• Harvest all Catfish when caught. Note: Catfish compete with the bass for the limited food supply so please harvest. Thank you for helping to remove the Catfish.

Grandparents Day

Grandparents Day is a national holiday or observance, celebrated each year on the first Sunday after Labor Day, although it is not classified as a federal holiday.

The roots of Grandparents Day go back to 1956 and a West Virginia mother named Marian McQuade. While helping to organize a community celebration for those over 80, she became aware of the many nursing home residents who were forgotten by their families. She wanted a holiday to bring attention to these forgotten individuals and to honor all grandparents. In 1973, West Virginia became the first state to have such a day.

McQuade and others then shifted their efforts to the national level, achieving success in 1978. The purpose of the holiday, as stated in the preamble to the statute, is "to honor grandparents, to give grandparents an opportunity to show love for their children's children, and to help children become aware of the strength, information, and guidance older people can offer."

Here are a few ways to celebrate Grandparents Day with someone you love.

- A simple meal and time to visit will please most grandparents.
- Grandparents Day is also a great time to share some family stories or look at old pictures.
- Playing board games, card games, and puzzles.

School Trail Reminders

These are a few reminders when using the school trail:

- The Trail is for use by golf carts, bicycles and pedestrians. No vehicular traffic is allowed on the Trail.
- The Waters Assembly is not responsible for any items left at the school trail.
- Bike Racks are installed at the top and bottom of the hill. If your family chooses to use the bike rack you are encouraged to use a chain/lock. The HOA will not accept responsibility for loss of personal property.
- Golf carts can be parked at the lower parking area on Ring Around Road or parked at the top of the hill. You are encouraged to remove the golf cart keys and any personal property. Again, the HOA will not accept responsibility for loss of personal property.
- Temporary vehicle parking will be available on Ring Around Road in the gravel parking area on Ring Around Road. This parking area is designed for drop off and pick up. Vehicles should not be parked in this area for an extended time.
- Only bicycle and pedestrian traffic are allowed to enter the school property from the Trail.
- The Trail is surrounded by wetland preservation areas, so it is important that everyone stays on the Trail and out of the wetland areas. Please remind your family members of nature's creatures and to be alert and aware when using the Trail.
- The Trail does not have lights so should only be used during daylight.
- If you see anything that needs attention on the Trail, please contact the HOA.

Tips for Maintaining Wooden Fences

- Minimize contact with vegetation by trimming all plants away from hanging on the fence.
- Minimize water contact to the fence by keeping sprinklers from spraying the fence directly.
- Inspect the fence yearly for signs of damage and rot. Replace broken boards, hammer in loose nails and tighten screws.
- Inspect the fence yearly for any leaning parts of the fence and resecure posts in the ground when needed.
- Clean the fence every 2-3 years to remove mold, mildew, dirt and graying. Scrape off any loose paint before pressure washing the fence to prepare for any painting that needs to be done.
- Paint the fence at a minimum of every 3-5 years with a latex paint. Allow the fence to fully dry for 1 week before painting.

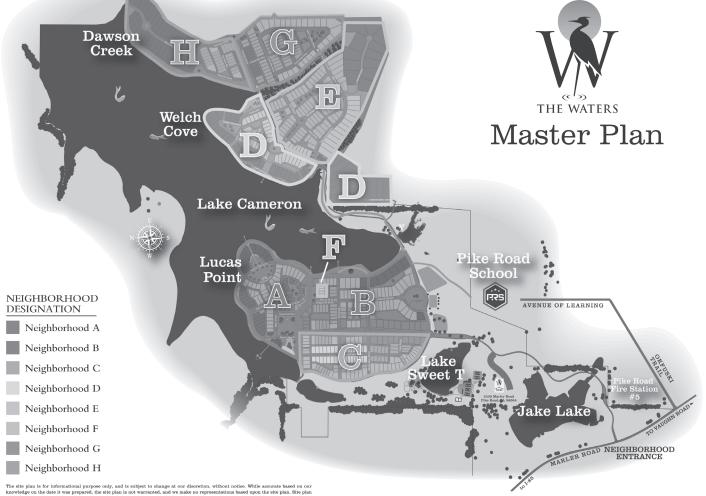

Bike Safe, Bike Smart

Bicycle safety

PROTECT YOUR HEAD - NEVER RIDE A BICYCLE WITHOUT A HELMET.

Bicycle helmets can reduce head injuries by 85%. Select a helmet that fits snugly and sits flat atop the head.

SEE AND BE SEEN - Wear clothes that make you more visible. Always wear neon, florescent or other bright colors when riding a bicycle.

AVOID BIKING AT NIGHT- It is far more dangerous to bicycle at night than during the day. Most bicycles are equipped for daylight use and need to be adapted for nighttime use. Young children should not ride at night.

ALWAYS KEEP A LOOKOUT FOR OBSTACLES - Before going around any object, scan ahead, and behind you for a gap in traffic. Plan your move, signal your intentions, and then do what you planned.

THE SAFE WAY IS THE RIGHT WAY - Ride on the right side in a straight predictable path. Always go single file in the same direction as other vehicles. Young children, typically under the age of nine, are not able to identify and adjust in dangerous traffic situations, and therefore, should not be allowed to ride in the street unsupervised. Children who are permitted to ride in the street without supervision should have the necessary skills to safely follow the "rules of the road."

ALWAYS BE AWARE OF THE TRAFFIC AROUND YOU - Over 70% of carbicycle crashes occur at driveways or other intersections. Before you enter any street or intersection, check for traffic. Always look left-right-left, and walk your bicycle into the street to begin your ride.

