A LETTER FROM OUR

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Everyday participation is a privilege many of us take for granted. The freedom to walk anywhere at any time feels instinctive, yet for countless individuals in our community, it remains an uphill battle.



For those who rely on wheelchairs, power chairs, or walkers, accessibility challenges are a daily reality. Steps at home, the absence of railings or grab bars, and limited mobility resources can make even basic tasks daunting. Many face missed medical appointments simply because they lack a ramp, delaying critical care and wellness. Imagine being trapped in your own home, unable to navigate the steps. Did you know that medical transportation services require riders to be at ground level for pick-up? Without assistance, the burden of accessibility falls entirely on the individual.

The need for accessible solutions continues to grow, and we are committed to providing even more ramps in 2025. With the power of community partnerships, we aim to create a world where mobility is a right, not a privilege.

EXPANDING ACCESSIBILITY IN 2025

Growing accessibility support this year and next year, our focus must remain on growth and serving more individuals with accessibility needs.

This involves expanding our physical resources and securing sustainable operational funding.

Expanding Ramp Availability

We currently provide 30 ramps consistently, but the need continues to grow. To address this, we aim to add five more metal ramps annually, increasing our capacity significantly. These additional ramps are estimated to cost \$10,000. We're optimistic about securing most of this funding through the Marillac Foundation grant, which provided \$7,000 this year. We hope to continue to strengthen this relationship with the foundation and get ongoing support.

Prioritizing Operational Funding

While expanding resources is vital, the most urgent priority is operational funding. To grow, we need to sub-contract a part-time operations manager, estimated to cost \$32,000 annually. This role is crucial for improving efficiency and enabling us to help more individuals and have a greater impact.

The Growing Need

In the past two years, we've provided 60 ramps and numerous grab bars. However, for every person we assist, two more are left waiting due to limited resources. This highlights the critical need for increased funding and operational capacity.

Goals for the Year

- 1. **Add Metal Ramps:** Secure \$10,000 to add five ramps annually.
- 2. **Strengthen Grant Relationships:** Deepen partnerships with the Marillac Foundation and explore new opportunities.
- 3. **Secure Operational Funding:** Raise \$32,000 to hire a part-time operations manager.
- 4. **Increase Awareness:** Share our impact to attract more donors and supporters.

By focusing on these goals, we can grow and reach more individuals who depend on us for accessibility support. Together, we have the power to transform lives and create lasting change in the year ahead.


