


Updating Our Membership Files

Plank House Repairs, Maintenance, and Funding

The plank house is one of only three examples of Swede architecture in the State of Delaware, and we intend to keep it standing for years to come! Currently closed for repairs and spraying, the cabin remains to be one of the main attractions for the museum complex. Needed maintenance and repairs to preserve this historic plank house will cost a little over \$14,000 and the work is well underway. Special lumber was shipped in to keep the logs looking consistent with existing logs. We've researched and applied for several financial grants to help offset the cost and we're finding that Covid has impacted grant funding with a trickle-down effect to 501c3 organizations. To date, we've secured a \$4,000 grant to help with expenses. The roof is also in need of repair.

"Remembering Woodland Beach" Exhibit

We've put a nice exhibit together to remember Woodland Beach when it was booming, during the late 1870's to the early 1900's. The exhibit includes interesting pieces including Steller's soda bottles, etched souvenir glass, info boards, and the stuffed muskrat adds a nice touch. Historical Fun Fact:

Puttees were part of the US Army uniform.





This World War II soldier is wearing "puttees". Puttees are thick strips of woolen cloth resembling a large bandage and became part of the uniform to keep sand and dirt out of the soldier's shoes and to keep the soldier's pant legs secured while in trenches. The cloth was wound tightly in a spiral and covered the lower leg from the knee to the ankle. Puttees were used by the United States soldiers, the British, German, Italian, French armies, and the Canadian Infantry. Puttees were ceased to be used after WWII for a few reasons; It took time to put them on and it was difficult to keep them neat and clean. The wrapping was identified as cutting off blood flow and causing medical issues.
