Fall Facts

It's almost time to pull those sweaters out of hibernation and watch the leaves morph into various shades of yellow and orange. Here are some fall fun facts to help you usher in one of the most beautiful times of the year!

Fall was called "harvest" because of the "harvest moon" that occurs when the full moon is closest to the autumn equinox.

Pumpkins are the most craved food during the fall...pumpkin spice anyone?

The yellow and orange colors you see actually already exist in leaves but they are overpowered by the abundance of green from chlorophyll. The amount of chlorophyll starts to decrease and the sun weakens and the days grow shorter.

Red and purple leaves are only that color because of the presence of sugars and sap that are trapped within the leaves. These sugars provide plants with the energy they need to survive.

Many birds will prepare for their winter migration during the fall. The distance they can travel is impressive; the Arctic Tern travels 1,000 miles each way for it's annual migration.

Evergreen trees such as pines, cedars and spruces stay green because their leaves or needles are covered with thick wax and they contain materials that prevent freezing when it gets cold

Fall Color Trail

Alabama is beautiful throughout the year, but especially in the fall. As the greens of summer surrender to glittering yellow poplars, scarlet dogwoods, orange maples and golden hickories, Alabama unfolds its patchwork quilt of color.

This blend of brilliant autumn foliage, coupled with cooler temperatures and an occasional gentle breeze, makes for an unforgettable experience.

Alabama State Parks are some of the best places to enjoy the fall color change. Joe Wheeler has an excellent viewing spot next to the dam and near the cabin area on the Lawrence County side. Autumn scenery can be found inside DeSoto State Park at Little River Canyon and DeSoto Falls. Monte Sano has views of the Tennessee Valley along the Warpath Ridge Trail and its overlook. Cheaha's Bald Rock and Pulpit Rock trails both have excellent views. Mount Cheaha is the highest point in the state at 2,407 feet above sea level.

With cooler days and lower humidity, autumn is a wonderful time to enjoy Alabama's many fall festivals and events. Be sure to check out the Alabama tourism website for more places to visit on their Circle of Colors Trail.

Lost and Found

Did you lose something? Did you find something? The Waters lost and found is located at the Information Center.

Horseshoes is a Fun Family Game to Play!

Horseshoes involves two opposite playing pits with a stake in each. Players toss horseshoes from one stake pit to the opposite stake in an attempt to get a "ringer" – a horseshoe landing around the stake. Normally two players play against each other, but doubles are also possible. A turn consists of each player throwing their two horseshoes at the same stake by turn, tabulating the score, then pitching to the opposite stake. One player throws both of his horseshoes while the opposing player keeps a polite distance. Fewer points are given if the horseshoe leans on the stake or is close, and points can also be cancelled out for various reasons. The game is played for a certain number of innings (20 for official games) or to a set number of points (15 or 21 for backyard horseshoes).

HORSESHOE RULES

Aside from a few common-sense rules about standing apart for the pitch (to keep everyone safe), and being polite not to talk or make rude exclamations during a service, the rules are all about points. Keeping score can be a little confusing at first, but, to keep it all straight, have these rules handy when you first begin.

- **Rule 1:** Ringers are awarded 3 points. To qualify as a ringer, a straight edge must be able to touch both points of the horseshoe.
- Rule 2: If nobody scores a ringer, the closest horseshoe to the stake scores one point. This includes "leaners," or horseshoes touching the stake but not qualified as a ringer. The horseshoe does not have to lean to qualify as a leaner, and the points remain the same no matter how close the leaner is as compared to another leaner.
- **Rule 3:** Give two points to the player who threw both horseshoes closer to the stake than his or her opponent's.
- **Rule 4:** For the "closest to the stake" points, horseshoes must be within 6 inches of the stake to qualify.
- Rule 5: Cancellation rules: The twist in the game of horseshoes is the ability to cancel out your opponent's points, allowing for strategy within the game. If one player scores a ringer, the points will be cancelled if the opposing player tops it with another ringer during the same turn. The same rule applies for all other equal plays during the course of one turn. For instance, if both players throw a ringer and a leaner, no points are awarded. If one player throws two ringers, and the other player throws one, the player with two ringers gets three points for that turn
- **Rule 6:** If a player scores one ringer and has the closest horseshoe with his remaining play, the player gets points for both.

Stop, Drop and Roll! Fire Safety Tips

The Pike Road Fire and Rescue Department would like to share some fire safety advice. Readers should note that all fire situations are different and it is difficult to give fail-proof general advice. We believe the information contained on these pages may prove useful in some situations, however; additional safety measures may be required under particular circumstances.

