What Mary Knew

There's nothing like looking into the face of your newborn baby for the first time. You're filled with love, and with awe at the miracle of life. You wonder what this tiny little person will turn out to be and do when grown. What will s/he achieve, contribute, and experience? Will your child have long life and produce children of his/her own? We have no way of knowing.

I was thinking about this because of the beautiful Christmas song Mary Did You Know? (Mark Lowry / Buddy Greene). Are you familiar with it? In haunting melody, it asks the mother of Jesus the rhetorical questions, "Did you know that your baby boy would someday walk on water... would save our sons and daughters... is Lord of all creation... will one day rule the nations? The blind will see, the deaf will hear, the dead will live again... This sleeping child you're holding is the great I AM!"

The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary. You have found favor with God. You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give to him the name Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High... his kingdom will never end." (Luke 1:30-33)

God desires to reveal himself to each of us personally through his son, who is the exact representation of his being, the radiance of God's glory (Hebrews 1:3). Take time this Christmas to get to know Jesus better. Look long and deep, with wonder and adoration, into his blessed face.
