When we are angry, sad, troubled we sometimes need comfort—what better way to get that comfort than a therapy dog like Millie!



Millie is the Mill Creek West Elementary School's Therapy Dog. Owner and Handler of Millie is Jenni Gullion who is also the school's Counselor. Millie became the Gullion family's pet at the start of COVID 19. Jenni and her husband were teachers so, along with their children, were on lockdown at home. It was during that time that Jenni realized Millie could make a great therapy dog.

Not every dog is suitable to be a therapy dog. Millie received her formal training at Speck's where Jenni said "...she was great at her classes!" Some of the training required besides the basic sit, stand, stay, the dog must be friendly, approachable, open to petting and visiting, and overcoming distractions. Therapy Dogs International certified Millie as a Therapy Dog.



Jenni shared that many kids come to school with "big emotions" like anger, frustration, sadness, and loneliness. Every morning Millie stands in the lobby of the school. Her whole job is to bring joy and comfort to the kids. However, the kids are not the only ones who Millie gets excited to see—the school's Resource Officer, Brent Johnson, gets lots of attention from her and the teachers and staff (as pictured to the right) love Millie.





#### VANDALIA TRAIL — Please use the Trail!


The Vandalia Trail restrooms in Amo and Coatesville will be closed by the Hendricks County Parks & Recreation maintenance team for the winter, beginning sometime in November. The specific closure date will depend on the weather. Re -opening is scheduled for April 1st.

In early September, Hendricks County Parks & Recreation's contractor began construction of a new section of Vandalia Trail on the west side of the Town of Clayton. This first phase will include a trailhead in Lambert Park connected with a short section of trail along the north side of CR 500 S to Michigan Street on the west edge of Clayton. Additional grants are being pursued for the next phase of construction for about 2 miles to the west.

The weekly group bike rides by Friends of the Vandalia Trail have finished for the year, but please join the group's monthly rides through the winter on Plainfield's Vandalia Trail. The first two dates are November 9 and December 14, leaving at 9:00 AM from the southeast corner of the Meijer parking lot with a breakfast stop afterwards.

#### AMO FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH AWARDED GRANT THROUGH LILLY ENDOWMENT'S 2024 NATIONAL CLERGY RENEWAL PROGRAM

Amo First Baptist Church has received a grant to enable its minister, Rev. Shelly Zook, to participate in the 2024 Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program for Indiana Congregations. Amo First Baptist Church is one of approximately 30 congregations in Indiana selected to participate in this competitive program, which is funded by Lilly Endowment Inc. and administered by Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis. Established by the Endowment in 1999, the program's grants allow congregations to support their pastors with the gift of extended time away from their ministerial duties and responsibilities.

Ministers whose congregations are awarded the grants use their renewal experiences to engage in reflection and renewal. The approach respects the "Sabbath time" concept, offering ministers a carefully considered respite that may include travel, study, rest, prayer and immersive arts and cultural experiences.

Through the program, Indiana congregations may apply for grants to support renewal experiences for their pastors. Collaborative in nature and implementation, the program allows congregations to partner with their ministers in developing experiences that address their unique renewal needs and aspirations. Recognizing that ministers' families are subject to the stress and demands placed on pastoral leaders, the program encourages pastors to involve their families in renewal activities. Congregational needs during the minister's renewal experience also are considered.

Since the Endowment established the Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program for Indiana Congregations in 1999 and the National Clergy Renewal Program for congregations in the other 49 states in 2000, more than 3,400 congregations have participated in the program, including the 30 Indiana congregations receiving grants in 2024.

Rev. Zook will be taking a total of sixteen and one-half weeks which will encompass time to rest, reflect, experience creativity, strengthen her personal resolve, reconnect with her family and find balance. The pastor will spend time traveling, health coaching and embarking on a transformative journey of self-discovery and empowerment. The goals are to acquire skills for healing through spiritual, emotional and mental exploration for discovery and healing. To operate from a place of renewal and JOY for herself and the Amo First Baptist fellowship, she imagines what God can do through His people if she were to operate from a positive place and a position of balance.

"Pastors play an important role in nourishing the spiritual lives of individuals and in guiding the work of the Christian congregations they serve," said Christopher L. Coble, the Endowment's vice president for religion. "Through these grants, we seek to honor pastors for their extraordinary service and enable them to engage in a brief period of rest and renewal. We have learned that such experiences invigorate the leadership of pastors and bring new vitality to their congregations as well."

Dr. Robert Saler, director of the Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Programs, noted that the Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program for Indiana Congregations integrates key attributes of healthy congregations, including a mutual respect for the renewal needs of both ministers and the congregations they serve.

"The program provides an opportunity for congregations to express appreciation for their ministers' service and leadership," Saler said. "At a time when leaders are often praised for their pace of innovation and productivity, the Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program for Indiana Congregations pays homage to the timeless wisdom embedded in the practice of reflection and renewal."

Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis directs the Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program for Indiana Congregations and a second program for congregations across the United States.
