President's Message

We hope everyone is healthy and looking forward to the upcoming holidays. This has definitely been a year to remember. Many of us have all been struggling with issues related to the ongoing Covid Pandemic. With the uncertainties and limited use of indoor venues this past spring, our annual meeting has been postponed to the Spring of 2022. We're planning a large event and more information will be forthcoming.

Our priority project in 2021 was to have the Plank House structurally stabilized, rotten planks replaced, the walls re-chinked and the exterior sealed. This is the first major work that has been done on the building since we relocated the structure to the Museum Complex in 1999. We received a grant from Preservation Delaware to assist with this project and we thank those of you who donated to the cause.

This summer we opened a new exhibit titled "Duck Creek Goes to War". This exhibit showcases the second floor of the Museum and covers our Military and home-front highlighting the American Revolutionary War through World War II. On display are uniforms, artifacts, pictures and memorabilia from those trying times in our history. We've also started a roll call log of local service members that includes service information and pictures of our local military members. If you were a member of our military or know someone locally who served, please stop by and give us your information so we honor as many veterans as possible. This will be an ongoing program that will be kept on display at the Museum.

Please take a moment to stop by and visit the Museum and Plank House this holiday season, as both will be decorated for our Christmas event on December 12th. The museum had an event on Saturday, Sept 11th to commemorate the 20th anniversary of the 9/11 tragedies. Michael Megna, Retired Sgt., NY/NJ Port Authority Police Officer, was our guest and shared his stories from that day as he was stationed at the Holland Tunnel. Mike shared two interesting slide shows of 9/11 scenes and of the boat rescues. The boat rescue consisted of private and commercial boats rescuing people off the island of Manhattan, estimated at rescuing 500,000 people and is said to be the largest marine evacuation in history. The front case was set up with 9/11 items from Mike's collection. We had a steady flow of visitors and gave several tours that day. Our visitors enjoyed the famous Connie & Bob Keen chocolates in the shape of Delaware and the US flag, peanut butter balls, and refreshing punch.

Here are some other exciting things that have happened at the museum:

- We had a visitor from New York stop by the museum and she revealed that she was John Bassett Moore's Great Grand-daughter! That info made for some interesting conversation with the lady and her son.
- Homestead Gardens community outreach program helped the museum beautification project by donating planters, shrubs, and fall flowers for the front of the museum. Homestead Gardens community outreach program will be working with us in spring 2022 to revise our museum complex landscape. We'll be adding hydrangea for color and texture, transplanting some flowers around the museum landscape, adding a time-period appropriate herb garden at the back of the plank house and colorful plants to the front of the plank house.

The plank house was then sprayed with a preserving spray. The interior and interior assets were cleaned, all pieces were inventoried and logged into PastPerfect, and we freshened up the décor a bit.

Next projects: Next, we'll need to replace the roof. The brick pathway is not level in some areas and we could use some volunteers in the spring to pull up the bricks, help with re-leveling and planting the bricks. Keep that in mind and come out and help with the project this spring!

June 2022: Smyrna Historical Walking Garden Tour




What Is PastPerfect and How Does It Help the Museum?



Why is asset inventory important?

The DCHS is entrusted with various cultural and historical documents, artifacts, and resources. Asset inventory allows us to know the location and condition of an item. It eliminates loose papers and binders which can be inaccurate and can get lost in the shuffle. We can also track the décor and assets placed in storage, making it easier and more efficient to retrieve items as we need them.


What is PastPerfect and what are the benefits to the museum? PastPerfect is a computer software package that's designed to help catalog artifacts and collections, track museum donations, manage membership and relationships with members and donors, produces reports and forms, and creates communication mailings and sends emails. It does a lot for the museum!

Michael Keen, member and Director, is the Administrator for the museum's PastPerfect subscription. For the past year Michael has been systematically inventorying museum items and exhibit items and taking pictures to add into PastPerfect. This includes scanning documents and photos to enter into the Library section of the application. The application is also used to track membership, volunteer hours, and it emails this newsletter and other correspondence to members and agencies. The work is non-stop since items are coming in and out of inventory at a constant cadence.

Eventually, all items in the museum will be entered into PastPerfect and is then the item is given a catalog number. In the computer we will enter background and information on the item and where the item is currently located inside of the museum. This provides us visibility with the item and makes it manageable for computer searches. PastPerfect acts as a searchable database, so if we want to know about an item, we can perform inquiries and searches on the computer. For example, if we want to see if we have a picture of Abraham Lincoln in the inventory, we can perform a search in PastPerfect and enter "Abraham Lincoln". All items with Abraham Lincoln in the description would appear and we can find the item we want.

Job Aids have been developed so that members can do a search to find items of interest or run reports if needed.

Historical Fun Facts: Did You Know?



Come out and visit the museum to see the early period Apothecary exhibit? It's part of the "Duck Creek Goes to War" exhibit and shows the first Apothecary in the field during the Revolutionary War. On display are Apothecary travel sets with vials of pills and herbs, dating back to the mid-1700's (with original vials) and an inventory of medicine. Stop in to see the other travel sets, a mortar & pestle from the Revolutionary War period, and other interesting items. You'll learn how herbs were used to treat common day ailments.

Colonial apothecaries were what we think of as doctors. They treated patients, made and prescribed medicines, made house calls, and taught apprentices.

General George Washington pressured the Continental Congress into establishing a plan and develop regimental hospitals. "Medicine Chests" were ordered by Congress to carry consistent supplies to regiments. This would be the earliest form of a "First Aid Kit" as we know it today.



Medicine chests carried Spirits (whiskey and rum), soaps, ointments, plasters, various gums, salts, elixirs, botanical root, in addition to bandages, needles, and useful herbs.
