his desert turned into a battlefield of destiny. He stood before Pharaoh, the most powerful ruler on earth, armed only with a wooden staff and divine authority. He faced rejection after rejection, plague after plague, until even the rivers of Egypt ran red with blood. But he didn't give up. Joseph: Integrity in the House of Temptation

He was far from home, a young man betrayed by his brothers, sold into slavery, and carried off to Egypt with nothing but his faith. Most people would've given up. Most would've grown bitter. But not **Joseph**. Even in chains, he refused to become what the world said he was.

In the house of Potiphar, an Egyptian officer, Joseph worked hard and earned trust quickly. Everything he touched prospered. Potiphar noticed, and so did his wife. She watched him day after day, her desire growing into obsession. She whispered when the servants were gone. She brushed past him in the halls. She cornered him when no one else was near. Finally, she said the words that could've destroyed everything:

"Lie with me."

The room must have gone still, the weight of her power, the scent of her perfume, the silence before the storm. Joseph could have reasoned with himself. He could have said, "***No one will know. I've already suffered enough. What's one sin?***" But integrity doesn't negotiate.

He looked her in the eyes and said,

“How then can I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?”
— **Genesis 39:9**

When she grabbed his cloak, **he ran**, not because he was weak, but because he was strong enough to flee what others flirt with. The same garment he left behind became her weapon. She lied, accusing him of the very thing he refused to do. And Joseph, innocent but unbending, was thrown into prison.

The walls were cold, the nights long, and the air heavy with injustice. But even there, in a cell built for liars and thieves, integrity followed him like a shadow of favor. God turned the dungeon into a classroom, and the prisoner into a leader. Years later, that same young man would stand before Pharaoh, second only to the throne, not because he was clever, but because he was **clean**.

Joseph’s life teaches us this: **God can restore everything you lose for being honest, but you can never replace what you lose for being false.**

Lessons from Joseph

- Integrity will be tested in private before it’s rewarded in public.

Humility is not weakness, it's strength under submission. It's knowing who you are in God, yet choosing to serve anyway. While pride demands recognition, humility gives glory to the **One** who deserves it. The world may measure greatness by how many people bow before you, but Heaven measures it by how often you bow before others. No one in history embodied this better than **Jesus, the King** who lived with the heart of a servant and the hands of a healer.

Not long after, word reached him that his nephew Lot had been taken captive by four invading kings. Abraham gathered 318 trained servants, not soldiers, and pursued the armies by night. He defeated them, rescued Lot, and restored what was stolen. That was **Courage**. Faith that doesn't just pray, it moves. Love that risks everything to protect what matters.

And through it all, from the tent to the altar, from the battlefield to the mountain, Abraham left a legacy that time couldn't erase. He became the father of faith, the friend of God, and the foundation of nations. That was **Legacy**. Because when a man walks with God long enough, his footsteps become the path others follow.

Lessons from Abraham
