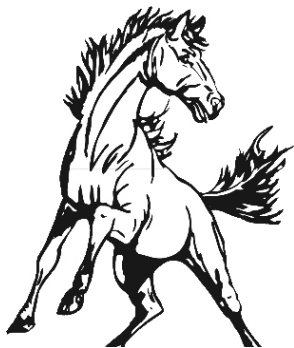

## Team Effort to Improve APR

It is truly hard to believe that March has arrived. This time of the year allows us to reflect on many of our practices that we have in place as a district and begin making changes and revisions for next year. Principals are looking at making revisions to the various school handbooks concerning policy or changes that occur throughout the year. Staff members are gearing up for the start of state testing. State testing takes place in April, but staff members are working on curriculum and objectives that they feel are going to be tested. Our district's Annual Performance Report (APR) just came out from the state and is lower than I expected. It isn't where we want it to be as a district. We scored in the mid 70s with the hope of being in the 80s and eventually in the 90s.

The primary score on this report reflects how our students performed last year on the state assessment. There has to be a better way to measure our school's effectiveness than giving a state exam once a year. The majority of points are awarded based on the percentage

of kids scoring proficient or advanced on the test or students that show growth. As a district, we really try to focus our efforts on getting students to show individual growth on their own scores. Unfortunately, individual student growth within our own district doesn't qualify for points or meet how the state views student growth; which is unfortunate. Many districts around the state, including ours, believed moving kids from one level of proficiency to the next would constitute the district receiving growth points. Instead, the state views growth based on comparing our kids to other kids in their grade level who took that same test throughout the state. Within our district, teachers administer many formal and informal benchmark assessments throughout the year as a means to monitor individual growth, especially in communication arts and math. This method is a more accurate measurement of individual growth than looking at a single state assessment each year.

Unfortunately, I don't have the power to change how the state determines the effectiveness of our school but I do believe that

there are things we can do to increase our scores. It is going to take all of us working together in order for this to happen. Systems have and are being put into place by staff to focus on our student's deficiencies and teaching practices to bring about more positive outcomes.

The score is definitely not a reflection of how hard our staff, teachers and students have worked this year or in the past few years.

Teachers are focusing on understanding and

teaching objectives and lessons aligned to the state standards. Our teachers within the district have been working hard on writing and revising curriculum the past few years. They are identifying Power Standards for their classes that all kids need to know prior to moving to the next grade level. This helps us get our lessons and teaching focused truly on what kids need to know.

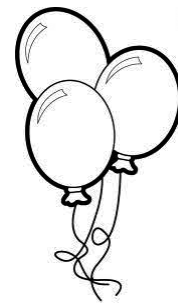

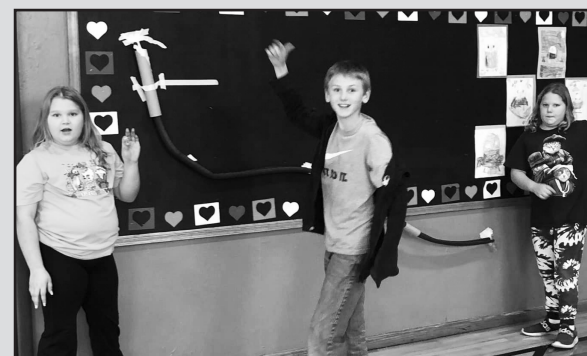

Please make plans to attend this event in which our students' academic work will be highlighted. We also plan to kick off the evening with a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for the new addition to our building that evening. In addition to numerous examples of student work, we will be hosting live performances, role play, and demonstrations by students. It will be a great opportunity to check out the new addition and see the great things our students do!

The past few weeks we have seen an increase in absences due to illness. It is extremely important for students and parents to help teachers monitor student performance during this difficult stretch. We have put a lot of effort into holding students accountable for the completion of their work and hope that parents are using the parent portal and gradewatch emails to help assist with this task. Students are being asked to stay and complete missing work during our extended learning opportunities after school. Our primary concern is always to meet our students'

educational needs.

We are blessed to have so many talented performers and musicians within our school. This year our Seniors have been completing college and career readiness activities in a class designed to help them prepare for life after high school. They have completed a dual credit workplace readiness component and recently completed the ACT Workkeys assessment. They will receive Gold, Silver, or Bronze certificates regarding their performance on this workplace readiness test. They have also completed portfolios of their work and have been completing passion projects involving things they care deeply about. We have seen students work on dental hygiene with elementary students, landscaping the new addition, fundraising for the Roxy, establishing a clothes donation, and compiling school records for athletic teams, all-state teams, and individual athletes. 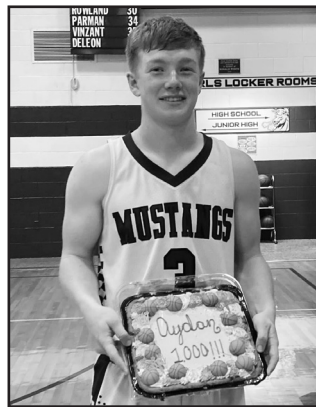