Fires create tragedies every day. Educating the public on fire prevention is one of the ways to assist in alleviating harm to your family and home. Education and knowledge on how to deal with potential dangerous situations makes one more confident if the need ever arises. Being prepared for emergencies could be the thing that saves you or someone in your family.

Practice fire drills in the home to make sure all family members know what to do in the event of a fire. Draw a floor plan with at least two ways of escaping every room. Make sure the plan shows important details: stairs, hallways, and windows that can be used as fire escape routes.

Get out immediately, don't try to grab your possessions as they can be replaced. YOU CAN'T!

If you encounter smoke on your way out of the fire, crawl low under the smoke to your exit.

Feel all doors before opening them. If a door is hot, exit another way.

If your clothes catch on fire, stop where you are, drop to the ground, cover your face with your hands to protect your face and lungs and roll over and over to smother the flames.

Have a pre-determined location for everyone in the home to meet so each person can be accounted for.

You should not place the 911 call to emergency services from inside the home. It is best to get out and place the call to fire authorities from a safe location outside the home such as a neighbor's home or use a cell phone.

Provide as much information as possible to the dispatcher including the location of the emergency and what is burning.

Halloween Safety Tips

COSTUMES:

Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors.

Choose face paint and make up whenever possible instead of masks, so as not to obstruct vision.

Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers. When selecting a costume, make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls.

WALKERS:

Cross the street at corners, using crosswalks if available. Look left, right and left again when crossing and keep looking as you cross.

Put electronic devices down, keep head up and walk, don't run across the street.

Teach children to make eye contract with drivers before crossing.

Always walk on sidewalks or paths.

Walk the most direct routes with the fewest street crossings.

Watch for cars that are turning or backing up.

Never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.

DRIVERS:

SLOW DOWN and be alert, especially in residential neighborhoods.

Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs. Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.

Get rid of any distractions – like your phone – in your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings.

Turn your headlights on earlier than usual so you can spot children and children can spot you.

How to Prep Your Home for Fall

If only all the fall prep your home needed was a pumpkin spice candle and new wreath to hang on the front door! While those are nice touches to add to your home for the upcoming season, more needs to be done to ensure your home is ready for cooler temps. Here are some great tips to get your home ready for fall!

CHANGE AIR FILTER

This is one of the best ways to extend the life of your HVAC. Keep a fresh filter on hand and change it as directed. Another way to protect your HVAC is seasonal check-ups. Have a licensed HVAC specialist take a look at your system to keep it in optimal shape.

CHANGE BATTERIES

Change your smoke detector and carbon monoxide batteries and test the alarm. You never know when you'll need it and smoke detectors play a critical role in protecting your family from unforeseen harm. You'll want to change the batteries on an annual basis (or whenever you hear it start chirping) and test the alarm at least once a month.

CLEAN GUTTERS

Clean your gutters and clear leaves from around your exterior. Gutters are your home's first line of defense in flash floods as they divert rainwater away from your home. Gutters moving water away from the base of your home keeps rainwater out of your basement or crawl space. Fallen leaves not only deprive your lawn of sunlight during the fall and winter months, they also can weaken your root systems and can hold moisture for an extended time around the base of your home.

PROTECT OUTDOOR FAUCETS

Drain your outdoor faucets and place a foam faucet cover over the spigot. These are usually around \$1.00 from the hardware store and provide insulation during freezing temperatures. A good rule of thumb is to leave them covered when temperatures are expected to be below 30 degrees.

SEAL DRAFTY WINDOWS

Check your window and door seals and apply seals where necessary. Weather-stripping helps boost winter warmth and cuts energy costs by creating a better seal on your exterior openings, but in some instances, caulk may need to be used to seal cracks between the frame and a door or window.

FERTILIZE YOUR LAWN

If you want to keep your lawn looking great in the spring and summer, you need to prep it for the fall and winter. Roots are still active when the grass isn't growing, so applying fertilizer will prevent winter damage. Doing this is crucial in helping your lawn turn green faster in the spring.

CUT GRASS SHORT

Just this one time of the year, set your mower to cut 1-1/2 or 2-in. and mow your grass short. Tall grass blades won't lie down and smother the new grass next spring.

