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
## Message from the Wise Master












## From Microwaves to Machines That Think: Reflections on AI and Freemasonry.



In the March/April 2025 edition of the *Scottish Rite Journal of Freemasonry, Southern Jurisdiction*, I came across an article that struck a chord with me. Written by Brother Peyton Anderson, 32°, and published on pages 24 and 25, the article dives into the timely and ever-evolving topic of artificial intelligence (AI). What caught my attention wasn't just the subject itself, but the thoughtful way Brother Anderson compared it to something most of us now take for granted: the microwave.

Back in 1947, the microwave was seen as something almost *dangerous*—a foreign technology people didn't understand, and therefore, feared. There was even serious talk of banning it altogether. Fast-forward to today, and you'd be hard-pressed to find a home without one. We heat up leftovers, pop popcorn, and make coffee without a second thought, using a technology that once caused widespread concern.

Brother Anderson draws a parallel that's hard to ignore. In 2025, AI is generating the same kind of alarm. People are anxious. Some are outright terrified. And honestly? I understand why.

#### I'm Writing This Because...

I was born in 1985—an '80s kid. That means I grew up in the analog world. We played outside until the street-lights came on. We listened to music on cassette tapes and watched movies on VHS. I still remember the

crackle of dial-up internet, the thrill of burning my first CD, and the wonder of seeing Google for the first time. We didn't just live through a transition—we *are* the bridge generation. From black-and-white TVs to streaming in 4K, from encyclope-

From black-and-white I vs to streaming in 4K, from encyclopedias to smartphones, from a disconnected world to one that's always online. Now, we're facing yet another leap: artificial intelligence. But here's where my story takes a turn. After serving and working for years, I decided to study in the field of technology, focusing on Cyber Crimes. That path gave me a unique lens through which to see this technological revolution—not just from the user's side, but from the backend, the underbelly, the architecture behind the magic.

So what do I think about all this AI talk? I think it's time we breathe, pause, and remember how all change feels at first: uncomfortable.

#### Fear of the Unknown, Sound Familiar?

If there's one thing we humans are naturally wired to do, it's to fear what we don't understand. And AI, for many, feels like something *beyond* understanding. The biggest concern I hear? "AI is going to replace my job." And that's a legitimate worry. Like every technological advancement, AI *will* replace some things. But it can also *elevate* others—if we let it.

This brings me to Freemasonry.

Since I joined our fraternity, I've heard time and again how today's younger generations "aren't interested in Masonry." The data may reflect a decline, yes. But I think we're focusing too much on the *problem*, and not enough on the *opportunity*.

#### Where AI Meets the Craft

Let me be clear: AI will never replace the human experience. It can write poems, compose music, and even give advice. But it cannot offer the *fraternal embrace* of a Brother, or the silent strength you feel when sitting in Lodge beside men who share your values. It cannot replicate the joy of seeing a new Brother's eyes light up when he finally *gets it*. It cannot offer the mentorship, the laughter, or the unspoken understanding we find within our Temples.

That is something **only we** can provide.

And ironically, in a world where people are more connected digitally than ever—but more *isolated* emotionally—Freemasonry offers a sacred space for *real* connection. We are the antidote to superficiality. We are the quiet room in a noisy world.

As people grow tired of shallow interactions and curated lives, I believe we'll see more young people (and older ones too) searching for meaning. For wisdom. For connection. They might Google "life advice," but what they're really craving is a mentor. A guide. A Brother.

#### **Embrace the Tools, Protect the Heart**

Just like we learned to use microwaves without letting them define our diets, we can learn to use AI without letting it define our humanity.

We can use AI to help organize events, manage Lodge communications, enhance educational materials, and even explore Masonic history in creative ways. But the *essence* of our Craft must remain human.

Freemasonry has always been a gatekeeper of knowledge, a place where the curious, the wise, and the kind come together to build not just themselves—but each other.

If we embrace the best of this new age while holding fast to the values that made us strong, I truly believe we can usher Freemasonry into a new golden era.

And if you're reading this brethren, maybe that future starts with you.