LEARN THE RULES OF THE ROAD -- obey traffic laws - Bicycles are considered vehicles. Bicyclists must obey the same rules as motorists. Always signal your moves. Be courteous to pedestrians and other vehicle operators. Never wear headphones while riding, as they impair your ability to hear traffic.

MAKE SURE YOUR BICYCLE IS ADJUSTED PROPERLY - Before using your bicycle, check to make sure all parts are secure and working well. The handlebars should be firmly in place and turn easily. Your wheels must be straight and secure.

ALWAYS CHECK BRAKES BEFORE RIDING - Always control your speed by using your brakes. If your bicycle has hand brakes, apply the rear brake slightly before the front brake. Always keep your brakes adjusted. If you cannot stop quickly, adjust your brakes.

WHEELS SHOULD BE SECURELY FASTENED - If your bicycle has quick release wheels, it is your responsibility to make sure they are firmly closed at all times and to use the safety retainer if there is one.

REMEMBER

• Read your bicycle Owner's Manual thoroughly before operating your bicycle.

- These recommendations are just that, recommendations, and are not meant to replace owner's manual instructions.

SUMMER HOME MAINTENANCE

Some things to include in your indoor summer home maintenance checklist include:

- Changing HVAC filters
- Testing the AC
- Washing the insides of windows
- Adding UV-protective or thermal window treatments to reduce heat transfer
- Reversing the direction of your ceiling fans
- Deep cleaning your garbage disposal, dishwasher, washing machine, dryer and other appliances
- Checking appliance hoses for leaks
- Testing smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and changing batteries
- Vacuuming your vents
- Deep cleaning all surfaces

Some exterior maintenance tasks to do at the beginning of summer include:

• Cleaning your gutters

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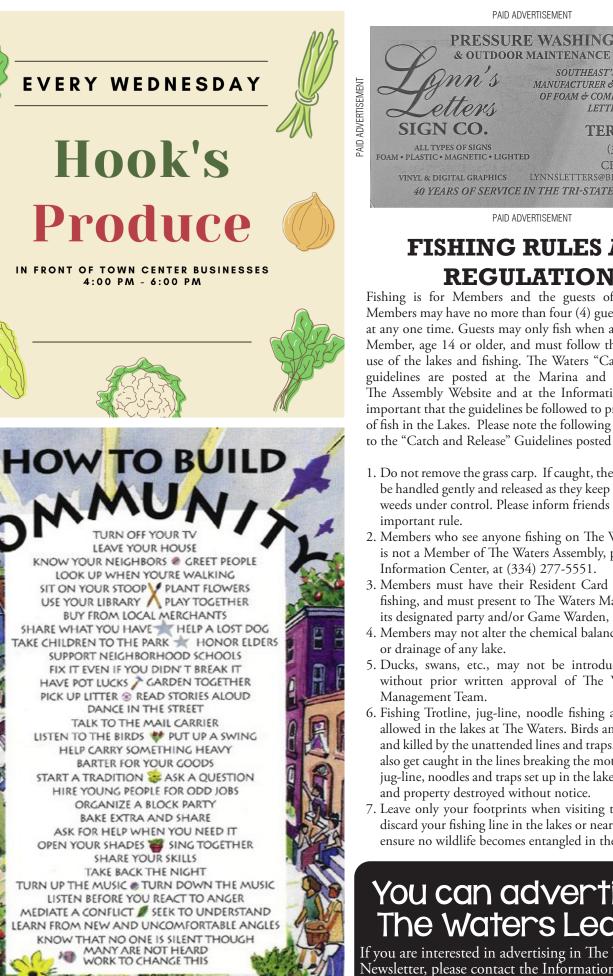
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- Inspecting your roof for missing or damaged shingles
- Power-washing siding, sidewalks, decks and other surfaces
- Painting or staining worn surfaces
- Cleaning your exterior air conditioning unit
- Trimming bushes and trees
- Cleaning and setting up outdoor furniture
- Inspecting fences for damage
- Looking for cracks, rotting and other damage on siding
- Caulking around windows and filling in other cracks and gaps
- Cleaning your exterior dryer vent
- Cleaning and prepping your grill
- Inspecting for pests
- Air conditioning maintenance
- Preparing your air conditioner for the cooling season is one of the biggest parts of your summer home maintenance checklist.

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FISHING RULES AND REGULATIONS

Fishing is for Members and the guests of Members only. Members may have no more than four (4) guests per household at any one time. Guests may only fish when accompanied by a Member, age 14 or older, and must follow the rules outlining use of the lakes and fishing. The Waters "Catch and Release" guidelines are posted at the Marina and are available on The Assembly Website and at the Information Center. It is important that the guidelines be followed to protect the balance of fish in the Lakes. Please note the following rules, in addition to the "Catch and Release" Guidelines posted at the Marina:

- 1. Do not remove the grass carp. If caught, the grass carp should be handled gently and released as they keep the lake grass and weeds under control. Please inform friends and guests of this
- 2. Members who see anyone fishing on The Waters lakes, who is not a Member of The Waters Assembly, please contact the Information Center, at (334) 277-5551.
- 3. Members must have their Resident Card with them when fishing, and must present to The Waters Management Team, its designated party and/or Game Warden, if asked.
- 4. Members may not alter the chemical balance, structure, flow
- 5. Ducks, swans, etc., may not be introduced to the lakes without prior written approval of The Waters Assembly
- 6. Fishing Trotline, jug-line, noodle fishing and traps are not allowed in the lakes at The Waters. Birds and turtles are hurt and killed by the unattended lines and traps. The boat motors also get caught in the lines breaking the motors. Any trotline, jug-line, noodles and traps set up in the lakes will be removed and property destroyed without notice.
- 7. Leave only your footprints when visiting the lakes. Do not discard your fishing line in the lakes or near the lake's edge to ensure no wildlife becomes entangled in the line.