CLEAN AND INSPECT FIREPLACE

The right time to clean and inspect your fireplace is before you need to use it regularly. Grab a flashlight and look up inside your fireplace flue to make sure the damper opens and closes properly. Open the damper and look up into the flue to make sure it's free of birds' nests, branches and leaves, or other obstructions. You should see daylight at the top of the chimney. Now is also a great time to call a professional chimney sweep for maintenance!

Pedestrian Safety

Beautiful scenery surrounds the sidewalks in The Waters and we know it is hard to resist taking advantage of all of the neighborhood amenities. However, it's very important to use caution when walking. Follow these tips to insure you have a safe and fun walk!

.....

- 1. Always walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk and you have to walk in the road, ALWAYS walk facing traffic so that you can see any car that might become out of control.
- 2. Dress to be seen. Brightly colored clothing makes it easier for drivers to see you during the daytime. At night, you should wear special reflective material on your clothing so that you are easily seen by traffic.
- 3. Tips for Crossing the Street
 - Cross only at corners or marked crosswalks.
 - Stop at the curb or the edge of the road. Look thoroughly to the left and right for traffic before you step into the street.
 - Remember when crossing walk, don't run!

Town of Pike Road Historical Markers

- 1. Georgia Washington School: Miss Georgia Washington, a graduate of the Hampton Institute and friend of Booker T. Washington, founded the People's Village School for black students on this site in 1893. Marker location: Georgia Washington Junior High School at the corner of Georgia Washington Road and Antioch Lane
- 2. Antioch Baptist Church: Organized on June 5, 1818, the Antioch Baptist Church at Mount Meigs was the first church of any denomination established in Montgomery County. Marker location: Near the corner of Gibbs Road and Antioch Lane
- 3. Grace Episcopal Church: Completed in 1893, Grace Church is a stunning example of the Gothic Revival style. Marker location: 906 Old Pike Road
- 4. Lucas Tavern Site: Though the original structure has been moved to Old Alabama Town in downtown Montgomery, the tavern that once occupied this site began operation in 1818 and is the oldest existing building in Montgomery County. Marker location: Alexander Road, just north of Interstate 85
- 5. The Oaks Plantation: The plantation home here was built in the 1830's and is named for the oaks planted along the drive. Marker location: At the intersection of Marler Road and Avenue of the Oaks
- 6. Lucas Hill Cemetery: The Lucas Hill Cemetery is the final resting place of some of the earliest settlers who established plantations and farmsteads along the Mount Meigs Terrace in present-day Montgomery County. Marker locations: Avenue of the Waters in The Waters community off Marler Road
- 7. Marks House: Built circa 1825, the Marks House has served as the location of the annual Pike Road Arts and Crafts Fair for more than four decades. Marker location: 890 Old Carter Hill Road
- 8. Pike Road School: Montgomery County's first school to consolidate rural, one-room school houses into grades one through twelve. Marker location: Near the corner of Flinn Road and Old Pike Road in the Pike Road Historic District
- 9. Taylor Field: The Montgomery area's first military flying installation was established on this site in 1917. Marker location: On Ray Thorington Road between Foxchase Drive and East Avalon Parkway
- 10. Ray Cemetery: Established 1849, the cemetery contains the graves of some of the earliest settlers in eastern Montgomery County. Marker location: Off Vaughn Road just east of Southern Homes and Gardens on Briar Lane. Note: this is a private road

WHEN SHOULD I CALL THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE?

We want to remind all residents how important it is to call the Sheriff's Office for emergencies. The following is a guide for when to call 911 to report emergencies:

- Any fire
- An intruder is in your home
- You witness or are involved in a car accident
- There is a crime in progress
- Someone becomes dangerously ill
- Someone is chocking
- Someone is unconscious
- Someone is poisoned
- Someone is drowning
- You see a sparking electrical hazard
- Any threat of immediate danger

For non-emergencies, you can call Montgomery County Sheriff's Office at (334)832-4980. Press 1 when prompted. Some examples of non-emergency circumstances:

- Suspicious vehicle and/or person
- Public intoxication
- Disruptive and harmful situations that could escalate

Catch and Release Guidelines:

- Release all Bass that are 14 inches or larger.
- Release all Crappie.
- Limit the number of bluegill and shell crackers to 10 per person per day.

Harvest Guidelines:

- Harvest all Bass 13 inches and smaller. Even Bass too small to eat should be taken out of the Lake. So please do your part to help remove these Bass.
- Harvest all Catfish when caught. Note: Catfish compete with the bass for the limited food supply so please harvest. Thank you for helping to remove the Catfish.
