It's About Time

It's the end of another year — often a time to look back before moving forward. I do that every December, reviewing family events in preparation for writing our traditional Christmas letter: births, deaths, marriages, travels, etc. What usually strikes me more than anything else, though, is how quickly those 12 months have flown by, each year seemingly faster than the one before it! And yet remember when you were a kid and it took forever for Christmas or your birthday to come? The difference is our frame of reference. The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance. (2 Peter 3: 8-9)

I immediately thought of the underlined sentence for this post, but I'd forgotten the context. The "promise" Peter is speaking of here is the coming judgement. Yes, among all the other things God has promised, He promised that the world would not carry on forever in its fallen condition. People will not be allowed to scoff at God and commit atrocities against one another in perpetuity. In God's own timing, He will put an end to it. How do we know? Because God always keeps His promises. The only question is when.

For some, 2023 will always stand out, celebrated as the year they made the most important decision of their lives: accepting Jesus as their Lord and Savior.
