BACK TO SCHOOL ISSUE 2021-2022

It is exciting to be a North Nodaway Mustang! I just can't wait to see all the students and staff returning this year. Classes begin on August 25th, which is just around the corner and will be here before we all know it. I am hopeful that we can continue to get back to the old normal in terms of educating students. COVID-19 took its toll on many last year, and as a school, we adapted well enough to still provide a quality educational experience in person. I often have many individuals in the community come up and ask what I hope for concerning our school. Therefore, I have given that much thought and have come to the conclusion that I want our school to develop quality individuals that are college and career-

ready.

education and necessary skills to prepare those that are planning on attending postsecondary instruction. In order to achieve that mission, we need our buildings to be up to date and a safe place for students and staff to learn and teach. I also believe that we must do what we can to hire and retain the best teachers possible for our kids. In order to improve instruction and increase student achievement, we need to employ a razor focus on results and not accept excuses. There are five core questions that I keep challenging our principals and teachers on to improve learning within our district:

What do we want our kids to learn? To me, this means that every teacher should have identified essential learning objectives that they want every student to master prior to moving on. These objectives are part of an overall curriculum that each teacher should have available if asked to see by a parent or patron. Teachers need to have a firm grasp of the Missouri Learning Standards that outline what kids need to know based on their grade level. What our kids need to know isn't just confined to academic knowledge but also includes social and character skills, which are paramount for going into the workforce or moving toward college. Therefore, much of your child's learning in elementary will be focused on both of these areas. In junior high and high school, we expect students to be of good moral character and understand proper social skills for interaction.

How do we know if they know it? This focus should have us all thinking about the assessments we use to gauge student learning or understanding. That is why you often see and hear about our elementary teachers' benchmark testing students in reading and math. This information gives them the data to check for progress. Individual teachers should be assessing their essential learning standards for these same reasons. In order to achieve this, we will need to continue providing training for our staff on creating quality assessments and asking critical thinking questions while in class.

What are we going to do if we don't learn it? In my mind, there has to be a shift in thinking from teaching it to do students get it? If not, we need to have systems in place for intervening and getting students extra help. Our staff devotes lots of extra time trying to ensure that students are getting the material. Many reteach concepts while others tutor kids before and after school. Continued on page 6.

Free and Reduced Lunch Program 2021-2022

August 1, 2021 North Nodaway R-VI School District announced its revised free and reduced price policy for school children unable to pay the full price of meals served in schools under the National School Lunch

Program and the School

Breakfast Program. Children from families whose current income is at or below those shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Applications are available at the school office. To apply, fill out a Free and Reduced Price School Meals Family Application and return it to the school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. A complete application is required as a condition of eligibility. A complete application includes: (1) household income from all sources or Food Stamp/ TANF case number, (2) names of all household

members, and (3) the signature and last four digits of social security number or indication of no social security number of adult household member signing the application. School officials may verify current income at any time during the school year.

Foster children may be eligible regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside.

If a family member becomes unemployed or if family size changes, the family should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the children of the family eligible for these benefits.

Households will be notified of their children's eligibility status for free or reduced price meals. If any children were not listed on the eligibility notice for families receiving SNAP, TANF or FDPIR, the household should contact the school to have free meal benefits extended to those children.

If any child(ren) was not listed on the eligibility notice, the household should contact the LEA or school to have free meal benefits extended to that child(ren).

Under the provisions of the policy, Tiffany Whipple, Determining Official, will review the applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the determining official, they may wish to discuss the decision with the hearing official on an informal basis or he/ she may make a request either orally or in writing to Chris Turpin, Hearing Official.

Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the central office where any interested party may review it.

Interventions such as Title Communication Arts are established to help ensure that kids are able to read and write. Our school also provides special resource services for those that struggle and need a few more modifications made for students to be successful.

What do we do if students do get it? If students get it, then we need to do what we can to keep challenging them to grow by raising the rigor. We need to also allow more opportunities to explore their passions. This is a great opportunity to go back to the mission that allows our students to participate in vocational-technical programs, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math), dual credit options, independent studies with Edgenuity course offerings, and work release options.

What is the best teaching method for these kids to learn? With society changing and how kids learn changing, it is important that we keep current on the different methods of instructing what our kids need to know in order for them to learn. As a school, we need to keep these five questions at the core of our instruction and decision involving instruction and student opportunities. I am proud of our teachers and staff, as learning is the fundamental goal that each of them shares.

There are so many positive changes that are happening this year that I can't wait for school to start. Many of them focus on either providing safer learning and work environments or providing opportunities to help make students career-ready. Mrs. Frueh has done a tremendous job of jump starting our Family and Consumer Science (FACS) program again. She has now moved to what was the science room last year. We have updated her space with some new counters and cabinets. Students will be able to once again focus more on those life skills of cooking, sewing, and family life. Mr. Nally and Mr. Bix have been working hard this summer to be trained to start our school drone program. North Nodaway will be the first school in Missouri to offer a drone program where students can go through

the curriculum and take a test to be a Federal Aviation Administration certified drone pilot. This program opens up potential career opportunities for our students in agriculture, sports entertainment, the military, real estate, marketing, and other related fields. We are also finishing up our new innovation lab on the third floor. Students will be able to experience working with spheros to learn some basic coding, they will learn to program and utilize a 3-D printer, and create virtual worlds with software and virtual reality equipment. Eventually, our curriculum offerings will afford students the opportunity to use a glow forge laser cutter and explore vex robotics. We currently have dual credit course offerings that students take that will provide them with college credits at a reduced cost. This year, I am proud to say that we have 20 students attending the Northwest Vo-Tech Center in Maryville to receive technical skill training. Some other things

that are happening throughout our district are new phones in each building. Each

classroom will have a phone where parents can now leave messages for teachers and staff members. We are hoping this will continue to improve the communication between school and home. All of the hardwoods at the elementary will be refinished prior to the start of school. The last school improvement that I want to mention is the installation of new video cameras in both buildings. I hope this makes our students and staff feel safer while learning in our district. Kids can't learn if they

don't feel safe.

I am honored and blessed to be working with our students and staff members. North Nodaway is a great school, and there is a lot to be proud of. I am proud of all the great changes that are happening and look forward to the start of the 2021-22 school year. Thanks to you and all of the staff members who have helped make these a reality. The school-parent compact outlines how parents, the entire school staff, and students will share the responsibility for improved student academic achievement and the way in which the school and parents will build and develop a partnership to help children achieve the State's high standards.

Both of these documents will be reviewed at the Annual Title meeting on September 8th. We will also review in the spring.

A strong connection between the home and the school is a key element in student success. Materials, strategies, and help from teachers are available to all parents within a

Title One school. Opportunities for active parent participation include: before school open house, schoolparent compacts, PTO, conferences, newsletters, and more.