# We Need Your Help on APR Scores

We are also putting systems in place to ensure that our kids can read better in the elementary by instituting researched based practices such as LETRS. LETRS is a system of understanding how student's brains work at processing reading skills. It also allows our teachers to be more prescriptive in how to address reading deficiencies. Systems are now starting to be put into place that everyone in the elementary are doing for small group reading instruction by utilizing a program called Really Great Reading. This program focuses on the phonics and phonemic awareness portion of reading. We are also working on implementing a common spelling and handwriting program throughout the elementary. This consistency will produce results on future tests. At the high school, teachers are working in teams to offer more intervention for students who are struggling. They too, are working on written expression as a building wide goal. Students are given writing prompts to write about. These are done by all students throughout the year.

There are things that I would like to ask parents to help with improving our district's APR score. One of the things we are scored on is our student's attendance rates. Teachers can't help students learn if they aren't present in school. Overall, our attendance rate is in the

90s but always could be better. Please encourage your students to complete their homework. We are trying to shift away from it being busy work to being meaningful and purposeful work for understanding. If your student doesn't understand a concept or an assignment, please encourage them to seek help. This year our district started Career Ladder for Teachers to earn extra income if they tutored or assisted students outside of their contract time who need the help. I know our staff is willing to do whatever is necessary to help our kids succeed. A simple thing that can help put kids in a positive mindset to test is by providing them with breakfast before testing and making sure they are getting a good nights sleep. Parents encouraging their students to try their personal best on all tests puts them in a positive mindset. As a district, I am encouraging our administration to think of things we can do to motivate the students to do their very best on each test. I know our teachers do a great job of preparing students to be successful on these tests, pursuing a career or post-secondary education. Your expectation and encouragement to do their best on these tests will raise our overall score as a district. If everyone, just gives a little more during this time, our scores will improve and our APR score will rise.

In order to do that, we need to keep raising our expectations to achieve a challenging and rigor-

ous curriculum that will prepare them for those settings. To achieve our mission, our staff had to develop common values in order to reach our desired outcome. Our values are centered on developing C.O.R.E. The "C" stands for Character. We believe that character is developed through leadership, service, setting academic and personal goals, and building a positive culture that promotes a growth mindset with high expectations to be your best. The "O" in CORE stands for Opportunity. As a staff, we are committed to providing students with opportunities to be continuous learners and involve them in real world experiences inside and outside of the classroom. Responsibility is the "R" of our values. We believe that developing this value is essential to becoming a productive citizen. This is demonstrated by timely completion of work and tasks assigned to students. It is reflected in whether students are dependable classmates and attend school on a regular basis. The final value is our "E", effective communication. We hope that students are able to communicate effectively verbally and with their written expression. These two skills are so needed by students in order to effectively advocate needs and wants as a productive citizen. As a school, we are more committed to model this effective communication by providing more information in various ways of what is happening at school. In order to be

effective, we have to work together in partnership to increase student's achievement and meet these core values that we all share.

I will be sharing specific objectives and strategies with you in future newsletters but I want to give you a chance to understand these five big areas of focus for our district. The five focus areas of our CSIP are as follows.

I. Improve student achievement through enhancing our district curriculum and instruction.

II. Provide opportunities for our students to be college and career ready.

III. Engage the district's community with supportive school culture and climate.

IV. Develop and improve academic and facility resources.

V. Be fiscally responsible utilizing accountable governance practices as a district.

As a district we can meet our mission and vision if we continue to lay out a foundation and direction for all of us to work toward. I feel like we are definitely headed in the right direction to help us meet our goals as a district. North Nodaway School District is doing great things as a district with students but it's because of the great work being done by our parents, students, teachers, staff, and administration all pulling together. 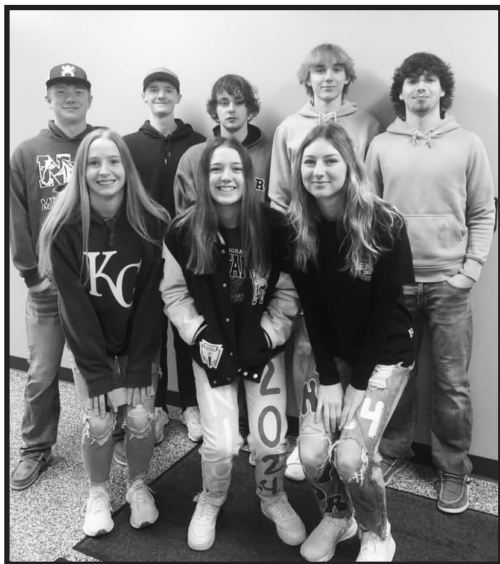
